### RANGERS REBEL AGAINST TAXES

With Temosachic Indians, Fire on Tax Collector and Wound Him.

### SOLDIERS SENT TO SCENE

One Story Has It Trouble Arose From Fight Between Two Families, Leading to Bloodshed. Country Is Called Hotbed.

EL PASO, Tex., March 31.—The Herald this afternoon prints a telegram from Chihuahua declaring that the Temosachic Indians and numerous Mexican farmers in the vicinity of San Antonio, Chihuahua, are in open rebellion against the state government because of the levying of a 3-cent daily tax on all work oxen and horses. The tax aroused the ire of native ranchers who owned little farms in the valleys.

The telegram states that in desperation the farmers of the surrounding country wounded the tax collector and several of his followers when an attempt was made by the officials to confiscate property for the nonpayment of taxes.

Troops Rushed to Scene. Regular troops and rurales were rushed to the scene when news first reached Chihuahua. The state government took every step to prevent the information from getting to the public.

The country is thickly populated with descendants of Temosachic Indians, and the ranchers in the district are known as the "sharpshooters of the Chihuahua," and are feared by the state officials. The district is considered to be a veritable powder magazine.

According to El Correo, a daily newspaper of Chihuahua, the trouble arose between the two families of Murga and Barragon last Saturday night.

The Barragon faction, El Correo says, started a dispute with the Murga element, and the Murgas upheld the state government in its levy against the livestock.

Blows and Then Shots. From a wordy row, the disputants came to blows, and finally pistol shots were exchanged. The melee became general, and in all 21 shots were fired.

Soldiers were sent from Chihuahua on the regular trains to quell the riot, but when troops arrived they found nothing to quell. The combatants had fled to the hills. The Indians and half-breeds always go armed, and are skilled in warfare. Not many years ago 70 armed Temosachic Indians in open battle stood off an entire regiment of troops, killing over 200 men. They were forced back to a church, which later was stormed by artillery before the Indians were subdued.

### KILLS RATS TO KILL PLAGUE

Marine Hospital Service Tells of Great Campaign.

WASHINGTON, March 31.—The story of the campaign to rid San Francisco of bubonic plague is told in an interesting report made public by the Marine Hospital Service today. The disease was spread by a certain breed of flea that infested the rat, which in turn carried the plague broadcast. Approximately 1,000,000 rodents were slain in the effort to wipe out the plague. Nearly 100,000 rats were examined, and of this number more than 200 carried fleas infected with the disease. The campaign was directed toward the killing of rats, disinfecting premises and ships where the plague-infected rats had been found, and preventing the breeding and spread of the pests. There were 278 steamships disinfected, 439 houses disinfected, 1890 suspected cases examined, and 373 inspections of the dead to determine whether they had died of the plague. Up to June 30, 1908, there had been 139 cases of plague and 77 deaths.

### SEA TAKES ONE AS TOLL

THREE MEN CLING TO OVERTURNED BOAT FIVE HOURS.

Wave Rights Boat and Living and Dead Drift Five Hours More Before Beached.

HOQUIAM, Wash., March 31.—(Special.)—One dead and two exhausted from exposure to the sea took when a small fishing boat capsized near this city yesterday. The same fierce gale which caused the loss of the deckload of the steamer Whips charmed the waters of Grays Harbor into a seething mass of waves and spray. Three Finnish fishermen, Averta Hietala, H. Syrma and John Mickelson, were capsized four miles west of here at noon and succeeded in clinging to the upturned keel of their boat for five hours, although several times torn from their hold by the merciless waves, and as many times regaining the boat.

Thus they drifted and were buffeted about for five hours, when the boat was righted by a wave and two of the men clung to the overturned hull. Hietala, who was with them, where he soon died from exposure and exhaustion.

Then they drifted, the quick and the dead, for another long five hours and were finally beached by an enormous wave some six miles west of Hoquiam, on the north shore, about midnight. Here succor was had and this morning Chief of Police Oliver, of this place, with a local undertaker went to the scene in a launch and brought all to Hoquiam. Hietala's remains are in the local morgue, while his exhausted companions were taken to their homes in Aberdeen.

The plan is also to construct a new and modern sawmill, pulpmill and furniture factory to be connected with the car plant. Construction is to begin within 90 days.

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### Discards Old Heroes

Russia Promotes Young Generals to Command.

Criticism of Abilities of Army Heads in Douma Bears Decisive Fruit. ST. PETERSBURG, March 31.—The

speech delivered in the Douma March 8 by Alexander G. Guchkoff, one of the Octoberists, questioning the military abilities of the Russian Generals with high commands, already has borne fruit. An order was signed yesterday making a number of important changes designed to improve the war efficiency of the army. Lieutenant-General Gershelmann, Governor-General of Moscow, whose brilliant covering of the retreat from Mukden saved the Manchurian army, has been appointed commander of the military district of Vilna, a post entailing command of the First Army Corps in case Russia should engage in hostilities with Germany. Lieutenant-General Samsonoff, who is considered the best cavalryman in Manchuria, has been named Governor-General and

commander of the troops in Turkestan, succeeding General Mistchenkoff, who retires on account of ill health. General Plehve has been appointed commander of the troops at Moscow. The new appointees are vigorous men, between 50 and 55 years old. These appointments mark the passing of the Russian-Turkish war heroes, who up to the present time have been given preference in the allotment of commands.

New York.—The Manufacturers' Contest Association has decided not to support the New York-Battle automobile race, which is to be held in connection with the Alaska-Pacific Exposition in Seattle because it encourages the violation of the various speed restricting ordinances in force in the great majority of states.
