

THURSTON HAIN'S CASE WITH JURY

Captain's Insanity Is Not to Be Considered as Affecting His Brother's Guilt.

JURY IS OUT MANY HOURS

Prosecution Closes and Court Gives Defense Severe Blow by Instructing Jury to Ignore Insanity Plea.

FLUSHING, N. Y., Jan. 14.—At midnight tonight the jury in the trial of Thornton Jenkins Hains, charged with the killing of W. E. Hains, Jr., will deliver its verdict. It had been out several hours, but no word has come to Justice Crane on what progress had been made. Justice Crane said he probably would lock the jury up about 1 o'clock if no verdict was reached at this time. Thornton Hains remained under guard in the Sheriff's office.

FLUSHING, N. Y., Jan. 14.—The jury in the case of Thornton J. Hains retired at 4:35 o'clock this afternoon to determine whether the indictment charging him with being a principal with his brother, Captain Peter C. Hains, Jr., in the killing of W. E. Hains, Jr., was proved or not. The jurors had deliberated about 50 minutes when they went out for dinner, returning to the jury-room in less than half an hour.

The case was given to the jury after Prosecutor Darrin had completed his closing speech and Justice Crane had charged the law and reviewed the evidence. Justice Crane sent word to the jurors that he would remain up all night to receive a verdict.

By arrangement with counsel, a physician remained near the jury-room to minister to Juror Walsh, should his injuries demand it. Justice Crane began his charge at 8:20. He said:

"If the defendant intentionally aided and assisted in killing Annie, you need not consider Peter's sanity or insanity. You may dismiss the question, for the defendant would even then be guilty of crime."

"Take this case, gentlemen, review it carefully and patiently, and say whether you find this defendant guilty of murder in the first degree, murder in the second degree, manslaughter in the first degree, manslaughter in the second degree, or not guilty."

Thornton Hains expressed himself as confident of his acquittal, though his face plainly showed that he was struggling with torturing fear.

and that Bakersfield is in danger of inundation.

Even San Jose and the Santa Clara Valley have not altogether escaped the effects of the storm, although it has been less serious than in the other valleys mentioned. The Alum Rock electric road in San Jose has been put out of commission by the softening of the roadbed, and communication with the park has been cut off.

In the Salinas Valley the rainfall for this one storm totals over 15 inches, which is more than the average for a whole year in that section.

Just before midnight the Central Pacific's big steel bridge on the Eastern overland route went out at Elvas, on the American River. It is not known yet how badly this will cripple the company, but Eastern trains must go by circuitous routes for some time. It also cuts off the Oregon main line, so that all trains must come over the Davisville branch.

Twenty launches of the Sacramento Boat Club were torn from their moorings and swept down stream during the night.

The Weather Bureau has warned the people of Stockton that there is grave danger to that city from the Sacramento River and Mokelumne Slough. The latter, which carries a great quantity of water, broke through the levees above the town of Linden today and has spread over a vast extent of country.

At Kennett, in the northern part of the state, over six inches of rain has fallen in the last 24 hours, and at Blue Canyon seven inches have been recorded.

Workmen on the Western Pacific Railroad in the Feather River Valley report that entire sections of the line are being washed away by the flood. There have been several small landslides along the line of the Southern Pacific.

The warm rain will be of great benefit to the state generally, if not followed by a cold snap.

TWO DROWN AT PORTERVILLE

Levee Breaks and Floods Sweep Over Town and Visalia.

FRESNO, Cal., Jan. 14.—The levee surrounding Visalia broke this afternoon and flood waters swept into the town. At 1:30 o'clock the northeastern part of town was being flooded. School children were dismissed at noon.

At an early hour this morning, Porterville was flooded. Twenty-five families living in the low part of town were rescued by citizens on rafts. A woman and child are reported to have been drowned.

TRAIN WHOLE DAY BEHIND

Milwaukee Line Badly Blocked by Heavy Drifts.

BUTTE, Mont., Jan. 14.—A Miner dispatch from Lewiston, Mont., states that the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound passenger train from Butte, due here last evening, arrived this afternoon, nearly 24 hours late. Exceptionally deep snow was encountered along the line below Harlowtown, and for fear that the train would become stalled in the drifts far from any town, it was held all night at Harlowtown. Snow plows today had track in fairly good shape.

