

NEGRO TO LITIGATE HIS OWN TERMS

Johnson Will Fight Jeffries, but Wants Winner's and Loser's End.

IN NO FEAR OF JEFFRIES

Johnson, With White Wife, Arrives at Victoria—Insists He's Champion and That Pugilists Must See Him.

VICTORIA, B. C., March 9.—Jack Johnson and his white wife, former Philadelphia woman, who threw in her lot with him after the fight in Sydney, and Sam Fitzpatrick, who is no longer manager of the big black champion, having split with him, arrived this morning by the Canadian-Australian liner Makura from Sydney. Johnson unreservedly declared his willingness to meet Jeffries or any other man.

"I am willing to meet Jeffries; I am willing to meet any man in the world, and I don't think anyone can get a decision over me, much less put me out. It amuses me to hear this talk of Jeffries claiming the championship. Why, when a Mayor leaves office, he's an ex-Mayor, isn't he? Well, when a champion leaves the ring, he's an ex-champion. That's Jeffries. He wants to try to get the championship back, and I'm willing to take him on."

"No, I'm not making any restrictions. What's the matter, though, in the talk of arrangements of a fight with Jeffries, saying something about what Johnson will take? In all the notices I have seen, it's all what Jeffries will take. What's the matter with what Johnson will take? I'm the champion, ain't I? I want a winner and loser's end. I don't care what it is—40 or 45 or 50 or 60—but there's got to be a winner and loser's end. That's how it was with Burns. I knew I could get him, and I followed him around the world before I got on with him at Sydney, and did it to show the people that I could do it. If Jeffries wants a 40 or 45 or 50 or 60, I'll go to see me, and there's got to be a winner's and loser's end."

Signs With Theatrical Troupe.

It is doubtful, according to the arrangements made by Johnson, whether any fight could be brought on with Jeffries, Ketchel, or any other man within six months. While his plans are not absolute, he hinted at willingness to change them if anything of the kind came up. Johnson signed with the Oxford and Paragon syndicate in England for the London baffle and after an English tour, to tour France and Germany.

Johnson will leave the Makura at Vancouver and proceed tomorrow morning to Chicago, arriving there Saturday. He will continue his journey to Galveston on Monday, arriving at his Texas home on Wednesday.

When his attention was drawn to the Galveston dispatch announcing the formation of a committee to arrange a parade and reception at Galveston, his eyes sparkled and he showed his gold-tipped teeth with that now historical grin and said:

"Tell them I'll be there."

Asked whether he intended to arrange a match with Burns, Johnson said he said everything depended on the offering. It was doubtful, though, if anything could be brought off until after his theatrical tour.

Johnson was much interested in Jeffries' condition. A San Francisco writer who met him on his arrival was asked in this regard as follows: "Can Jeffries get into shape?" Johnson inquired, and only a shrug of the shoulders greeted the query. Next moment Johnson replied with emphasis to a local interviewer:

"I'm willing to fight Jeffries or any other man."

Won't Talk of \$12,000 Offer.

Johnson was asked regarding the story told in New York by George Backlund, an Australian sporting man, that before the fight at Sydney, Johnson and his manager, Fitzpatrick, received an offer of \$12,000 in cash to throw the fight with Burns, but that they turned the proposition down cold. The colored champion said:

"I don't think that's right. I don't know what they might have wanted to do, but you see they were afraid to come near me, and—well, I don't think that is right."

"Did you go into the Melbourne Hospital as a charity patient?" Johnson was asked.

"Well, it was this way: I had some boils on my neck, and kind of thought the Melbourne Hospital the best place to go, but I could not go there as a charity patient. Why, I drove there in my motor-car."

"Did you pay for the treatment?"

"Why, no; it was a free hospital, wasn't it? And anyhow I felt I was entitled to go there, for I was paying an income tax of \$10, that's \$50 a week on the \$250 I was getting a week for my theatrical work. Tommy Burns was getting more, but he had more pictures. He was getting \$250 a week. I kind of thought the income tax was sufficient to pay for what I got at the hospital. I offered to pay the doctor anything but he wouldn't take my money. Then I wanted to send him some silk box, but he wouldn't take them. I told him that I made America worth millions went to public hospitals, but he didn't seem to understand. Australia has no reason to complain about me, though. I have paid my income tax all due time and I raised a good deal of money for various charities while in Sydney. Yes, there was some discussion by the hospital people and something got in the papers."

On the way from Australia, Johnson took part in two concerts on board, being warmly applauded. At night, on the bass violin, and often at night, where the rolling of the steamer was not so much to make him indisposed for Johnson admits that he felt a little decision over him a couple of times—he was heard practicing on his violin. He admitted that he intended giving some selections at church entertainments in Australia.

And They Liked Tommy Best.

"I'm a church man, belong to the Methodist Church, but they didn't seem to have much use for a colored man in the Methodist church in that little Australia. They are good sports, though. They treated me fine and I've got no kick coming. Even on the square, they seemed to think more of Tommy Burns after I had licked him, giving him such a licking as anybody ever had, than they did of me, and me the champion. That was a funny thing about the singing competition in Shakespeare books and the 'Pillgrim's Progress,' but on the level, I do read Shakespeare."

