

BOBBER FIRST IN BARREL FACTORY

Defeats Corey, of France, by Good Margin in Marathon Race.

OPPONENT IS INDIFFERENT

Trouble With His Shoes Causes the Frenchman to Make Frequent Stops and Finish Race in Bare Feet.

CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—In a contest in which speed, stamina and experience overcame what appeared to be indifference on the part of his opponent, after the second mile of the Marathon distance, Dorando, the doughy Italian runner, defeated Corey in a fashion calculated to drown the enthusiasm of even the most ardent admirers of the Frenchman. The time was 2:04-5 seconds. Dorando won by a good margin of over seven minutes. The race was run before a vast throng in the Dexter pavilion.

Regular in his gait, with the exception of occasional sprints, Dorando evidenced his superiority and won clearly on his merits. The spectacle presented by Corey was pitiable, and the enthusiasm which greeted his appearance gave way after a tiresome interval to sympathy for the Frenchman, who abandoned the ranks of amateur Marathon runners to compete with the Italian.

Corey claimed that his running shoes did not fit properly and as a result he was obliged to stop at the side of the track to receive refreshment. Corey covered half a mile in Indian fashion, with bare feet, and the last mile of the race he limped around the track track and appeared more than willing to quit. The full course is 26 miles 385 yards.

The racers got off in the Marathon at 8:30. The first five laps were tame, both men running easily, with Corey leading, and Dorando easily following. At the end of two miles and three laps, Corey stopped to change his shoes. Dorando gained three laps in the meantime.

When Dorando passed the ninth mile and seventh lap Corey stopped a second time and had his trainers adjust his left shoe, which he had complained of from the start of the race. Two laps later he lost at least four laps by hesitating for another change of footwear.

Physical condition did not appear to cut so much figure with Corey as his inability to handle himself properly, due in all probability to the fact that his heels had been badly injured earlier.
