. McMurray Wants More Roads.

Mr. McMurray referred to the unprecedented record in the arrival of new settlers in the state and commented on the fact that for the first two weeks the colonist rates were in effect this year, 000 more people entered the state than for the same period a year ago. He commended the "500,000 movement" and said he hoped to see the time when there would be 12 railroads instead of five entering Portland, explaining that the greater the number of railroads, the better it would be for the state.

Ellis G. Hughees was introduced as "always a booster" and entertained the present-day boosters with a recital of what Portland did in the way of raising publicity funds 20 years ago. At that time, he said, the business men of Port-land, when the population did not ex-ceed 55.000, raised \$55.000 in one year for advertising purposes. He was confident the committees that had been appointed could without trouble raise \$200,000 as well as the \$100,000 they had fixed as their goal

"Portland should have the Alaska trade," assorted Mr. Hughes. "This city is nearer Skagway by the outside route than Puget Sound is by the inside route. Harriman is building a railroad from Portland to Seattle, presumably to get a part of that Alaskan trade. If he would put on a line of steamers between this eity and Skagway, there would not be any Alaska trade to be had by Seattle." Discussing the probable population of Portland in 1912. Mr. Hughes predicted that it would surpass the 200,000 mark. "Even if you do nothing to advertise Portland, you will have a population of 200,000 three years from now." he said. C. A. 




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