Fitzpatrick, when asked about his split with Johnson, said it had begun soon after the fight. "Johnson was a different man before the fight," he said. "He

would feed out of the hand then, but he is a hard man to handle now," said Fitzpatrick. "We decided to split up soon after the Makura left. Anyhow, he doesn't want a manager now. He has got Mrs. Johnson as his manager."

When Johnson was in Australia an Australian paper printed a story about his intended marriage with an Oakland woman, who entered suit against the paper and got a verdict for \$7500.

After his theatrical engagement in Europe, Johnson will return to the United States.

Mrs. Jack Johnson, who was Nellie O'Brien, of Philadelphia, arrived with the colored champion from Australia. She says she is very proud of her dark husband and thinks he is the greatest man in the world. She was very much disappointed at not being permitted to see the fight at Sydney, but contented herself with the statement that, anyhow, Mrs. Burns didn't see it, either.

JEFFRIES REFUSES TO REPLY
"Nothing to Say" When Johnson's Interview Is Read.

NEW YORK, March 9.—When James J. Jeffries was seen tonight at the theater where he is playing a vaudeville engagement and shown the Associated Press interview with Jack Johnson, in which the negro champion declared himself ready and willing to meet Jeffries, "or any man in the world," the big fellow grinned and said nothing.

The Victoria dispatch was read to Jeffries a paragraph at a time with the loud pedal on the part of it which had to do with the reference to him, but after each paragraph the big Californian rubbed his chin and muttered: "Nothing to say."

When the part of the interview was read in which Johnson declared talk of Jeffries still being champion tired him, Jeffries laughed. The parallel drawn between an ex-mayor and ex-champion of the negro fighter also elicited a chuckle, but when Jeffries was asked to dilate on the point, he refused, reiterating his stereotyped, "nothing to say."

The possibility of a match being arranged between Johnson and Ketchel aroused Jeffries, however. He had a passage read to him twice and then remarked:

"Why, Ketchel is a little bit of a fellow."

"You do not consider it likely, then?" Jeffries was asked, "that Johnson and Ketchel will ever be matched?"

"I don't know," he replied, "and I don't care. I have refused to say anything concerning that party and I am not going to say anything except when I get good and ready."

"By that party you mean Johnson?"

It was then explained to the retired champion that his persistence in allowing his attitude in the matter of a match between Johnson and Ketchel to remain unexpressed would encourage the negro champion to issue pronouncements and challenges at every stopping place. To this Jeffries remarked:

"Let him."

The news of a parade being held in Galveston in honor of Johnson drew an impulsive reply from Jeffries. He checked himself, however, and his grin became a sneer.

PLAN MATCH WITH JEFFRIES
Promoters Try to Engineer Bill Allowing Fight at Omaha.

OMAHA, Neb., March 9.—Arrangements are now under way here for a fight between Jeffries and Jack Johnson, the fight to take place in Omaha for a purse of \$100,000. James Coffroth and Martin Brady, of San Francisco, and Dan Brady, of Omaha, are engineering the contract portion of the deal and Jabez Cross, of Omaha, is attending to the Omaha end, which includes the passage of a bill by the Legislature permitting boxing in this state. Already this bill has been prepared and is now being introduced.

The Californians will be in Omaha April 1 to close the deal, if the bill passes the Legislature. Because of the central location of Omaha, the promoters have the largest fight crowd ever gathered can be brought here if the laws will permit the exhibition. As planned now, the contract will call for a 40-round boxing contest.

Jeff Accused of Prizefighting.
NEW YORK, March 9.—A summons was served today on J. J. Jeffries, relating to the prizefighting charges against him and another on James Solly, manager of the theater where Jeffries is appearing, directing them to appear in Police Court tomorrow to explain an alleged violation of the law in a sparring act on the stage of the theater, in violation of the anti-prizefighting law.

It is expected that the entries will be doubled this year, and already a number of handsome trophies have been offered the club.

FEEL RACE STRAIN

Fifteen Teams Collapse in Six-Day Grind in New York.

FRENCHMEN HOLD BIG LEAD

Foreigners Are Eleven Miles in Advance of Rivals—Irish Team Shows Great Pluck and Perseverance.

NEW YORK, March 10.—Clot and Orphee, the French team, were still leading the international go-as-you-please race Madison Square Garden at 3 o'clock this morning. They had scored 298 miles 6 laps, the Irish team being second with 283 miles 6 laps, the lead of their nearest competitors, Davis and Metkus. The latter succeeded late today in passing Dineen and Prouty, the early leaders in the race and several hours later Feegan and Curtis, the Irish team, did likewise.

The veteran Dineen plainly showed the wear of the first day's effort to retain the lead and experts would not be surprised were he forced to retire. Clot and Orphee, the leaders, had scored 293 miles 6 laps at midnight, which is 4 miles and 6 laps behind the record of 298 miles 2 laps for 48 hours, made in 1902.

