

SECRET SERVICE FUNDS AMPLIFIED

Senate Committee Says No Cause Existed for Roosevelt's Attack.

MORE MONEY EACH YEAR

Hemenway Says Inspectors Still Available to Ferret Out Crime and Appropriation Not All Used This Year.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—A report was made to the Senate today from the committee on appropriations relative to the President's statements concerning the attitude of Congress toward the support of the Secret Service. Hemenway, who presented this report, added that the President was not justified in making the statement contained in his message to Congress. The subject was investigated by a special Senate committee, which found the Administration had not been hampered by the action of Congress in limiting the operations of the Secret Service.

Secret Service Fund Grows.
Discussing the report in a speech on the Senate floor, Hemenway said that the appropriations for the Secret Service began with \$250 in 1867, and had been increased and decreased from time to time until for the fiscal year 1908 the appropriation was \$125,000, which enabled a regular employment for about 64 men.

The report says the limitation in the bill preventing transfer or detail of the Secret Service of the Treasury Department "in no way affects any portion of the inspection or secret service, as called, in any department of the Government except the 65 men employed in the Secret Service division of the Treasury Department. Certainly Congress has furnished the Executive Department with ample funds at all times for the detection and prosecution of crime."

Goodly Balance Remains.
Hemenway said that the Department of Justice had ample power for the employment of detectives in ferreting out crime, there having constantly been a goodly balance on hand of the appropriation of \$500,000 to investigate offenses.

The debate, under unanimous consent, was brought to a close by the objection of Hale, who desired to begin consideration of the naval appropriation bill. Just before adjournment today, the Senate passed a resolution in honor of the centenary of the birth of Lincoln.

A bill was passed also repealing the increase in the salary of the Secretary of State from \$800 to \$12,000, as to permit Knox to accept appointment as Secretary of State.

McLaurin made a speech in opposition to the passage of any bill for the re-employment of the soldiers of the Twenty-fifth Regiment, accused of having "shot up" Brownsville.

WESTERNERS WANT DUTY KEPT

Lumbermen at Washington to Fight for Retention of \$2.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Feb. 11.—Representatives of the Western lumbermen have returned to Washington to fight for the retention of \$2 duty on lumber. They do not expect a further hearing before the ways and means committee, but are working with individual members of the House from the lumber states. They have also had a conference with Forest Pinchot, but failed to persuade him to change his position. He is still for free lumber.

WAIT FOR LOCAL PROTESTS

No Action on Portland Postmaster-ship for at Least a Week.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Feb. 11.—Senator Bourne is highly distressed because of his inability to induce the subcommittee to take up and pass upon the Portland Postmaster-ship bill. He is waiting for local protests to come from Portland, and the subcommittee will not meet until the protests are at hand. No possibility of meeting inside a week is seen.

are wealthy New Yorkers who had followed the advice of most of the stock houses to sell when on the high price, the big visible supply and the unfavorable trade situation, as they viewed it. The big Easterners are by no means through fighting, but their accounts show such large paper losses that they have not been making any vigorous demonstrations in the market recently. They still hold to the view that if Patten keeps the Chicago-Wheat price above a legitimate level, the market here will be made a target for offerings from all directions, and that the inevitable supply of wheat will become visible at a surprising rate.

If red winter wheat was the measure for the entire wheat market, Patten would already be counting his victory and profit. Premiums for red winter are particularly high.

Patten has much opposition among the local traders, but those accounts differ from those held by the big bull lack the nerve to oppose him in the pit. About 80 per cent of the local wheat traders are bears, but a very decided effort which has been made recently to

force a break in prices has met with quick and severe punishment, caused by the strong rebounds in the market whenever the bulls put their shoulders to the wheel.

WOULD HAVE \$1.25 MINIMUM

American Society of Equity Would Help Wheatgrowers.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—Declaring that a farmer should receive as much profit on his business as the manufacturer or the merchant, and that the minimum price of wheat on the farm should be \$1.25 per bushel, the American Society of Equity has transmitted a paper to Congress showing the cost of the farm materials and machinery, and the amount of capital which it is necessary for a farmer to invest before beginning the raising of wheat.

Figures which were compiled from the books of a business-like farmer in the Red River Valley and which have been certified to by expert accountants, place the cost of producing wheat at \$1.19 5-10 per bushel.

Records Go in Gotham.

NEW YORK, Feb. 11.—The highest price of the season for May wheat was reached in the Produce Exchange today when that option sold at 1.17 3/4 per bushel.

A scarcity of cash wheat, good export demand, higher foreign markets and the strong position of the Chicago bull leaves farmers here with the advance. New crop months, while strong, were not so buoyant as the May delivery.

TELLS OF ROAD CONGRESS

LEADING MEN WILL SPEAK AT SEATTLE, SAYS HILL.

Pioneer in Highway Improvement Reviews Best Methods Gained by Long Experience.

Samuel Hill, of Seattle, who has given attention to good roads movements and the study of best methods for a period extending over 35 years, is in Portland on a short visit. Mr. Hill said last night that a Congress of road builders is to be held in Seattle July 4-7 in the only building in the world devoted to good roads education.

Mr. Hill said that he had visited most of the Governors of the Atlantic States in the past few months as well as many in the Middle States and secured promises from enough of them to insure a successful attendance at the coming Congress, at which representatives from Canada and Mexico also are expected to be present.

The purpose of this Congress, he explained, was to formulate plans for a standardization of road-building methods applicable to conditions in the several states.

