The occasion was the opening night of the exhibition of the second annual show of the Portland club, and from expressions heard on every side among the visitors the success of the exhibition was assured from the start.

To undertake a detailed description of the exhibits in limited space would be an impossible task. There are perspectives, wash drawings, interiors, photographs of completed buildings, working plans, studies of notable buildings and grounds in foreign countries, classical examples, art furniture, glass and decorations, exposition buildings, originals from the leading magazines of the country, civic improvement schemes, public buildings, churches, mortuary chapels, ornate park entrances, samples of ornamental terra cotta, carved wood, fountains, schools, banks, office buildings and residences—in fact there is no style of architecture or allied crafts that is not well represented in the exhibition.
