

HOPS SHIPPED EAST

Since Season Opened, 71,059 Bales Have Gone Forward.

LESS THAN PREVIOUS YEAR

Pause in Transactions in the Local Market—Fancy Prices Asked for Wheat and Oats—Heavy Produce Receipts Due.

Hop shipments from Oregon since the opening of the crop year have been 71,059 bales.

There are only about 5000 bales of the 1908 crop remaining in first hands. A considerable quantity is held in the state by dealers and speculators.

The market presents no new features. There has been an almost entire absence of business since the first of the month, except an occasional transaction between dealers.

The latter half of the month is likely to show more activity. It may be that the present waiting attitude of buyers is due to a belief that by waiting they can make their February shipments on a lower basis of cost.

A message from Salem that Joseph Harris bought 52 bales from Lachmund & Co. at 8 1/2 cents was the only report of business done in spot hops during the day.

SEATTLE MILLERS TO PUT NEW LIST INTO EFFECT TODAY.

Patents Will Be Advanced 20 Cents and Exports 10 Cents Per Barrel.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 8.—(Special.)—Millers will advance the price of patent flour 20 cents per barrel tomorrow morning.

The rate of advance is the same as that of the previous high point recorded December 4.
