

PROSPECT IS DIM FOR MORE JUDGES

Multnomah Delegation Divided on Question of Proposed Increase.

M'GINN'S FIGHT IS TELLING

Likely Outcome Is Transfer of Juvenile Court Work to County Court, Which Would Be Relieved of Probate Work.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Or., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—Plans for two extra Circuit Judges in Multnomah, each to be paid \$3000 by the state and \$1000 by the county, approved in the House today in a bill of Representative Jaeger, of Multnomah. This bill was looked for last week.

Multnomah members are divided on the question of its passage, and this looks ill for its success with other Legislators. There was talk today of compromising on one extra Judge.

Henry E. McGinn, of Portland, made a telling fight last week against the increase. A likely outcome will be transfer of the juvenile court to the county court, separation of the county judge from the county board and appointment of a third commissioner. This would be the purpose of Kellaher's bill in the Senate. The Kellaher bill leaves the salary of the county judge at \$2500 a month and forbids his engaging in private business. This arrangement, coupled with that proposed in Senator Bowerman's bill, for sending outside Circuit Judges into Multnomah, is relied on to relieve the congested condition of court business in that county.

To Protect Bank Deposits.

The responsibility of stockholders in banking corporations will be increased considerably if a constitutional amendment, proposed in a joint resolution in the House today by Representative Purdin, is adopted by the people. It provides that stockholders in banking corporations shall be liable severally for all of the indebtedness of such corporations when the assets of the corporation are exhausted. It also provides that other corporations shall be liable for the amount of their stock subscribed and paid in. The resolution was referred for the consideration of the resolutions committee.

Pleas for Compulsory Pilotage.

Dan A. Welch, of Astoria, today appeared before the House committee on commerce in opposition to the bill submitted by the Portland Chamber of Commerce providing for the repeal of the compulsory pilotage feature of the law regulating the pilotage service on the Willamette and Columbia rivers. It was decided by the committee to resume its hearing at a meeting to be held at 8 o'clock Wednesday night, when representatives of the Portland Chamber of Commerce will be invited to be present and submit their side of the controversy.

Examiner of Mines Proposed.

In the House today, Muncy, of Curry, revived his bill providing for a reduction in the fee for examining articles of incorporation and otherwise exempting such companies from the payment of any other assessments to the state. Last week a similar bill was introduced by the same member. The principal objection urged to the plan of reducing this fee, which is now \$45, was indefinitely postponed. The bill provides for a state mine examiner at a salary of \$5 a day, and whose duty will be to regulate the business of all companies of the kind that are being exploited by irresponsible parties.

Aid for Drain Normal Asked.

Further demands for Normal School aid, predicted in The Oregonian last week, developed in the House today, when Mr. Brooks, of Douglas, introduced two such measures. One calls for the appropriation of nearly \$6000 to cover deficiencies resulting from the operation of the Drain Normal School for the year ending July 1, 1908. The other asks for an appropriation of \$20,000 to meet the expenses of the institution for the biennial period ending December 31, 1910.

Free School-Book Bill In.

Free school books furnished by districts is the object of a bill by Representative Jones, of Clackamas. A similar bill was defeated in the last Legislature. The question is to be determined at the annual meeting of the board or by petition of not less than 50 school voters. A special tax is to be authorized for the free text.

Would Buy Summers Painting.

Representative Mahoney today introduced a joint resolution in the House proposing the purchase of an oil painting of General Owen Summers at a cost of \$600, the same to be deposited beneath the Second Oregon colors in the Governor's office. Such an act, recites the resolution, would be a "tribute to the valiant services of a gallant officer, an enduring monument to the memory of the brave Second Oregon Volunteers and their distinguished participation in the wars in the Philippines and as an object lesson in patriotism to posterity." The resolution was referred to the resolutions committee.

MORE NEW BILLS IN HOUSE

H. B. 159, Honchak—Authorizing the issuance of 25-year franchises to all power-producing streams in state at an annual tax.
H. B. 160, Corrigan—Creating Yamhill

County Fair Association and appropriating \$1000 per annum.
H. B. 161, Corrigan—Preventing swine from running at large in Yamhill.
H. B. 162, McCue (by request)—Making February 14 legal holiday.
H. B. 163, McCue—Calling an election in November, 1910, on proposal to exempt beer from operation of the local option law in any territory.
H. B. 164, Applegate—Appropriating \$2000.00 to cover deficit at Drain Normal School between July 1, 1907, and July 1, 1908.
H. B. 165, Applegate—Appropriating \$20,000 for maintenance of Drain Normal School, 1909-10.
H. B. 166, Brooks—Reduces salary of county judge of Multnomah County from \$1800 to \$1200 per annum.
H. B. 167, Carter—Authorizing establishment of hatcheries for propagation of trout; requires payment of fee of \$25 to Master Fish Warden.

FACTORY BILL IS PASSED

Eight-Hour Measure Put Through House by Clackamas Men.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Jan. 25.—(Special.)—With 11 dissenting votes, members of the Clackamas County delegation in the House this afternoon succeeded in having passed their bill providing for an eight-hour workday in all manufacturing, mechanical, mercantile, other establishments operating continuously throughout the 24 hours. Labor was enlivened by several of the speakers supporting the bill while those speaking against it argued that it was a "uniform system of accounting" and "expense" to be fixed by the Legislature. The new jobs are to have the titles of commissioner, inspector, deputy clerk, stenographer and so on. Of this enormous amount of salary and expense money that will be asked of the taxpayers, the Senate leaders with bills providing for \$18,000, while the House has under consideration measures that provide for \$24,100.

