

### ITALIAN CHAMBER MEETS IN SORROW

President Expresses Grief Over Earthquake With Trembling Voice.

### QUEEN HELENA APPLAUDED

Empty Seats of Three Deputies Remind Members of Fate in Disaster—Ruined Cities to Be Rebuilt.

ROME, Jan. 8.—The Chamber of Deputies was opened in special session today to consider the adoption of measures to bring relief. When President Marcora arose to address the Chamber, deep silence ensued.

With trembling voice and visible emotion he delivered a speech expressing the grief all felt. He expressed gratitude for the sympathy that has been sent the victims. He also voiced the gratitude toward Queen Helena.

Reference to her majesty was greeted with applause, the members of the Chamber and the Ministers rising to their feet.

Today's session of the Chamber was impressive and recalled previous sittings when matters of great National importance had been discussed.

The empty seats of Deputies Arigo, Orsini and Fucini, who met their death in the disaster, were sad reminders of the fate of these three representatives.

Premier Giolitti's announcement that both Messina and Reggio were to be rebuilt was greeted with applause.

### CELEBRATED WITH HARD WORK

### Queen Passes Birthday in Giving Aid to Earthquake Victims.

ROME, Jan. 8.—Following the desires expressed by Queen Helena, the anniversary of her birth, which was observed here today, was not attended by any of the usual festivities.

Her majesty is reported to have said that this year she wished to celebrate the day by working doubly hard for the Calabrian and Sicilian earthquake sufferers, whose sufferings she cannot drive from her mind.

Her two daughters, Princess Yolanda and Princess Matilde, respectively, and 4 years old, instead of buying birthday presents for their mother, turned over the contents of their money boxes to the relief fund.

Princess Crown Prince, who is 4 years old, not wishing to be outdone by his sisters, parted with what had been his greatest delight, a complete company of his soldiers, of which he is the commander.

He took his toys to his mother, saying: "This is all I have; please send them to the poor children."

The news that the Duke of Connaught is to arrive here Sunday has produced great satisfaction, and is regarded as a fresh demonstration of the sympathy of Great Britain.

British ships rendered great help in the southern provinces during the first days of the relief work.

### REACH ROOF OF CONSULATE

### Searchers at Messina Recover Body of Man From American Office.

MESSINA, Jan. 8.—The body of a man who lived on the floor above the American Consulate building, was taken out of the ruins yesterday. The work to recover the bodies of the Cheneys is progressing.

There was a religious procession along the devastated waterfront of Messina yesterday. Priests led through the ruined streets carrying sacred relics.

Stuart K. Lupton, of the new Consulate; Edward Cutting, Jr., and Winthrop Chandler, other members of the corps, have safe for Messina, where they will devote their energies to superintending the work of caring for the wounded.

### NOTED CONVICT ESCAPES

Counsel Attorney Walker, who took the office last Monday, understood that the charges had been dropped and ordered Sheriff O'Rourke to release Sullivan, who promptly left town with the train.

HAINS JURY GOING TO LUNCHEON

### HAINS' DEFENSE IS HURT BY EXPERT

Doctor Destroys Sentimental Motive of Crime by His Testimony.

### ANNIS WAS UNRECOGNIZED

Alienist Declares That Captain's Mental Perception Was So Dulled He Could Not Distinguish Names or Faces at Time.

FLUSHING, N. Y., Jan. 8.—A blow from an unexpected quarter was received by the defense in the trial of Thornton J. Hains today, when Dr. L. Samuel Mann, an alienist, under cross-examination by Prosecutor Darrin, declared that Captain Hains suffered from maniac depressive insanity last August, an ailment that would have prevented him from recognizing the face or name of an enemy.

The alienist said that in a patient suffering from such a malady all power of perception was practically lost.

Prosecutor Darrin, taking advantage of the admission of the defense's alienist, asked him if his opinion of Captain Hains' mental condition would be changed if he knew that in a patient suffering from such a malady all power of perception was practically lost.

Dr. L. Pierce Clark, another alienist for the defense, testified that Captain Hains was insane on August 15 when the shooting took place, and that he was insane early in November, when the witness made his last examination of him.