BAKERSFIELD IS MENACED

Levees Give Way and People Fight to Close Breaks.

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., Jan. 14.—A flood is menacing Bakersfield tonight. During the day both the north and south levees, which protect Bakersfield and the surrounding country from the overflow of the Kern River, gave way. More than 200 men are fighting to close the break, and unless rain falls tonight and tomorrow, it is believed they will be successful. Merchants have moved goods out of cellars and people in the lower section of the city have moved to higher ground.

TWO JURORS FOR CALIFORNIA TRIAL

Passed Subject to Peremptory Challenge After Whole Day of Cross-Questioning.

ATTEMPT AT TAMPERING

Talesman Reports Inquiry as to His Attitude—Honey and Moore Cast Reflections on One Another's Veracity.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 14.—Two men, still subject to peremptory challenge, have run the gauntlet of inquisition in the trial of Patrick Calhoun, charged with bribery, and the scruples of opposing attorneys have disqualified more than half of the 48 men who actually constituted the first panel.

When court convened this morning with the trial entering upon its third day, one of the talesmen subsequently accepted subject to the series of peremptory challenges, reported to the presiding judge an alleged attempt to ascertain his attitude toward the prosecution. Although the matter probably will not be made the subject of further investigation, it created for the moment a profound sensation in the courtroom.

Stern Warning to Jurors.

When the hour of adjournment came this evening, Judge W. P. Lawlor addressed to the occupants of the jurybox an impressive warning, restricting the exercise of privileges accorded the ordinary citizen and pointing out the safeguards that insure the early completion of the jury trial will make possible the taking of testimony.

Joseph Dixon, a prospective juror, who was under examination at the close of the trial yesterday, reported to Judge Lawlor what he believed to have been an attempt to ascertain his attitude in the case. Dixon stated that a young man had come to his house last evening, on the pretext of a real estate deal, and had endeavored to learn from Mrs. Dixon how the talesman stood.

Dixon was closely examined by both the prosecution and defense. He declared that the incident had made no impression on his mind, and was passed, temporarily, to fill the first place in the jury box.

Lawyer Swap Compliments.

Stanley Moore, of the defense, engaged in a wordy war with Assistant District Attorney Francis J. Honey in defense of his right to question prospective jurors in regard to immunity extended to the ex-Superior judges who will appear as witnesses in the case. Mr. Moore had asked George F. Alberti if he was aware that Rudolph Speckels had made the offer of immunity to the Superior. Mr. Honey objected, declaring that no testimony to that effect had been introduced. This was characterized by Mr. Moore as contrary to the fact and the charge of immorality was exchanged several times, until Mr. Moore asserted that the prosecution was making assertions it did not intend to support by evidence. SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 14.—John J. West, law partner of Abraham Ruef, was arraigned before Judge Coleman today, on the charge of attempting to corruptly influence the vote of John R. Foley, summoned as a juror in the Ruef bribery trial. At the request of the defense, the case was continued until January 22.

BRIDAL VEIL LUMBERMAN IS VICTIM OF THUG.

ATTEMPT TO BUY JUROR

FRIENDS OF BANK-WRECKER RINEHART ARRESTED.

Accused of Offering Go-between \$2500 to Secure One Man Who Would Hang Jury.

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 14.—What the authorities say was an attempt to tamper with the jury that is deliberating in the case of J. B. Rinehart, accused of bank-wrecking, was revealed tonight in the arrest of two men. One, George W. Worley, is Rinehart's brother-in-law. The other, James L. Smith, is a prominent business man of Waynesburg, where Rinehart's bank was located.

District Attorney Dunkle charges that the two men, supposed to be those under arrest, offered \$2500 to K. R. Wagner of this city, who was to keep \$500 and give \$2000 to Charles Aie, a juror, to hold out for acquittal. Wagner, who is a real estate man, is said to have telephoned his story to the Federal authorities and the arrest followed. The juror was not reached.

The jury took the case this evening. Rinehart is accused of having wrecked the Farmers & Drivers National Bank of Waynesburg, Pa.