There also are several proposed bills and amendments for which provisions shall be made by direct tax levy. The amount of the funds so to be produced have not been computed and are not included in the foregoing total. When bills covering the same subject have been introduced in both houses, the amount of the requested appropriation is included in the grand total only once.

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QUALITIES FOR IMMORTALS

Brooke Proposes Measure to Reduce Salary of Public Official.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Jan. 25.—(Special.)—Incredible though it may seem, a bill actually has been introduced in the Oregon Legislature proposing a reduction in the salary of a public official. Such a curiously was presented in the House this afternoon, when Brooks, of Harney and Malheur, introduced a bill providing that the salary of the county judge of Malheur County be reduced from \$1800 to \$1200 per annum.

The presentation of this bill did not come altogether as a surprise, for last week a bill increasing the salary of the county judge of Jackson County from \$1800 to \$2500 per annum, he announced that he intended to introduce a bill reducing the salary of the same official in one of the counties in his district. He made good his promise today.

ANTI-CIGARETTE BILLS IN

One Proposes to Limit or Prohibit Sale of "Coffin Nails."

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Jan. 25.—(Special.)—Cigarettes are one object of vigorous attack in the Oregon Legislature. Various bills have been introduced for the purpose of limiting or prohibiting the sale and use of these "coffin nails."

House bill No. 142, by Mahone, of Multnomah, is a sweeping prohibition of the manufacture or sale of cigarettes by any person in the State of Oregon.

Bills for Creation of This Number of Places In.

SALARIES OVER MILLION

Numerous Boards With Per Diem Expenses to Be Fixed by Legislature Also Proposed by Enthusiastic Lawmakers.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Or., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—Bills creating fully 200 new jobs, many of them on fat pay, have been introduced in the Oregon Legislature, loading up taxpayers with more than \$1,000,000 salaries and expenses for the ensuing two years. This estimate does not include increased pay for county officials, outside of Multnomah, whose rush for "more" has produced a big crop of new bills. Nor does this estimate include the cost of numerous proposed boards, per diem "expense" to be fixed by the Legislature. The new jobs are to have the titles of commissioner, inspector, deputy clerk, stenographer and so on. Of this enormous amount of salary and expense money that will be asked of the taxpayers, the Senate leaders with bills providing for \$18,000, while the House has under consideration measures that provide for \$24,100.

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INDIAN VETERANS SCORE

BILL TO PAY FOR HORSES USED IN WAR WINS FAVOR.

House Passes Appropriation of \$100,000 Against Protest of Committee Majority.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Or., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—After a lively debate in the House this afternoon, Representative Jones (Lincoln and Polk), secured the adoption of his minority report favoring the passage of the bill appropriating \$100,000 for reimbursement of the Indian War Veterans for the use of their horses during the Indian wars of 1855-56. The bill was then sent to the House committee on ways and means, where, under the provisions of a resolution recently adopted by the lower house, all bills will rest until after January 29, when they will be taken up and considered on their merits.

Brandon and Hattberg, the other two members of the committee on Indian affairs, had introduced a majority report recommending that the bill be not passed, but they failed last week to secure the indefinite postponement of the measure, which was made a special order for 2 P. M. today. In urging the adoption of the favorable report, Jones said that, should the surviving veterans be paid \$2 a day for the time they served the state, they would receive only about \$130 each. He maintained that the debt was a just one and should have been paid many years ago. Jones said the amount of the appropriation probably would not be required to satisfy all unpaid claims; he believed that not more than \$75,000 would be required.

Brandon was the only member of the House to assail the bill, which he said was not just for the reason that, if the old veterans had any claim at all, it was a debt owing them by the Government, and not by the state. Barrett, Miller, Jaeger and Buchanan, however, agreed with Jones that the bill was a just one, and that the debt should be paid.

The following bills were passed by the House this afternoon:

H. B. 4, Clackamas County delegation—Establishing a board of county commissioners, comprising one member from each of the four judicial districts, to operate continuously.
H. B. 10, Scholfield—Placing compensation of Justice of Peace and Constable of Seaside at \$400 and \$200 per annum, respectively.

JUMP AND ALL ARE HURT

Five Workmen Flee From Collision Which Does Not Happen.

MISSOULA, Mont., Jan. 25.—To escape injury in a seemingly inevitable collision between a west-bound train moving Pacific freight and a work train moving eastward from Big Bend to bridge No. 87, half way between Big Bend and Garrison, five laborers who were riding on the latter train jumped precipitately to the side of the track.

By quick action the trains were stopped in time to avoid a collision, but all five men were more or less seriously injured. One man, Charles Chidlow, was thrown under the wheels and his body terribly mangled. He died in the hospital tonight.

DISTRICT RECEIVES BIDS

Chehalis to Sell School Building and Erect Two New Ones.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—The Chehalis school board opened sealed bids for the sale of the present High School site. A. L. Coffman and T. C. Rush bid \$10,000 for the block of ground used for the building. The city of Chehalis offered \$20,000 for the land and building. If the city should purchase the property the building would be rededicated and used for a town hall. The school district's plans are part of a move whereby Chehalis will provide two new schoolhouses and a block of ground in order to accommodate the rapidly growing needs of the town.