### VERDICT QUIETS RIDERS

Conviction of Eight Dampens Enthusiasm of Restless Tennesseans.

UNION CITY, Tenn., Jan. 8.—For the first time in six months Union City and Obion County breathe freely. The conviction of the eight men on trial for night riding and murder has had a reassuring effect upon the public.

The men of the Lake district who were in court when the verdict was brought in left town with a feeling of relief. The men will not take place until the May term. The defense's formal motion for a new trial will be argued Saturday.

Following the verdict of this action, the defense will take the case to the Supreme Court.

### GAS RULING BRINGS CRASH

Stock Exchange Firm Falls, Owing to Big Drop in Securities.

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Failure of customers to protect the holdings of Consolidated Gas at the time of the severe decline in that stock following the decision upholding the 8-cent law, is alleged to have been the cause of the failure of the firm of Heckler, Baxter & Seed, which was announced today on the Consolidated Gas Exchange.

The failure of C. Willett, a trader, was also announced today from the same exchange.

### KARINEN IN BY ONE VOTE

Wins in Contest for Seat for Councilman at Astoria.

ASTORIA, Or., Jan. 8.—(Special.)—A recount of ballots, in the contest brought by Fred Karinen against the election of F. J. Carney as Councilman from the First Ward, was held this evening and resulted in the seating of Mr. Karinen by a majority of one vote.

A protest was filed at the meeting of the Council this evening by Chris Schmidt against the seating of George Kahola, as Councilman from the Second Ward. On a recount, Schmidt was declared elected by one vote.

### COUNSEL ON FISHERIES

Turner Chosen to Represent United States in Arbitration.

SPOKANE, Jan. 8.—A Washington special to the Spokesman-Review says: Secretary Root has engaged ex-Senator George Turner, of Spokane; Lewis S. Dabney, of Boston; Mr. Lansing, of New York, and Dr. John Brown Scott to serve as American counsel before the Hague Tribunal, which is to arbitrate the long-standing fisheries dispute between this country and Great Britain growing out of the treaty of 1818. It is thought here that the case will go to arbitration before a commission of five or seven members of the tribunal at The Hague next Summer.

The selection of Mr. Turner drew out of Mr. Root's association with the Spokane man when the two, with Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, served as the American members of the court of arbitration which, sitting in London, settled the Alaska boundary dispute between the United States and Great Britain.

### CATHOLIC EARL MAY WED

Church Grants Dispensation for Mills-Granard Nuptials.

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Archbishop Farley has granted a dispensation for the marriage of Miss Beatrice Mills, granddaughter of D. O. Mills, to the Earl of Granard. The Earl, who recently arrived here from England, is a Catholic, while Miss Mills is a Protestant. The wedding will be held in this city on the afternoon of January 11.

### SWIMS; MERCURY AT 14

SEATTLE LAWYER TAKES DAILY DIP IN PUGET SOUND.

Spends 15 Minutes in Icy Waters and Declares He Enjoys Exercise.

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 8.—(Special.)—With the thermometer stuck some 14 degrees below the freezing point, with wintry blasts blowing across the waters, snowflakes swirling around in the most disagreeable manner, Thomas B. MacMahon, lawyer, nature pal and demon cold weather swimmer, plunged into Puget Sound off West Seattle this afternoon, and for 15 minutes sported around in the briny deep, caring nothing for the elements that made men ashore chatteringly wish for a warmer climate.

Mr. MacMahon really believes in playing tag with nature and insists on telling his friends what a good thing it is for mankind. When the Summer days were here one time he gave a dissertation upon this patting nature on the back and telling her under the chin at all seasons of the year.

This morning, when the snow was flying the thickest, when the wind was blowing its worst and the thermometer was down to its lowest, MacMahon went swimming. When Mr. MacMahon emerged from the water and had donned his street clothing, he explained that he was 40 years old and that he had been swimming in the sea since he was a boy, and believed that this was the most healthful and, when one got used to it, the most agreeable manner of living.
