Cash Bonds Garnisheed and Moscow Bank Then Refuses to Honor \$1300 Check.

COLFAX, Wash., Feb. 12-Deputy Sherliff Peterstu, of Walla Walla, arrived in Col-fax today with W. R. Clemens, who was taken to Walla Walla on complaint of John Woods, who alleged he was visitim-fixed of \$4100 for 54 pure-bred Hereford cattle sold to the Camus Prairie Breeders' temporture of Mator Ferris. on the overl to Dawson. cattle sold to the Cannos France Dreaders Association, consisting of Major Ferris, George Sheldon, George Lamb, who were reported to be worth \$200,600 by Idaho banks. Clefnens received a due bill for \$200 for making the sale. The notes are said to be worthless. Woods holds an attachment on 60 head of the castle in Idaho the care of which

Woods holds an attachment on 60 head of the cattle in Idaho, the care of which has cost 3000 to date. Chomens gave bond for \$6000, signed by Harry Clemens, of Moscow, Idaho, and L. Meadows, of Walla Walla. He was returned to Col-fax, where his cash bond of \$1500 was changed to a personal security.
