HOUSE INSISTS ON AUTOS FOR TAFT

Joins Issue With Senate on Appropriation for White House Cars.

CUTS DOWN AIRSHIP SUM

Increase of \$500,000 Reconsidered—Wrangle About Price of Powder—Automatic Rifles Ordered for Army.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—The House locked horns today with the Senate on the question of automobiles for the White House and refused to accept an amendment to the agency deficiency bill sticking out the appropriation of \$12,000 for that purpose. The bill was sent to conference.

The House of Representatives today rejected the increase of \$500,000 toward the purchase of automatic rifles.

A long wrangle ensued over an amendment by Fitzgerald (N. Y.) limiting the price of powder, except for small arms, to 44 cents per pound. The chair ruled the amendment out of order.

Fitzgerald loses battle.

The provisions restricting the general staff corps to officers above the grade of major and limiting the detail for such service to four years also were ruled out.

An unexpected motion by Fitzgerald to recommitt the bill with instructions to the committee to report it back with an amendment fixing the price of powder at 44 cents caused Hull to move the previous question. By a rising vote of 144 to 123 the previous question was ordered, but Fitzgerald was able to force a roll-call. On roll-call the previous question

was ordered, 123 to 111. The Fitzgerald motion was lost and the bill passed.

WAGE PARTY FIGHT ON CRUM

Negro Port Collector Backed by Republicans in Senate.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—For the first time in several years absolute party lines were drawn in the Senate when, yesterday, an executive session was ordered to consider the nomination of Dr. W. D. Crum to be Collector of Customs at Charleston, S. C.

All the Republicans on the floor voted to close the doors, while the Democrats voted to proceed with legislative business. When the case was called up Senator Tillman asked that it go over until today. In resuming the fight party lines again will be drawn.

Senator Tillman objected to consideration yesterday in order that he might obtain protests from business organizations in South Carolina against the continuation of Dr. Crum in the customs service.

Republican Senators are understood to have lined up for Crum in order that Mr. Taft may be relieved of the embarrassment of inheriting a dispute with the Senate. Many of the Democrats believe that if they can prevent the confirmation of the negro collector at the present session, Mr. Taft would not send his nomination to the Senate.

WILL VOTE ON BROWNSVILLE

Senate Fixes Day to Decide About Re-enlistment.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—An agreement was reached in the Senate today to vote February 23 on the Aldrich substitute bill for the appointment of a court of inquiry to determine the qualifications for re-enlistment of the discharged soldiers of the Twenty-fifth Infantry.

The Senate today passed a House bill which is intended to prevent the importation of opium into the United States except for medicinal purposes.

Senate Approves Extra Judge.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Feb. 2.—The Senate Judiciary committee yesterday reported the bill previously passed by the House creating an additional Judge and Judiciary district in Alaska.

President Arbitrator on Opium.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—The importance of opium into the United States except for medicinal purposes is prohibited by a House bill passed by the Senate today. The bill will become a law when signed by the President.

Red Men Purchase Sanitarium.

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., Feb. 2.—The local lodge of the Improved Order of Red Men has purchased the Burlington Hotel, which is to be rebuilt and made a National sanitarium for the members of the order in America.

SHOT FOR BURGLAR

Inmate of Poorfarm Killed While Entering House.

VERDICT JUSTIFIES DEED

Coroner's Jury Refuses to Hold Hamilton for Shooting Dan Flynn at Chehalis Institution.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Feb. 2 (Special).—

Four members of the coroner's jury in the investigation into the killing of Daniel Flynn at the Lewis County Poor Farm, three miles southeast of Chehalis, last night, this afternoon signed a verdict in effect that the act of Nathan Hamilton was justifiable and that the deceased came to his death from a gunshot wound inflicted at the hands of Hamilton while Flynn was committing an unlawful act. Two jurors would not agree as to the justification. The four jurors were R. H. Hurley, S. F. Townsend, Fred Allen and Dan W. Bush, the other two being J. F. Gazco and Robert James.

Acting on the opinion of the four jurors and his own judgment, County Attorney Buxton directed Sheriff Urquhart to release the young prisoner, and he returned home to his work at the Poor Farm house.

About 11 o'clock Sunday night Flynn returned to the Poor Farm from Chehalis, went to the rooms of Mrs. Dunston, the matron, and demanded admittance. Under threats that he would break in the door and kill her, Mrs. Dunston finally opened the door, later taking the gun away from the man. After long parrying she was finally enabled to get rid of him, and called help. Flynn was ordered away from the Poor Farm Monday, never to return.

Yesterday afternoon Mrs. Dunston and Hamilton came to town and notified Sheriff Urquhart. Hamilton wanted the man prosecuted, but Mrs. Dunston, wishing to avoid publicity, agreed that if Flynn would leave the county, she would be satisfied. This Flynn promised to do, after being reprimanded severely by the Sheriff, who ordered the man to get out of the county and never return.

Flann later went to the Loughran saloon and spent the day drinking, during which he made threats that there was a party at the Poor Farm whom he promised "to get."

Last night about 8:30 when the inmates had retired, Flynn stealthily approached the Poor Farm building. He removed his shoes and stole through a side entrance to the dining-room. Hardly had he got inside when the shot was fired. Hamilton did not go on the stand today, but from a repeated conversation with others the shooting was admitted to have

been done by him. It was brought out that Hamilton feared Flynn, and from evidence submitted it was apparent that the former concluded to take no chances. The fact that Flynn was technically a burglar was admitted by the county.

Nothing further as to Flynn's identity developed. Papers found on his person indicated that he had worked at Roslyn, Wash. Also the addresses of Dennis E. Chace, Charles Adams and James R. Kane were found among his effects. He had a whiskey flask which was nearly empty, tobacco, \$16 in money and some money in his pocket. He was about 25 years old, and so far as known unmarried. The remains will be buried at county expense unless claimed by relatives.
