SALES IN NORTHWEST END

SEVERAL GOOD-SIZED TRANS-ACTIONS ARE MADE.

Property at 15th and Marshall Brings \$15,500 — Apartment House to Be Built on King.

Several good-sized sales were announced yesterday, mostly in the northwest end of the city. Wakefield, Fries & Company and George D. Schalk sold for Thomas Sutton 50x100 feet at the southwest corner of Marshall and First.

At First and Arthur, 50x100, at the northwest corner, Wakefield, Fries & Company also sold to A. Goldblatt and D. Clement the lot for \$3500. It is located at the south approach of the First-street bridge and will be used by the purchasers for business purposes.

The real estate department of the Portland Trust Company, acting as trustee, sold for John Mathiesen the northwest corner of King and Washington for \$16,000. The purchaser, who is investing estate money, intends to erect a four-story apartment house on the site, which is 50x100. This is the last piece of the property Mr. Mathiesen bought at that place at the time King street was opened through from Washington.