Davis and Metkus covered 275 miles 3 laps; Feegan and Curtis, 270 miles 3 laps; and Dineen and Prouty, 268 miles 2 laps at the end of the forty-eight hour.

MARATHON ON ROLLER SKATES
Novel Speed Contest Is Planned for Thursday Night.

The Marathon roller skating fever has struck all of the larger cities in the country, and now Portland is falling in line and a big race will be pulled off this week. The Marathon roller skating race will start Thursday night at 7:30, from the corner of Third and Morrison streets, the course being Third to Washington and up Washington to the Exposition Rink. At the rink, three minutes will be allowed to the racers to change their skates and to freshen the race.

The general public will be permitted to skate and watch the race at the same time. The roller Marathon is most interesting owing to the speed and tactics. Then, too, it does not require a great length of time for the roller skater to cover the entire distance of 26 miles.

There are about 18 entries in the race and it is purely amateur. The prizes to be given will be loving cups. The smooth city pavements will permit some very good speed to be made in the race and the starting scramble promises to be real exciting. The race inside the rink is ten laps to a mile and the racers will have to skate about 26 miles to cover the remainder of the Marathon distance.

PLAN NEW RIFLE MATCHES
Two New Events to Be Added to Annual American Contest.

WASHINGTON, March 9.—Arrangements were perfected today with the authorities for holding the annual matches of the National Rifle Association of America at Camp Perry, Ind., immediately following the National Rifle Association meet at August 27. The new matches were added to the programme, one for annual members and one for individual rapid fire.

The executive committee at its meeting last night accepted the offer of Colonel John Jacob Astor of a trophy for the interscholastic rifle championship match to be kept in competition 30 years and then given to the school winning it the most times.

Fifteen universities and colleges have entered in the interscholastic indoor athletic match to be held March 15 to 27 and about 20 schools teams have entered in the interscholastic indoor championship match in April.

DEMPSEY FUND ABANDONED
RELATIVES OBJECT TO SUBSCRIPTION MONUMENT.

Present Shaft Thought Sufficient and Project of Raising Another Will Be Dropped.

Because the relatives of the late Jack Dempsey object to the further marking of his grave, the subscription started yesterday by John S. Barnes and headed by a contribution of \$100 by John L. Sullivan will be dropped at their request.

M. J. Brady, brother-in-law of the deceased "Nonpareil," took up the matter of the proposed erection of a larger monument on the grave of the well-known fighter with the friends of the deceased and when he explained to them that the grave was well kept and while he regrets that the money cannot be used for this purpose, he expressed himself as cordially agreeing with the wishes of Dempsey's relatives.

"I had no idea of displacing Dempsey's family," said John L. Sullivan last night. "When I learned that my old-time friend, John S. Barnes, had decided to circulate a petition to erect a handsome monument to Jack Dempsey, I thought it a good idea and voluntarily contributed \$100 towards such a fund. Naturally, I had no idea the late Jack Dempsey's relatives would object, and am highly pleased to learn that his last resting place is well taken care of and marked by a suitable headstone. My friend was made in token of the high esteem in which I have held him and in memory of Jack Dempsey, and I am very sorry to have been the cause of any slight to my friend's family."

John S. Barnes, when he was apprised that the relatives of the Nonpareil were averse to permitting another monument to be raised, coincided with the views in every particular, and expressed his intention of calling on Mr. Brady and explaining his action in proposing the monument. Mr. Barnes stated he was not aware that any of the late pugilist's relatives were still living here, and is pleased to note that his close friend's grave is being properly cared for.

OAKLAND, Cal., March 9.—Fanatic, the clearest three-year-old in the country, stable beat Booger Red a nose in the Stinson Handicap at Emeryville today. The finish was one of the closest of the season and aroused much attention. Booger Red and Smiley Corbett were the pacemakers, with Pajoorita in close attendance. Fanatic closed fast the last quarter and he and Booger Red fought it out for a sixteenth of a mile. Pajoorita was third.

\$1000 FOR PRIZEFIGHTS
Nevada Solons Adopt Graduate License Fees for "Manly Sport."

CARSON CITY, Nev., March 9.—The lower house of the Nevada Legislature today passed a bill providing for a graduated license for prizefighting. A state license, costing \$1000 will be required for unlimited rounds; \$500 for 25 rounds and \$250 for 20 rounds.

Where athletic associations give boxing exhibitions the license will be \$5, but no admission fee can be charged.

Young Team Smashes Into Big Bowl at Sixth and Ankeny.

SALEMAN, March 9.—(Special.)—The foreign firm of the late Robert Denham Hume, cameraman and shipowner, who died at Wedderburn, Or., January 25 last, was offered for probate in the Superior Court yesterday by Mary C. Hume, the widow, and Charles H. Warner, administrators of the estate, which is valued at between \$400,000 and \$500,000. A month ago the estate was broken into a number of fragments when Turtledove drove his team and wagon against it.

The fountain is one of the most valued properties of the society and it is estimated that it was worth \$100,000. It was presented to the city by Edwin Lee Ensign, of New York. It was erected at the Humane Society's expense. Its value was considerably over \$200,000.
