PINCHOT'S POLICY UPHELD

Idaho Stock Ranchers Urge Members

to Co-operate With Service,

POCATELLO, Idaho, Jan. 19.-(Special.) -Following on the heels of the adoption of resolutions by the National Wool-growers' conventions, in this city, criti-ciaing the present administration of Na-tional forests, the Idaho Stock Ranchers' Honai foresis, the fand Stock Ranchers' Protective Association at a meeting here lasting three days has adopted reno-lutions heartly indorsing and approving the forestry policies of Gifford Pinchot.

The association urges upon all dis members and upon all farmers and stock ranchmen using the forest reserves for grazing or other purposes to confer and at all times co-operate with the forest police and surtain the annicable relations that have existed in the past.

The resolutions urge upon the Legisla-ture the enactment of better laws for the apprehension and punishment of cattle rustlers. Rigid state inspection of livestock slaughtered is also urged.
