WORKISPOSTPONED

Mount Hood Road Held Up by Property-Owners.

PRICES SAID TO BE HIGH

General Manager Miller Asserts His Company Will Follow Alternate Survey Rather Than Pay Excessive Charges

Because of the attitude that has been Because of the attitude that has been assumed by property-owners towards the Mount Hood Railway & Power Company the proposed route adopted by that company for the construction of a railroad from this city to the base of Mount Hood may be abandoned. Determination of several pending condemnation suits for right of way across property involved in the proposed route will determine the final course to be followed by the company in constructing its line.

"We do not propose to stand for any hold-up game in the determination of

or rollowed by the company in constructing its line.

"We do not propose to stand for any hold-up game in the determination of these rights of way necessary to the construction of the road over the route that has been proposed," said C. W. Miller, secretary and general manager of the Mount Hood Railway & Power Company, yesterday. "For instance, a jury in the Circuit Court the other day returned a judgment for \$1740 in favor of one property-owner in payment of his claim against the company for 22 of an acre. That is at the rate of over \$8500 an acre. The company does not propose to stand for such a hold-up game as that. We do not propose to pay for suburban property the same prices we can acquire land for in the city and before we will submit to those conditions, we will decide on another route for the construction of our road."

Mr. Miller said the verdicts returned by the different juries in the Circuit Court would be appealed from to the Supreme Court and until those suits finally were determined, the company would not decide on a permanent route to be followed in building its line. He intimated in unmistakable terms that before the company would submit to the payment of excessive assessments for rights of way on land traversed by the original route for the proposed road, it would abandon that route and select another where it would not encounter such discouraging obstacles.

HARRIMAN DEMANDS NO BONUS

Ready to Build Central Oregon Line as Soon as Permitted.

It is denied emphatically, through the local offices of the Harriman system, that the assurance of 4 per cent or any other consideration for the investment is being demanded by the Union Pacific magnate as a condition precedent to the proposed building of a line into Central Oregon. On the contrary, it is said that within a week after the Government removes all obstacles to the construction of the proposed road, the preliminary work incident to its building will be under way. It is asserted with special emphasis that Harriman is acting in the best of good faith in his proposed invasion of the central part of the state. At the same time it is denied that the proposed extension is based on any condition other than the consent of the Government to the conventor of the dition other than the consent of the Gov ernment to the completion of the road

as contemplated.

It will be impossible for the Harriman neople to ascertain their rights over the proposed route for the new road until Supervising Engineer Hopson, of the Reclamation Service, and who has been specially detailed, can make an investigation and report as to the practicability of building a railroad over the proposed route without interfering with reclamation projects. In his investigations, Mr. Hop-son will not confine himself to a con-sideration of the proposed route up the Deschutes, but at the same time will look into the interests of the Government so far as they may be concerned in the other routes for the road which have been under consideration.

Company Wants Assurances.

Light & Power Company expects not later than today to receive advices from the members of the County Commissioners' Court that the Burnside-str bridge has been restored to a safe condi-tion for streetcar traffic. When that as-surance has been received, the operation of cars across that bridge will be resumed.

An explosion of dynamite killed


