FAVORS OREGON PRODUCTS

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE TO PUSH STATE GOODS.

Asks Institutions at Salem to Use Those of Local Manufacture in Preference.

That home-manufactured articles of equal quality should be given preference over those manufactured outside of the state in the purchase of supplies for state institutions was the sentiment expressed yesterday at the meeting of the trustees of the Portland Chamber of Commerce. It was ordered that a petition be forwarded to Salem requesting that the present system of advertising for bids be modified so that articles of equal quality manufactured in this state will not be set aside for articles manufactured elsewhere.

The trustees also discussed the advisability of publishing another advertising booklet, and it was ordered that arrangements be made for a booklet similar to those previously issued by the Chamber, but to include a larger number of subjects and to consist of an edition of 100,000 copies. It was deemed advisable to increase the data contained in the present booklet owing to the large number of visitors who will pass through Portland on the way to the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition.

Acting upon the recommendation of members of the honorary commercial commission, representing the chambers of commerce of the Pacific Coast, who have just returned from a visit to Japan, the Portland chamber joined with the Associated Chambers of Commerce of the Pacific Coast in issuing an invitation to the chambers of commerce of Japan to send a delegation to the United States during the coming fall.

A resolution was passed, to be forwarded to the Multnomah delegation at Salem, asking that special attention be given to any bills on the question of employers' liabilities, as radical legislation in this line the Chamber considers would be inimical to the state's industrial interests.

M. Mossesohn was yesterday re-elected assistant secretary of the Chamber. The secretary was directed to extend to Bishop Scadding, C. E. S. Wood and W. D. Wheelwright the Chamber's appreciation of their addresses at the recent annual meeting.

William MacMaster, recently elected president of the Chamber, presided at yesterday's meeting.

ESTIMATES MAY BE CUT

CITY BUDGET BEFORE COUNCIL COMMITTEE TODAY.

Rumored That No Provision Will Be Made for School Inspection Under Health Board.

The ways and means committee of the City Council will resume consideration of the appropriations for the year at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The Health and Police Departments, and probably the parks, will receive attention. There is a rumor to the effect that the Council will prune the estimates for the Health Department, so that it will be necessary to eliminate the school inspectors' auxiliary, receives \$150 a month, will present this afternoon to defend the department and endeavor to show the members of the committee that it should be continued. She will have figures and data to demonstrate, at least from her point of view, that the assistance that has been given young women since its organization fully entitles it to the support of the municipality. Chief of Police Gritzmacher is favorable to the work, but not sufficiently so to make a statement before the committee.

As to the Health Department, Dr. E. C. Pohl, its chief, says that it will be positively necessary to have the school inspection. She declares that it has proved very beneficial, and has yielded highly satisfactory results since it was organized. She will therefore urge that there be no pruning in the department.

Councilman Rughlight, chairman of the committee, is much in favor of arranging the appropriation for the Police Department so that it will be possible to alleviate the present condition as to jail room, and to at least enable the department officials to build a new station on the East Side, on the lot already purchased at Union avenue and Hancock street. Chief Gritzmacher has said that, if this addition can be had, it will greatly relieve the headquarters building. He asked for this building in his annual estimate, but did not request any additional jail room at the central station. He believes that a jail on the East Side will serve the purpose temporarily.

Young Burglars Sentenced.

Amos Jones and Ben Swan were committed to the Reform School yesterday afternoon and sentence suspended during good behavior. Judge Gantenbein, of the Juvenile Court, informed them that any further infractions of the state law would mean their removal to Salem at once. They are the lads, 15 and 12 years old, respectively, who stole doughnuts, sugar and postage stamps from Mrs. E. J. Edwards, of St. John. They were before the Juvenile Court a year ago, charged with having committed four burglaries, and were paroled.
