

WOLENT THREATS AT CALHOUN TRIAL

Heney Warns Lawyers for Defense He Will Not Take
Insults in Future.

FEARS NO CONSEQUENCES

In Open Court Prosecutor Utters
Angry Warning—Cares Not If
Jail Awaits Him, but Moore
Continues His Taunts.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 19.—Recalling the attempted assassination of last November, Francis J. Heney today charged that Henry Ach, attorney for Abraham Ruef, knew of the intention of Morris Haas to shoot the prosecutor. The accusation was flung at the attorneys for the defense during one of the most heated exchanges that have occurred during the trial of Patrick Calhoun, and before the session adjourned his usual calm complexion Judge William F. Lawlor had threatened two of the belligerent attorneys with imprisonment in the County Jail. There were references to armed gun men, to the use of dynamite and to the prospects of imprisonment before the court succeeded in inducing both sides to lay aside the immediate basis of disagreement and cease their objectionable references.

Says Heney Bulldozes Jurors.

During one of the wordy exchanges between counsel A. A. Moore, of the defense, objected to Mr. Heney's tone, saying:

"A few days ago Mr. Heney, in the course of an examination of Mr. Sam Leake, turned to the attorneys at this table and said he had established a line over which no man dared pass in future. Are we to understand that his retainers, with sword and pistol, will endeavor to maintain that line? Mr. Heney, in my estimation, has been in the habit of bulldozing jurors and has persisted in accusing us of engaging in that practice. He is in such a position that it might be said of him: 'Thou sayest such an undisputed thing in such a solemn way.'"

Says Ach Knew Haas' Purpose.

"If the defense will produce any witnesses who will take the stand and testify to matters derogatory to my character I will promise not to interrupt, nor will I make any objection during an argument where my name is mentioned. But Mr. Heney is not on trial here, and he doesn't propose to be tried during the trial of Mr. Patrick Calhoun. I have taken more insults during the past six months than I ever will take again. For all that time I stood the abuse of Henry Ach, and I am satisfied that Henry Ach had personal knowledge beforehand that Morris Haas intended to kill me."

Mr. Moore retorts:

"Mr. Heney makes the mistake of creating men of straw and blowing them over. He says in a bellicose way he won't permit this and he won't permit that, but I doubt if we are obliged to regard his prohibitions. If we should attempt to show that Mr. Heney entered into the important relations involved in the grant of immunity, we might be accused of attempting to defame, and if we are going to be the judge of vilification, is he to be allowed to turn loose his gun-fighters on us?"

Judge Lawlor attempted to intervene at this point, but Mr. Heney raised his voice to say:

"No one has been dynamited or shot on your side of the case up to this time, and you may be sure we don't hire people for that purpose."

Lawlor Stops Moore's Retort.

"If the court thinks we have knowledge," began A. A. Moore, but Judge Lawlor interrupted. He directed Mr. Moore to resume his seat, and when the attorney asked:

"Which seat?" the court, with unusual acerbity, said:

"If you attempt to act flippantly toward this court, you will occupy a seat in the County Jail. I sent a man to make the inquiry."

Mr. Heney was again attempting to explain his position when L. F. Rylington interrupted:

"A brave man doesn't talk so much."

"Then you are by no means a brave man," retorted Mr. Heney. "If you were, you would not talk so much."

Upon this occasion Judge Lawlor admonished Mr. Heney, advising him to remain silent under penalty of punishment for contempt.

Heney Threatens to Shoot.

"I won't take any more of this," said Mr. Heney. "If the court doesn't stop this, I will take what the court gives me, but I won't take it from them."

After Judge Lawlor had ordered an adjournment until next Tuesday, Mr. Heney engaged Stanley Moore in an extended and earnest conversation. The subject was not made public, but it was learned that the prosecutor had been told the attorney given him by the agents of the defense whom he once warned to keep away from him.

A single seat in the jury box remains to be filled before the order for peremptory challenges. Ten talesmen were examined and discharged during the day from among the 80 men composing the 12th venire.

WILL SUPPORT WATERWAYS

Taft Says Canal Knockers Had Better Fall in Line.

CINCINNATI, O., Feb. 19.—Addressing the members of the Cincinnati Chamber of Commerce today, President-elect Taft discussed waterways plans, saying that they should receive his heartiest support as President. But he cautioned that patience be cultivated, for the reason that Congress very properly moved slowly.