Last year Mr. Hill was accompanied on a trip through Europe by R. H. Thompson, City Engineer of Seattle, and Professor Lancaster, at present occupying the position of highway engineer at the University of Washington, when a thorough examination of methods in use in the older countries was made and photographs and notes of the best results were collected of its kind in this country.

These pictures are on exhibition in the good roads building at Seattle. The International Congress on Road Building was in session in Paris when the three Seattle men were abroad and they attended its sessions, with it other representatives from the United States.

Mr. Hill is an enthusiastic advocate of the employment of convict labor in the preparation of material and the construction of roads. With intelligent supervision, he says, the best results are to be obtained in such employment and besides the convicts when they shall have finished their terms of conviction will leave with a trade that will give them a chance to earn an honest living.

Mr. Hill lays particular stress on the importance of educational methods to fit those in authority in communities to properly supervise road building. Money alone, he said, cannot make good roads; it must be expended in an intelligent manner in order to produce results. It can be so expended only when those who have charge of the disbursement know what good results really include. "A man may have \$1,000,000 and desire to go into the manufacture of watches. His money cannot make a single watch, but it can employ expert watchmakers, and forthwith the money is put to the use desired," said Mr. Hill, by way of illustration.

One of the subjects that has taken much of Mr. Hill's attention in studying out the problem of good roads is that of relative cost of transportation paid by the millions of farmers of the country. From data carefully collected he found that the cost of transporting farm products from farm to rail or steamer lines is \$1 a mile against a freight of 3 cents by rail a mile. This great difference he attributes to the bad character of the roads over which the products are hauled by wagon.

This student of good roads is firm in his opinion that before beginning to spend money in the improvement of roads by the state or city some intelligent plan should be outlined to be followed. He thinks that when students in the universities are graduated from the highway engineering departments this expert knowledge will be available to state and county authorities.

JURY FINDS LOOSE GUILTY

New York Man Convicted of Murder on Children's Evidence.

NEW YORK, Feb. 11.—The jury in the case of Carl Loos, on trial for the killing of his 15-year-old daughter, tonight brought in a verdict of murder in the first degree. Loos was convicted on testimony given by his two sons, one of them a minister, and a daughter who charged her father with a heinous crime.

BRITAIN WATCHES KAISER

To Lay Keels of Five Dreadnoughts and Sixth if Germany Does.

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The Daily Mail learns that the government has decided to lay down five battleships of the improved Dreadnought type, the coming year. The building of the sixth battleship will depend upon the progress of Germany's new construction.

Gale Sweeps Spanish Coast.

MADRID, Feb. 11.—A violent storm is raging along the eastern coast of Spain. In Valencia Harbor several vessels collided and one was wrecked. Three of the crew perished.

TURKEY HAS CRISIS

Grand Vizier Frustrates Plan for Dictatorship.

DISMISSES TWO MINISTERS

Climax of Strife Between Rival Reform Parties—Four Other Ministers Resign and Capital Is Highly Excited.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 11.—The new government seems to be on the edge of a serious crisis as the result of the sudden removal of Nizami Pasha, Minister of War, and Adil Pasha, Minister of Marine, who, without public explanation, were replaced Wednesday by Nazim Pasha and Huseini Pasha, respectively.

Kiamli Pasha, the Grand Vizier, in discharging the ministers, was actuated by the necessity of frustrating a coup d'etat which was being arranged by the Committee of Union and Progress to establish a military dictatorship under Prince Yusof of Izmir.

The affair is a climax to a struggle between the two rival reform parties, the Committee on Union and Progress and the Liberal Union. The crisis was further developed tonight by the resignation of the President of the Council, Hassan Pasha, and the resignation of the Ministers of Justice, Interior and Finance.

UTAH WILL GO DRY NEXT

House Passes Statewide Prohibition, Rejects Dispensaries.

SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 11.—When the state-wide prohibition bill came up in the House of Representatives today, it received 41 votes. Two were cast against it and two members were absent. An amendment for county dispensaries was voted down. Notice was given of a motion to reconsider the vote. If the bill reaches the Senate, it will meet with strong opposition.

REPEAL LOCAL OPTION LAW

Indiana Lower House Votes to Recall Liquor Measure.

INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 11.—The House of Representatives today passed the Proctor-Township bill, repealing the county local option law by a vote of 52 to 41.

The bill provides for incorporation town and a city ward local option; prohibition in the rural districts and allows but one saloon to 500 inhabitants and does away with saloons owned by brewers.

SPEAKS FOR NEW CHARTER

Dr. C. H. Chapman Supports It at East Side Meeting.

Under the auspices of the United East Side Club in North Albina last night, Dr. C. H. Chapman, member of the Charter Board, reviewed the work of the Board and set forth the important points in the new charter. His remarks were mainly a reply to the minority report submitted by F. V. Holman. He said there had been rumors on the street that the City Council would decline to submit the charter to a vote of the people, which, he said, would be the very best reason why it should be submitted.

In speaking of the new plan, Dr. Chapman declared it was not an experiment, but had been tried in Des Moines, Salt Lake City and other cities with marked success. He pointed out how it centralized the power of the city government and fixed responsibility, which cannot be done under the present city government.

The meeting was well attended, and the sentiment of those present seemed favorable to the new charter. Dr. Chapman had the printed report of the charter, which were examined at the meeting. Other similar meetings will be arranged for in different portions of the East Side.

Prominent among the Chinese guests was the Honorable Ho Sun, Chinese Instructor who recently arrived in Portland to take charge of the local Chinese school. ADMITS HE IS LESKOUSKI

Butte Man Tells Reporters He Is Escaped Convict From East.

Leskouski escaped from the jail at Mauch Chunk after his conviction of murder in the first degree, while awaiting sentence of death.
