## DUNNE STILL TALKS

### Counsel for O. & C. May Not Conclude Argument Today.

### DECLARES TITLE PASSED

### Contents Railroad's Manner of Handling Land Grant Clearly Shows It Acted in Good Faith.

It is possible that Peter F. Dunne, counsel for the Oregon & California Railroad Company, may not conclude his argument in support of the company's demurrer to the Government's complaint in the celebrated land-grant suit, being argued before United States Judge W. L. Vernon in the Federal Court, before noon today, when court will adjourn until 10 o'clock Monday morning. Mr. Dunne spoke all day yesterday and vigorously assailed the contentions of the Government and the intervenors as well.

Mr. Dunne supplemented at considerable length the argument of his associate, W. D. Fenton, and maintained that the grant was on present by which title to the land passed from the Government to the railroad company by the express terms of the act of Congress in July, 1868. Counsel contended that, under the terms of the grant itself and the conditions prevailing in Oregon, which was then a new country sparsely settled, the railroad company had the paramount right of mortgaging the property. It was contended that the company acted clearly within its rights when it mortgaged the property to secure the funds necessary for the construction of the road.

Having so hypothesized the property, Mr. Dunne insisted that the railroad company was not in a position to give to any one but to others an unincumbered title to any land that might be acquired by purchase. Counsel referred to the Government's bill of complaint, which admitted that all of the proceeds from such sales had been applied toward the payment of the mortgage, which in itself established the fact beyond contradiction that the railroad company had acted in good faith.

Mr. Dunne took the position that, if the act of April, 1869, was in reality a condition subsequent, it contemplated that the land should be disposed of as a condition incident to the construction of the railroad as proposed by the company receiving the grant. But, insisted counsel, that condition became inoperative and lost its force after 1889, when the road required to be constructed was completed and accepted. ## GIRL DID NOT RUN AWAY

### Father Unduly Alarmed About Miss Schacht (Not Miss Sharpe).

Through inadvertent error the report was published Thursday morning that Alice Sharpe, the young daughter of W. J. Sharpe, living at the head of Jefferson street, had wandered away from home and that after a search by her parents had been found in the back yard of her home, supposedly suffering from the effects of some poison.

The missing girl proved to be Lila Schacht, the 15-year-old daughter of Emil Schacht, a well-known architect in the city, and not Miss Sharpe, as stated. The disappearance of Miss Schacht was reported to the police by her father in person, who said that owing to a false accusation brought against her by one of her school mates his daughter had grown a little despondent and had left a note for him intimating that she might not come back home. A description of the girl was given the police.

Later a telephone message was received at the police station supposedly from the Schacht residence, saying that the girl had been found in the back yard of the house, and it was believed that she had taken something. This, however, appears also to be erroneous, as Mrs. Schacht said last night that her daughter had merely spent the evening away from home and that her father had grown unnecessarily anxious about her, and that a wrong impression of her absence was adduced by the police through the report.

## Fred DeSantis Brought Back.

Fred DeSantis, formerly an ice cream cone manufacturer, at 614 Front street, was brought to this city Thursday night from Huntington, Or., in the custody of Detective Crodlock and lodged in the City Jail under a charge of having obtained money under false pretenses. DeSantis had been taken on a train bound for Salt Lake City, where he had started in company with his wife and child. His apprehension was effected on telegraphic request made by the Chief of Police of Portland. The complainants against DeSantis are J. H. Bader & Son, second-hand dealers, who accuse DeSantis of having sold them furniture from his apartments, 600 Third street, for which they paid him \$50 and to which he had not acquired title.