At the present time, he said, a deficit of \$90,000,000 confronted those responsible for the Government. That he believed not to be a serious situation, and as encouraging signs he spoke of the stagnation of business due to a universal inclination to wait until the tariff had been revised before new business undertakings had been launched.

The normal revival of business after the tariff had been settled, Mr. Taft believed, would take care of the deficit.

Referring to the Panama Canal, Mr. Taft declared that the type of canal had been determined upon and the minority might as well come in and back up the work.

"But," he added, "whether they do come in or not, it is going to be built according to the plan."

Speaking of the good it would do to those on the Isthmus who are engaged in the work to have the American people backing up their efforts, Mr. Taft said:

"I am sure that the people of the United States intend to stand back of them, and I propose, so far as in me lies, to assure that, while I am President, they will be backing to the last dollar necessary."

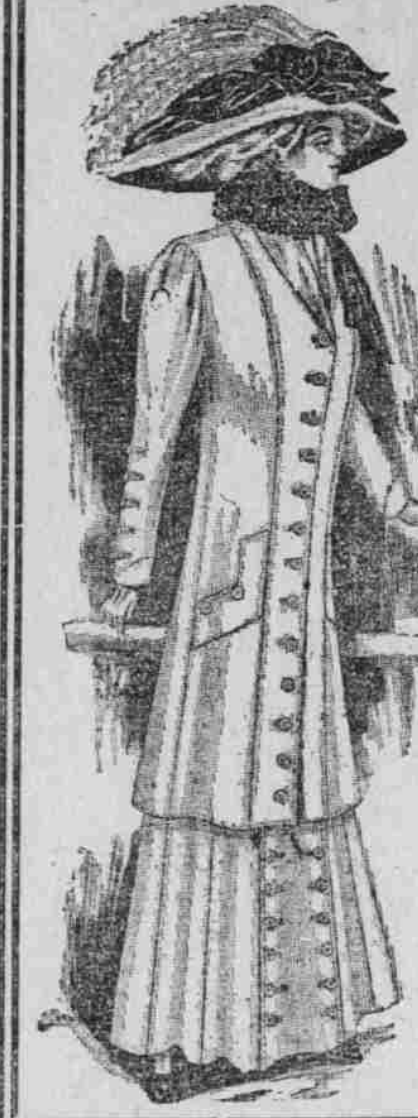

HOUSE STANDS PAT

Committee Retains Limit on Secret Service.

STILL FIGHTS ROOSEVELT

Shows He Did Not Use Money Given to Enforce Rate Law—Large Sum for Canal and Another Bond Issue Allowed.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—Two more disputes between the President and Congress were revived today when the House committee on appropriations reported the sundry civil appropriation bill. One was in regard to the limitation of the use of the secret service of the Treasury Department. The other was the appropriation for the examination of accounts of railroads under section 30 of the Hepburn rate law. The bill, the largest of all the general supply bills, carries an appropriation of \$137,622,007, or \$2,000,000 less than the estimate.

The committee incorporated in the bill the same limitation on the use of the secret service operatives as was included in the bill which became a law last Winter. It was this limitation, that drew forth the severe criticism of the President in his annual message last December. For the enforcement of section 30 of the Hepburn rate law \$50,000 is appropriated, the same sum as last year.

Did Not Use Money Provided.

The sum of \$50,000 was voted a year ago only after the President had written to the Speaker and Cabinet members had called several members to the White House for consultation. Testimony taken by the committee shows during the seven months of the present year only \$41,000 of the fund had been expended and in this amount was included the salary of 12 examiners for whom maintenance was suggested by the committee a year ago from another fund.

In the bill the President is authorized with the consent of Cuba to invite proposals for raising the wrecked battleship Maine from Havana harbor.

The bill carries authority for the construction of a building at Washington at a cost of \$2,500,000 to accommodate the Geological Survey, the reclamation service, the General Land Office and the Indian Bureau.

The largest item in the bill is for continuation of work on the Panama Canal. For this purpose \$23,638,000 is appropriated, or \$1,900,000 more than is carried in the current sundry civil appropriation bill for that expenditure. There will be a deficiency this year, however, of about \$500,000. The second largest item is \$13,574,314 for rivers and harbors construction work authorized by law.

Another large item is \$18,615,616 for the construction of public buildings.

