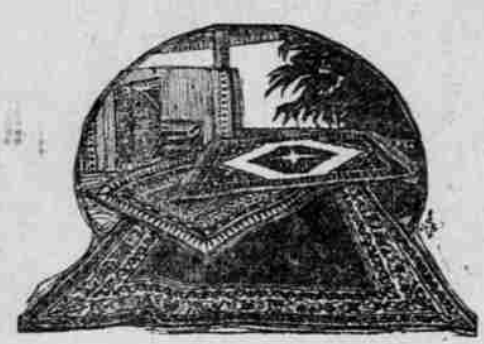

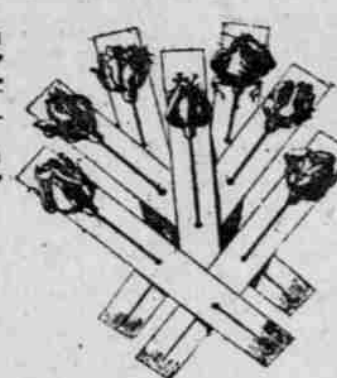

**TAFT IS HOPEFUL**

Promises Optimist Administration of Country.

WRITING TARIFF MESSAGE

Will Be Brief and Pointed, Urging Necessity of Revision and More Revenue—Carnegie Visits White House.

WASHINGTON, March 11.—President Taft said today that his would be an optimistic Administration to an optimistic country, full of hope, cheerfulness and confidence. The President expressed this sentiment when he became a full-fledged member of the Optimist Club of America on the invitation of its founder, William J. Robinson, of New York. Mr. Robinson, an optimist-at-large, named Mr. Taft a member of the club's executive committee. Andrew Carnegie is president of the organization. Mr. Taft declined with regret an invitation extended by Mr. Robinson to attend the club's first annual banquet in New York on March 31. The Optimist Club has a membership of 25,000, including men prominent in every walk of life. It was launched in November, 1867, at Salt Lake City. Mr. Taft began work today on his message, which is to go to the extra session of Congress on Tuesday next, according to the present plans. It is understood the message will deal only with the tariff revision and the general subject of revenue raising. Mr. Taft has indicated that he will ask Congress to confine its labors at the extra session exclusively to this subject. The message will not go into details regarding specific schedules. It will be brief and lay great stress on the necessity for prompt action.

Carnegie Calls on Taft. Andrew Carnegie was a caller at the White House today, coming, he said, to pay his respects to the President. "I wish President Taft a memorable Administration, and I think he will have it," said Mr. Carnegie. Major-General Hoad, Inspector-General of the commonwealth military forces of Australia, also paid his respects to the President.

TAFT REWARDS EARLY FRIEND

Man Who "Spoke" for Him to Harrison Made Federal Judge. CINCINNATI, March 11.—An interesting story is related here in connection with the announcement of the appointment of Attorney John W. Warrington as the late Judge J. K. Richards' successor on the United States Circuit bench. According to this story, Warrington received a telegram from President Harrison who had chosen him for the Federal bench. Warrington declined the honor and asked President Harrison why he did not appoint "Will" Taft. President Harrison did so and from the date of that appointment Taft has been in the Government service. Warrington received a telegram from President Taft yesterday informing him of his appointment as Judge Richards' successor.

Yale Men to Dine Taft.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., March 11.—President Taft has signified his intention of being present at the March meeting of the Yale Corporation, of which he is a Fellow, which will be held on Friday, March 19. This evening President Taft will be the guest of the Alumni of New York City at a banquet. More than a thousand of the Yale Alumni will be present.

BALLINGER MAKES CHANGES. Appoints Several Officials in Interior Department.

WASHINGTON, March 11.—In line with his policy to reorganize the work of the Interior Department, Secretary Ballinger today made a number of changes in the personnel. These include the appointment of Clement S. Ucker, of Ohio, chief of the contest division and administrative officer of the General Land Office, to be clerk of the department in succession to Edward M. Dawson, of Maryland, who was appointed assistant attorney of the department. John W. Holcombe and James I. Parker, both of Indiana, were appointed assistants to the secretary. Harold N. Clarke, of New York, was appointed an electrical engineer in the general survey at \$2000 a year.

