SEA FIGHTER DEAD

Admiral Rojestvensky Again Reported Deceased.

LED RUSSIANS TO DEFEAT

Naval Strategist Once Idol of Czar's Sailors, but After Defeat Was Decided—Once Fired on Fishermen.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 14.—The death of Vice-Admiral Rojestvensky is announced. He was in command of the Russian fleet in May, 1906, when it was practically annihilated by the Japanese in the battle of the Sea of Japan. Up to the time of his defeat by the Japanese in the battle of the Sea of Japan, Admiral Rojestvensky was the idol of the Russian navy, and was reputed one of the most skillful and intrepid officers in the service. His absolute defeat, however, turned both official and popular Russia against him, and he never recovered his standing in the eyes of the Czar's subjects. At the time of his death he was somewhat over 60 years of age. He was Admiral Alexieff's second in command of the Russian squadron in the Far East in the Russo-Japanese war. In 1902 he was promoted to the rank of

Rear-Admiral and made an aide-de-camp to the Emperor, succeeding Admiral Avellan as chief of the naval headquarters staff and intelligence department of the Russian navy. In this capacity he supervised the equipment of the second Russian Pacific squadron, which he afterwards commanded and took to the Far East. During the late war between Russia and Japan Admiral Rojestvensky was ordered early in August, 1904, to proceed with his squadron from the Baltic to the Vladivostok. This voyage resulted in the annihilation of the Russian Baltic fleet.

Fired on Fishermen. The start was made from Libau on October 16 of that year and, passing around Denmark, the Russian fleet encountered the British North Sea fishing fleet off Dogger Bank. The warships fired on the fishermen, mistaking them for torpedo-boats, which led to a strained state of affairs between Great Britain and Russia. An international commission of inquiry which met at Paris, after a complete investigation, excused the Admiral for his action, while condemning the firing.

After many stops Rojestvensky arrived at Nisibis, off the north coast of Madagascar, at the beginning of January. There he was joined by Rear-Admiral Votkinsky and his division of the squadron. The fleet remained there until March 16 and then sailed for the Far East. The Russian combined squadrons, consisting of 47 vessels, passed Singapore on April 8 and coaled and re-provisioned off the coast of Annam and the island of Hainan. On May 8 the squadron, commanded by Rear-Admiral Nebogatoff, consisting of nine ships, joined forces with Rojestvensky and the united fleet, sailed northward to meet the Japanese.

Famous Battle Lost. The battle of the Sea of Japan, otherwise the battle of Tsushima, was the result of this meeting. Entering the Straits of Tsushima, between Korea and Japan, the Russian fleet was

attacked by the Japanese under Admiral Togo, the opening shots in the fight being fired about 2 P. M. of May 27. Although inferior in the number of their battleships, the skillful tactics and superior range of their guns gave the Japanese a great advantage and enabled them to inflict a crushing defeat on the Russians. The battle lasted until the afternoon of May 28 and included a general engagement and torpedo attack on the night of May 27. The Kriega Souvaroff, the flagship of Admiral Rojestvensky, was blown up and the Admiral himself, seriously wounded.

was rescued by a Russian torpedo-boat destroyer, which was afterward captured by the Japanese, who took Rojestvensky prisoner. Admiral Votkinsky was killed on the Oryabla and Rear-Admiral Nebogatoff was taken prisoner. Twenty-one ships of the Russian fleet were sunk, including six battleships and four cruisers. Five Russian ships were captured. The Russian loss was estimated at 4000 killed or drowned and more than 700 officers and men taken prisoners. The Japanese lost three torpedo-boats, 116 officers and men were killed and 538 wounded. A naval court of inquiry on June 7, 1904, presented an indictment against Admiral Rojestvensky for surrendering to the enemy, but on July 10 the Admiral was acquitted on the ground that he was not in his full senses (he was found unconscious from several injuries by the Japanese) and therefore not accountable for what happened at the time of surrender.

TIME TO DISSOLVE TRUST

Waters-Pierce Given Another Month but Must Pay Fine.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Jan. 14.—A month's delay in winding up its connections with the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey was granted to the Waters-Pierce Oil Company by the Supreme Court of Missouri today. The original decree ordered the Waters-Pierce concern to furnish a statement that it had taken steps to operate independently by January 15. The decree, of today, gives it until February 15 in which to take this action. The \$50,000 fine assessed against the company must be paid by March 1, the penalty for non-observance of the court orders being a forfeiture of the company's charter.

Mr. Stimson, it is expected, will turn the papers over to District Attorney Jerome for presentation to the grand jury, that a suit may be brought under the laws of New York.
