DESIRE TO LAY LATERALS—The Waverly-Richmond Improvement Club will take up the question of laying lateral sewers to the meeting which will be held tomorrow night, at the home of E. Palmer, 533 East Forty-first street. Councilman Rushlight has been asked to attend this meeting and give information to the best method of proceeding. The big sewer conduits of the Brooklyn district have been completed, but has not been accepted. A large number of property owners in the thickly settled portion of the district are anxious to start circulation of petitions for sewers with hope of making connections with the main conduits. Another matter also is coming up in connection with the sewer question. A large portion of the Mount St. Helens district will be part of the city in July, and will be included in the Brooklyn sewer district. The question is raised whether this territory should not be assessed to help pay for the system in which that territory must finally drain its sewerage.

PLANTING MANY ROSES—M. C. Van Tyne, secretary of the Peninsula Rose Development League, reports that hundreds of new choice roses are being ordered through him. The league has supplied arrangement with growers to supply 2-year-old bushes at a low figure. The 2-year-old bushes will produce roses this year and a 3-year-old bush will have more than twice as many roses this year as last. The Rose Culture Club, with Mrs. A. B. Stone as president, is encouraging rose culture. Meetings are being held every Tuesday evening when talks on rose raising are made. F. V. Holman will lecture before the club tomorrow evening in the Peninsula house on Albina and Killingsworth avenues. Mr. Holman will tell the people how to plant roses and how to cultivate them so as to obtain the best results. All residents on the Peninsula are invited to attend this meeting.

LECTURES ON THE PHILIPPINES—Irving Hart, lecturer yesterday morning in the Montavilla Methodist church on "Missionary Work in the Philippines." In connection with his address there was placed on exhibition a great array of curios showing the products of the people. Mr. Hart is the manager of the Methodist publishing-house in Manila, and hence enjoyed exceptional advantage in gathering information. For nine years he was a soldier, a civil employee and a worker in the missionary cause. He spoke of the remarkable growth of the people of the Philippines and said the Methodist publishing-house is turning out Bibles, tracts and other publications amounting last year to \$200,000 folio pages. According to his address the Philippines are making excellent progress.

WANT CARLINE EXTENDED—People of Fairview and Troutdale and those living along Columbia Slough are petitioning for extension of the Rose City carline. The present branch to the Rose City line does not afford the district satisfactory transportation to Portland. It takes an hour and 25 minutes to make the trip by that route, whereas if the Rose City line was extended the people could reach Portland within 40 minutes. There has long been talk of extending the Maravilla line, but that was before the Rose City line was built. If extended, the Rose City line will follow the Columbia Slough district direct to Fairview.

GITTINGS FAMILY IN WANT—But for the assistance given by Probation Officer John Teuscher yesterday, Mrs. Gittings, widow of Policeman Gittings, who lives in North Albina with her four children, would have suffered from hunger. Mr. Teuscher took to Mrs. Gittings' home a basket filled with provisions yesterday afternoon, which was most opportune, as there was only a single loaf of bread in the house. The supplies furnished will only last two days, when the family will again be in actual want for food. Mrs. Gittings is kept at home with her baby and cannot go out to work. But for her immediate neighbors, she and her children would starve. Mr. Teuscher expressed the hope that relief will be afforded the family and that out of the abundance of the land this widow and her children should be fed. The police of the city finisher her home in and rendered her substantial assistance by giving her a cow and chickens, but the cow has since died. The family has no means of support whatever.