SCOTT FAVORS TARIFF HASTE

Senator Would Have Both Houses Discuss Bill at Once. WASHINGTON, March 11.—Senator Scott of West Virginia has a plan for expediting the disposition of the new tariff bill in the Senate. Appreciating the disposition of his colleagues to discuss measures at length and having knowledge of the anxiety of the business world to dispose of the tariff at the earliest practicable date, he would have the question discussed while the bill is still under consideration in the House. His plan is to have some one offer in the Senate a resolution making a declaration on the tariff question as soon as the Senate meets next

Monday, and he says that this measure could be used as a basis for any number of speeches, as it could be kept before the Senate indefinitely.

Mr. Scott argues that if this method should be adopted the great bulk of the speeches in the Senate could be worked off before the bill reaches the Senate and thus several weeks of time be saved. Mr. West Virginia Senator is convinced that any revision of the tariff will be injurious, but probably will not obstruct action.

Henry May Make First Motion.

WASHINGTON, March 11.—Representative Henry, of Texas, today asked permission of Speaker Cannon to introduce the first measure in the 61st Congress, a joint resolution seeking to amend the constitution so as to change the date of inauguration from March 4 to April 20. He is called W. H. T. Olles.

BLOW TO SUFFRAGISTS

Minnesota House Turns Down Two Bills in Their Favor. ST. PAUL, March 11.—In the House today a vote on the bill providing for the plan of referendum at the next general election, when women themselves were to be allowed to vote on the suffrage question, was indefinitely postponed. A bill proposing a constitutional amendment allowing women to vote was defeated.

WHO KILLED PRIEST?

Newark Police Have Nine Suspects, No Evidence.

MURDER LONG PLANNED

Threats Made at Meetings of Mail contents and Man Seen to Lie in Wait for Ansoin in His Church. NEWARK, N. J., March 11.—The efforts of the entire police force have so far been unavailing in getting any tangible clue to the murderers of Father Ansoin, who was shot and killed yesterday in the rectory of St. Stanislaus Polish Catholic Church, of which he was pastor. Another arrest was made today, making nine men who have been taken into custody on suspicion, but none of them, as far as known, has thrown any light on the mystery. The police learned today that for a long time past the apartment of a woman near the rectory had been the meeting-place of a number of Poles after mass on Sunday and that threats against the priest's life had been overheard at these meetings. Antino Sewzytzka, the housekeeper who was shot, was so much improved

today that the nine suspects may be taken before her today. Through a story told them today by 11-year-old Dorothy Gornack, the police became convinced that Father Ansoin's slayers had been lying in wait for him more than a week. The girl said that, while in the church on Tuesday, March 2, she had seen a man hiding behind a pillar. As Father Duga, assistant to Father Ansoin, entered the church, the man scrutinized the priest closely and then quietly left the building. Father Duga confirmed the girl's story, having noticed the man behind the pillar. That threats against Father Ansoin had been made by members of a society connected with his church at a meeting held Sunday night in the church basement was stated today by Mrs. Adam Sampson. She said her husband had overheard the threats.

NOTED FAMILIES TO JOIN

Daughter of "Fighting" McCooks to Wed Peter A. Jay.

NEW YORK, March 11.—(Special.)—In preparation for his coming marriage on March 16 to Miss Susan Alexander McCook, a daughter of Colonel John J. McCook, of the famous family of "fighting" McCooks, Peter Augustus Jay, First Secretary of the American Embassy at Tokio, today took out a license at the City Hall. Mr. Jay gave his home address at Newport, R. I., and that of his intended bride as 10 West Fifty-fourth street.

Mr. Jay graduated from Harvard in the class of 1900. Not long afterward he was sent to Tokio as secretary to the embassy there. He is 31 years old, while his fiancée is several years his junior.

Judge Day Declines Place.

the position of Under-Secretary of State, today said it is his intention to remain with the Equitable Life Assurance Society.

STEEL PUDDLERS HAPPIER

Scale Advanced 12 1-2 Cents a Ton for Two Months.

YOUNGSTOWN, O., March 11.—The wages of puddlers were advanced 12 1/2 cents per ton by the terms of the bi-monthly settlement between the mill operators and Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers in Pittsburgh today. The puddling rate is now \$5.27 1/2. Finishers are given a 1 per cent advance. The new rate is for the month of March and April, and about 10,000 men are affected.