\$1,000,000 to Recover Stolen Land

The bill also recommends at the urgent request of the Secretary of the Interior, the appropriation of \$1,000,000 for the protection of the public domain and the investigation of entries of public lands with a view of determining their validity. This amount was increased at the last session from \$500,000 to \$500,000.

The cost to the Government of granting holidays, half holidays and leaves of absence to Government employes in the District of Columbia is estimated at fully \$2,500,000 annually.

On the recommendation of the Department of Commerce and Labor the permanent appropriation, including the head tax collected on every immigrant, is abandoned and a specific appropriation is made. The permanent appropriation has been exhausted and there is a deficit of \$500,000.

More Bonds for Canal.

The amount of bonds authorized to be issued for the construction of the Panama Canal is increased from \$130,000,000 to \$160,000,000. Allowances for longevity service and layover days are forbidden.

WANTS ONE DETECTIVE BODY

Mr. Bonaparte protested against any limitation on any secret service employees of the Government.

WATERWAYS MEASURE IS UP

Emergency Bill Carries Appropriation of \$9,971,625.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—Chairman Burton, of the House committee on rivers and harbors today introduced the emergency and maintenance bill for waterways improvements which reaches a total appropriation of \$9,971,625.

The bill provides for a National waterways commission of five Senators and seven members of the House. For the expenses of the commission, which is empowered to employ expert aid to investigate waterways in this country and Europe, \$50,000 is appropriated.

Provision is also made for a survey for a deep channel in the Delaware River from Philadelphia to the sea and for the purchase of the property of the power company at Sault Ste. Marie, on St. Marys River, which has been the cause of dispute in settling the water boundary between the United States and Canada.

ARMY TO COST \$106,636,050

Appropriation Includes Extra Pay for Men and Alaskan Roads.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—The Army bill, appropriating \$106,636,050, was passed by the Senate today. There was little discussion upon the measure except upon the appropriation of \$100,000 for the construction of roads in Alaska, which was agreed upon.

ST. PAUL, Feb. 19.—Holder Brayton, cashier in the offices of the Northern Pacific Railroad land department, died here today as the result of a shot fired by himself last evening in his cottage on White Bear lake. He left a letter for his fiancée, Miss Kout, of this city.

It became known during the day that Brayton, who was a trusted employee, was short several hundred dollars in his accounts. Brayton left the following note:

"This is the end of a mispent life. Attach no blame to anyone."

Child Falls From Window.

Wilkes, who lives at 600 East Davis street, lost its balance and fell from the second story to the ground, a distance of about 12 feet, causing a compound fracture of the right arm. The accident was witnessed by some of the family, who rushed to the window in an effort to prevent the child's fall but were too late. The child was brought into the house and Dr. J. J. Pantan summoned.

After a short stay in the hospital, an operation and the child was removed to the Good Samaritan Hospital.

ST. CUNARD'S NEW RECORD

Mauretania Crosses Long Course in 4 Days, 17 Hours, 6 Minutes.

NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—With a new trans-Atlantic record the steamer Mauretania came into port today after crossing the ocean over the long course from Daunt's Rock to Ambrose Channel light-house, off Sandy Hook, in four days, 17 hours and 6 minutes.

The best previous record for this passage was 4 days, 19 hours and 26 minutes, held by the Lusitania.

The Mauretania's average speed for the voyage of 2900 miles, completed today, was 25.56 nautical miles per hour and her best day's run was 671 miles, both of which are new high records for this trans-Atlantic service.

The Lusitania still holds the record for the quickest passage across the ocean over the short course, having covered the distance of 2871 miles in 4 days and 15 hours.

KILL TARIFF AMENDMENT

Chamberlain's Measure Lost in House of Commons.

LONDON, Feb. 19.—After a debate lasting two days, the tariff reform amendment to the address in reply to the King's speech from the throne was defeated in the House of Commons today by 27 votes to 197. The amendment was proposed by J. Austen Chamberlain, and he had all the backing of the opposition benches.

Eugene Germain, Diplomat.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 19.—Eugene Germain, a well-known politician and wealthy business man of this city, died last night from an affection of the heart, after a ten-day illness.

During President Cleveland's second administration Mr. Germain was appointed American Consul to Zurich, Switzerland, his birthplace. He was president of the Germain Seed Company, and owned large property interests here.
