ACQUIRES STOCK QUIETLY

Learns From Attorneys Portland Gas Company's Franchise Not Exclusive and Is in Position to Begin Operations at Once.

Henry Hewitt, a millionaire Tacoma capitalist, has bought a controlling interest in the Economy Gas Company and the St. John Gas Company. lieved to be the intention of Mr. Hawitt and his associates to start an independent gas company to supply Portland and suburbs in opposition to the Portland Gas Company. This would involve the expenditure for plant and distribution system of several million dollars.

Mr. Hewitt has moved very quietly in picking up the floating snares of these two companies and it was only yesterday, when deals were closed for several large blocks of stock, that the movement be-

blocks of stock, that the more came known.

Both the Economy Gas Company and the St. John Gas Company have franchises permitting immediate operation, so that control of these two companies gives Mr. Hewitt and his associates the control of proceeding to carry out opportunity of proceeding to carry out thir plans without the necessity of secur-ing franchises from the Councils of the

It is known also that Mr. Hewitt has had attorneys carefully scrutinizing the franchise of the Portland Gas Company and has received opinions to the effect that the franchise of the Portland Gas Company, granted by the territorial Legislature, does not give it exclusive privi-lege of furnishing gas to the City of Portland. The fact that Mr. Hewitt has spent a large sum of money buying up the stock of the Economy Gas Company indicates also that he has faith in the validity of the Economy Gas Company's franchise voted by the people of Fortland in June, 1907, under the initiative, as the Economy Gas Company has no other assets beside this franchise.

### Economy Needed Money.

The acquisition of a majority of stock in the Economy Gas Company of Portland by Henry Hewitt is an indication pointing to a lighting deal of no small magnitude. While the Economy Gas franchise has been in existence since June, 1907, it has lacked the financial

backing needed.

Despite the strong opposition of corporation interests the franchise was passed by the people, when referred to them by the City Council, for when it became known that one of the principal provisions of the franchise was that to become operative the Economy Gas Company must turn gas through the mains at the reduced charge of 25 cents, all opposition became entirely

The first holders of the franchise were merely acting as agents for large finan-cial interests in the East, which, being involved in the panic and consequent hard times of 1907 and 1908, falled to provide the money to push the deal on to consummation. Since that time there have been various attempts to dispose of the franchise, but the figure at which it was held, it is believed, held the local and the conserve from the fourthers. Finally, after passing through the hands of ies, the stock centered in the hands of George Morgan, an Ala-bama attorney, having offices in the Geodnough building, from whom it has passed directly into the hands of the Hewitt interests.

As Hewitt aiready holds the franchise for the St. John Gas Company, with a piant there in course of construction, it can be seen that obtaining the Economy franchise indicates a probability of his entering the field in direct competition to the Portland Gas Company.

That this is not based on mere supposition is shown by certain amend ments to the franchise that the St John Gas Company is asking at the meeting of the St. John City Council The effects of these would be to show it is contemplated using the supply plant of St. John, with the gas holders to be located there, as a temporary supply for Portland, so that as soon as the first main is laid, actual gas connection can be made. The mains of the St. John company are now in actual course of construction and by approaching almost to the city limits they can be ready at any moment to attach to mains laid in Portland.

Henry Hewitt himself spent a consid-

erable time going over Portland last Sunday, when it was definitely learned that he had obtained his majority holding of the franchise stock, and went over the ground with his financial agent and a prominent gas engineer, W. S. Dole, who was formerly connected with the Portland Gas Company. Previous to his connection with Mr. Hewitt, Dole was in charge of Adolph Spreckels' plant at San Francisco, and has also been assistant superintendent of the People's Gas Company, of Chicago. During Mr. Hewitt's visit the three went over a considerable part of St. John and dis-cussed the location of certain mains. Atter that visit it is known that options ases were made in various parts of the city, and in particular sev eral sites in the north end and Wheeler's Addition were secured for the company Admitton were secured to the furthermore, two riverfront' sites on both sides of the river were obtained on short-term option, and if the plans of the proposed company are brought to a consummation, the final purchase will be made almost immediately.

Mr. Hewitt in the deal, has, it is believed, been recently associated with the
group of Seattle capitalists in their recent operations, but it is not definitely
known whether he has induced capital
from that direction to come into the recent operation.

Henry Hewitt, while not being seen in the field himself, has had his agents continually on the spot, W. S. Dole spending practically the whole of today at St. John going over the situation. Mr. Dole also visited and examined in greater detail the tracts which it is known the company hold options on.

## Company Means Business.

Had these recent operations been in the hands of a minor group of capitalists, it might be believed the project had been got together with the sole idea of in-ducing the Portland Gas Company to purchase the franchise and then of allowing chase the franchise and then of anowing it to lapse. Instead of this, however, the taxes, amounting to over \$500, were recently paid in cash at Salem and the State license was duly paid. This business procedure, it is thought, is a direct indication that the manufacture of gas on a large scale will be started by Hewitt and bit assertions. and his associates, With regard to the St. John plant,

Company reduced ago the Portland Gas Company reduced its gas rates to the present standard, and this change, it is said, was brought about by the possibility of opposition under the present franchise. G. Tomasini, of 329 Hancock street, former ascretary of the Economy Gas Company. While Tomasini had only a small holding in the company, he declined to state what consideration he had received. While he stated that the company was capitalized at \$1,000,000, the assessable capital actually amounted to several thousand dollars. He had sold, he said, without any idea of the gas operation now being closed.

B. S. Pague, an attorney in the Oregonian building, stated that he had had a fifth interest in the concern. "Myself and some very strong friends now own the controlling interest in what is known as the Independent Gas Company," said Henry Hewitt, Jr., tonight. "I made a deal for it lately and we think we have a pretty good thing. The Portland company claims to hold title under a franchise, but we think its franchise ran out 20 years ago.

"The charter for our company was given by vote of the people. It required a bond, which was filed, but which the city did not accept. The bond was perfectly good. A small amount of work was done under the charter and then stopped. I have looked the thing up and think the company's rights are valid and would not have bought a controlling interest did I not think so and were I not prepared to go ahead. I own a lot of coal lands on the Northern Pacific and on the Cowilitz, and on Coos Say, and expect to use the coal to make gas. We are making our plans to go ahead and the business otherwise we would not

expect to use the coal to make gas. We are making our plans to go ahead and do business, otherwise we would not have gone into it at all."

Henry Hewitt, Jr., is probably the largest individual owner of timber lands in the West, and is a multi-millionaire. He the West, and is a milit-militonaire. 
