

CHARGES BRIBERY IN CALHOUN CASE

Honey Declares Defense Tried to Buy Secrets From Prosecution.

CROSS CHARGES FLY FAST

Lively Tilt in Judge Lawlor's Court May Result in General Investigation of All Episodes.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 21.—Howard T. Black, one of the takersmen, brought out a sensation at the Patrick Calhoun bribery trial today by informing the court that his wife was approached yesterday by a man who sought to ascertain his opinion concerning the case.

Stanley Moore, of the defense, declared that the unknown man was not an emissary of the defense, and that his people had no knowledge of a similar attempt several days ago in the case of Joseph Dixon, who colored the seat in the box.

Upon this Mr. Honey admitted that the man in the Dixon case was an agent of the prosecution, who has since been discharged for disobeying orders. Mr. Honey further said:

Honey's Men Approached.

"We are in possession of evidence that men in our employ have been approached and offered bribes to disobey the orders we have given."

This sensational charge was hotly denied by Stanley Moore, to whom Mr. Honey said:

"You cannot possibly know anything about this case, Mr. Moore."

At this juncture charges and counter-charges began to fly so fast that the courtroom was on the verge of an uproar.

Defense Smells Fish.

This statement was characterized by Mr. Moore as "having a fishy flavor."

Before Judge Lawlor succeeded in restoring order, Mr. Honey had made the further charge that an attempt was made, through bribery, to secure papers from the office of W. J. Burns, the detective.

JUROR SHOWS PREJUDICE

Discharged Because He Said Night-rider Should Be Hanged.

NASHVILLE, Jan. 21.—The defense in the Night Rider trial this afternoon introduced two witnesses to substantiate the allegation that Lee Carey, one of the jurors, had stated to them that the defendant, Edward Marshall, should be hanged, and that he was therefore incompetent to serve and should be discharged from the jury.
