

ASSOCIATION WILL EXTEND ITS SCOPE

Oregon Hardware Men Invite Dealers of Other States to Join Organization.

WAGE WAR ON PEDDLERS

Convention Adjourns After Executive Committee Has Been Given Authority to Join in Prosecution of Undesirable Competitors.

The Oregon State Retail Hardware and Implement Dealers' Association closed its meeting at the Commercial Club yesterday with a purely business programme, during which the organization went into executive session.

Other States Are Invited. A committee was named to revise the constitution, and it was agreed that the membership of the association should be extended to include the States of Washington, Idaho and Montana.

Communications were read from the Ohio Association of Hardware Dealers, and from the Inland Empire's Association of Spokane. A communication was also read from a large firm in St. Louis.

Haley Will Wrestle Edgar Frank, of Multnomah.

MATCH TOMORROW NIGHT

Visitor Is Member of Illinois Athletic Club and Is 125-Pound Amateur Champion of Middle West—Expects to Win.

Johnny Haley, of Chicago, the 125-pound amateur champion wrestler of the middle West, arrived in Portland yesterday afternoon, and will commence working out this afternoon to lumber himself up for his match with Edgar E. Frank at the Multnomah Club tomorrow night.

Haley is a member of the Illinois Athletic Club, of Chicago, and has won a large number of matches for that institution. He is a good-looking, stocky little fellow.

"I guess I am up against the hardest man since I started in the game," said Haley last night, "but that don't bother me much, for I always look upon every contestant as a hard man. Frank has beaten some good men and he is in perfect condition for a hard go, which ought to make our contest a good one for the spectators. I hope to win, and really expect to do so, for I have never been defeated yet, and I don't think Mr. Frank has had the actual wrestling experience necessary to win."

The confidence possessed by Haley in himself seems unflinching. He thinks he can hold his own against Frank in the world, and as young as he is, he seems not the least feared at coming all the way from Chicago, unaccompanied, to meet an utter stranger in a strange town.

Haley will work out with either instructor O'Connell or some of the Multnomah wrestlers this afternoon. He is a trifle stiff from his long ride on the cars, and has accepted the offer of the club, which tendered him the use of the gymnasium during his stay in Portland.

All the ambitious young grapplers of the club are anxious to see the Chicagoan in action, and it is a safe bet that the gym will be crowded this afternoon during the time the visitor is at work. Haley says he was at weight when he left Chicago, and believes that he can get back to the mark in a few hours' hard work.

Edgar Frank worked out splendidly last night and says he never felt better in his life. He expects to defeat the Chicago boy, and his many friends are banking on his success, for they claim he has improved wonderfully in the last few months. He is faster than ever before, and has benefited greatly by the work he has had with instructor O'Connell.

The programme will start promptly at 8 o'clock, when the first of the two preliminary matches will be pulled off, and will be between Swinney and Moss, while the second preliminary will be between Otto Oit and Panak.
