WANT FIRE PROTECTION—A special meeting of the Waverly-Richmond Improvement Club was held at the home of M. J. Morse, East Twelfth and Third streets, Tuesday night, to consider the matter of securing fire protection. John P. Sharkey was present and offered to lead the club to the fire block 27, near the Baby Hotel, where a building costing \$500 was erected and equipped with fire apparatus. It was decided that as Mr. Sharkey was donating a lot located on a high elevation and in every way suitable, that the club should provide the building and apparatus, as the district is taxed to provide fire protection for other sections of the city. Hence the proposition that the citizens erect the building was dropped. A committee of five with Allan R. Joy as chairman, was appointed to take up the matter of erecting this building at once with the City Council. A large and growing district is concerned in this movement to secure an enginehouse and fire engine.

TO CONSTITUTE GAMBLING LAW—Construction of the city ordinance relating to playing cards and other games for drinks and cigars is to be made this week by Municipal Judge Van Zant. The ordinance has been questioned in a demurrer filed against the complaint in the cases of a dozen men arrested sometime ago for gambling at the Erickson place. The complaint charges that they played games of chance for drinks and merchandise. The ordinance prohibits gambling for "money, checks, credits or other representatives of value." It is known that the case has been narrowed down to a matter of interpretation of the clause "representatives of value." It is contended by Attorney Moody, who filed the demurrer, yesterday, that the phrase reverts to the conjunctive clause "money, checks or credits," and that accordingly playing cards for barroom wares is no offense.

FRANCIS WILLARD MEMORIAL—An interesting Francis Willard memorial service was held by Central W. C. T. U. Wednesday afternoon. In the absence of Miss Townsend, an informal service was held, each one responding to the roll call, and speaking of the help derived from the life and written words of Francis Willard. A good number were present, and an inspiring meeting held. Mention was made of a missionary rally to be held at East Tenth and Grant streets, the hour from 10 to 11 A. M. to be occupied by the W. C. T. U. Next week's meeting will be devoted to monthly reports of officers and superintendents, and also a programme on literature in charge of Mrs. S. C. Poincy.

WILL EXTEND GAS MAINS—It is announced that the Portland Gas Company will extend a large main to Sellwood and probably erect a reservoir there this summer. Also an agent is canvassing Milwaukie with a view to extending the gas mains to that place. He informed the Milwaukie Council that the company would ask for a franchise if enough people would take gas for light and fuel to warrant the expense. Cost of the Sellwood and Milwaukie extensions will be about \$25,000.

THIS ENGINE FOR MOUNT SCOTT—A strong pull is being made to make up the amount required to purchase a chemical fire engine for the Mount Scott district. Frank P. Shaugnessy, member of the committee, said that enough money will probably be raised so that the engine can be secured next week. A full report of the progress made will be submitted at the meeting of the Mount Scott Push Club next Monday night.

The funeral of Thomas H. Woodruff, a native-born Oregonian, was held yesterday afternoon at the Portland Crematorium, and was attended by relatives and friends. Mr. Woodruff died at the home of his son, Robert W. Woodruff, 1604 East Sixteenth street.

What Schmitt Says.

"After the arguments he first sentenced me to pay a fine of \$2, and he confined in the County Jail until I paid it," said Schmitt. "He then left the bench, and conferred with Attorney McKee and Bolise in his chambers, returning in about five minutes to pass a second sentence. He discovered that he had exceeded his authority, and so he sentenced me to serve nine days in the County Jail. The limit of his authority to sentence or to extend a fine of \$2 would be imposed and that Schmitt would be sent to jail until he paid it. He finally decided, however, that nine days in the County Jail would be the proper penalty."

WILL FIGHT OLSON

Nine Days in Jail Obnoxious to Lawyer Schmitt.

SENTENCED FOR CONTEMPT

Justice Court Squabble Over Case Involving \$25 May Arouse "Recall" From Its Present State of "Innocuous Desuetude."

Nine days in the County Jail for contempt of court was the judicial lot of John Hay Schmitt, an attorney, by Justice of the Peace Fred L. Olson yesterday afternoon. Schmitt refused, in the face of the court's order, to produce \$25 which had been awarded him previously in a default case. The attorney declared last night that he will invoke the recall on Olson. He said that the main reason he will have a petition in circulation for that purpose. As a result of his determined stand on what he terms principle, Schmitt may yet have to spend nine days of his life in one of Sheriff Stevens' metal enclosures. He served notice of his intention of taking an appeal, and a writ of detention yesterday. Judge Olson allowed him to go on his own recognizance pending the outcome of the case on appeal. If Schmitt loses, he will have to do time.

The attorney contends that when a suit is brought to issue and a default judgment is given the court has no authority to require the return of the money paid on the return of judgment. Judge Olson insisted that he has that authority.

Small Sum Involved.

The action involves but \$25. Mike Janovics sued W. Thompson, a saloon-keeper, some time ago for that amount. The saloon man refused to pay, and J. T. McKee to defend his interests. Schmitt pressed Janovics' claim. On the date set for hearing the Thompson lawyers failed to show up. Schmitt was allowed a default judgment. At the same time the sum of \$25 that had been turned over to the Constable pending the outcome of the suit was turned over to Schmitt, who retained his fee and paid what was left to his client.

Some days later the Thompson lawyers showed up and asked that the case be reopened. Upon their showing this was done, the judgment was set aside and Schmitt was notified to return the \$25. He failed to do so, and a citation was issued directing that he appear in court at 3 P. M. yesterday and show cause why he should not be fined for contempt of court.

Schmitt appeared to say that his client was out of work and could not pay up. As to disgorging the money back of his own pocket, he said he did not intend to do that. He was offered 30 days in which to produce the money, but didn't seem inclined to take any more time. At first Olson said that a fine of \$2 would be imposed and that Schmitt would be sent to jail until he paid it. He finally decided, however, that nine days in the County Jail would be the proper penalty.
