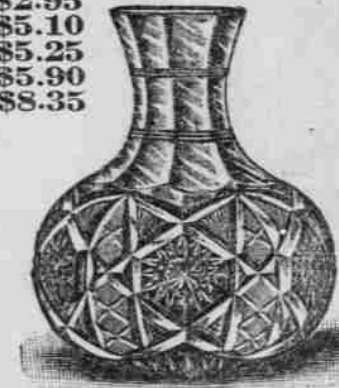

MAKE DRY FARMING TESTS

Thirty Meteorological Stations to Be Established.

WASHINGTON STATE COLLEGE, Pullman, March 31.—(Special).—Thirty "meteorological stations" throughout the so-called dry belt of the State of Washington are to be installed by the state college in the immediate future. The work of installation of apparatus is scheduled to commence in the next few weeks. This will be one of the features of a campaign of co-operative farming and irrigating to be conducted under the direction of the state college in the next two years. The purpose of the meteorological stations is to determine how far out into the dry belt the methods of soil tillage which are being recommended by the experiment station staff will apply. It is the desire of the staff to ascertain the limits to which dry farming may be extended in this country.

TO INCREASE OIL CAPITAL

Standard Plans Recapitalization at \$500,000,000.

NEW YORK, March 31.—It is reported in financial circles here that all preliminary steps have been taken by the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey for the increase of its capitalization from \$100,000,000 to \$500,000,000. The change is prompted by the desire

of those in control of the affairs of the corporation to bring the nominal capital close to value which the shares of the company command in the open market, where the stock is now selling at about 60.

UPRISING PLAN BLOCKED

Russian Police Make 70 Arrests and Quell Revolt.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 31.—The police of St. Petersburg have nipped in the bud a plot to start an uprising in the Caucasus. Yesterday they arrested 70 men, including several army officers, who, as members of a revolutionary organization, were engaged in providing arms, ammunition and funds for the movement. A large number of military rifles and several thousand cartridges destined for the Caucasus fell into the hands of the authorities. The raid was made in the center of the city, in the Nevsky Prospect, where the band already had secret headquarters. The police obtained signed documents betraying all the details of the movement.

Tacoma Wants New Charter.

TACOMA, Wash., March 31.—Strenuous efforts are being made in Tacoma at present to secure a modification of the city charter providing for a commission form of government similar to that in force in Des Moines or Galveston. The project has received general endorsement by the civic bodies of the city and petitions to the City Council are being circulated, calling for an election at which 16 freeholders are to be chosen to remodel the charter.

RIVER WASHES OUT PILES

North Coast Has Trouble Building Bridge Over Columbia.

WALLULA, Wash., March 31.—Work on the North Coast bridge across the Columbia, a short distance below the mouth of the Snake, is being pushed rapidly. Much difficulty is encountered in driving piles. The river bottom is solid rock there, and the piles flatten out and will not stick. A consulting engineer from Seattle is on the ground endeavoring to figure out a remedy for this. Even at this low stage, the water is 41 feet deep and very swift. The original site of the bridge has been abandoned and the approaches are now being constructed about 300 feet further up the river. On this side six bents of the approach are about completed, and piling is going on steadily on both sides and in the center of the river. The center pier will be the first one constructed while the water is at its low stage. About 100 men are now on the payroll, but this number will be quadrupled in a short time.

NO ANTHRACITE STRIKE

Agreement Now in Force Between Miners and Operators to Continue.

NEW YORK, March 31.—The following statement was given out today in behalf of the anthracite coal operators: "At the request of Thomas L. Lewis, who headed the committee of anthracite

mineworkers at the recent conference with the operators at Philadelphia, the operators have agreed to continue the present agreement in force on and after April 1, pending further conferences.

The communication from Mr. Lewis came in the form of a letter to each member of the operators' committee of seven. The members of the committee all replied that the proposed arrangement was acceptable to them."

N. P. MUST PAY \$100,000

Joseph H. Boyd Wins Suit After Many Years' Litigation.

SPOKANE, Wash., March 31.—After litigation extending over 23 years, Joseph H. Boyd, president of the National Iron Works, of this city, has been awarded a judgment of \$100,000 against the Northern Pacific Railway. This judgment has just been handed down by Judge Whitson, in the United States Circuit Court. The case began in 1886, Mr. Boyd suing to recover money advanced by him to the contractor who built the roadbed of the Coeur d'Alene Railway & Navigation Company, between Old Mission, Idaho, and the Coeur d'Alene. Later the company became bankrupt and the property, with the lawsuit, was acquired by the Northern Pacific.

FISH WARDEN IS SHOT AT

Deputy Mack Locates His Man, but Makes No Arrest.

ASTORIA, Or., March 31.—(Special).—Deputy Fish Commissioner Burton, of Washington, and Deputy Warden Mack, of Oregon, who have been patrolling the river since the closed fishing season began, were in the city today and reported that aside from an occasional sunset, there is little, if any, illegal fishing on the river. A couple of days ago, while searching for sculpin near the mouth of the Willamette River, Deputy Mack was shot at from the bank, a rifle bullet passing within a few feet of his head. Mr. Mack went ashore and found the man who did the shooting, but did not have him arrested.

WORK BEGUN ON NEW ROAD

Electric Line Between Centralia and Chehalis to Be Actually.

CENTRALIA, Wash., March 31.—(Special).—A large force of men began work this morning clearing the right of way for a new electric road between this city and Chehalis. The work began about midway between the two places where the road strikes the hillside near Salzer Creek. From this point the work will be carried toward Chehalis at first. The route into Centralia has not been fully decided upon. Work will be hurried so as to have the road in operation for the

that is to be held midway between Centralia and Chehalis this fall.

Centralia to Have Tabernacle.

CENTRALIA, Wash., March 31.—(Special).—All of the churches of the city have united in the building of a tabernacle on Maple street, where the Evangelist Hausdenschield will hold services. The building will seat 2000 people and a choir of 150 singers. The churches of the city proved entirely too small to hold the congregations gathered to hear the speaker, so men, women and children have volunteered their services in putting up a temporary building large enough for the purpose.

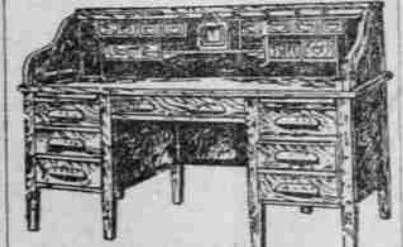
Missing Man Still Lost.
