GIVEN TWO PASSES

McCredie Overwhelmed With Ballyard "Latch-Keys."

SEE ANY GAME ANYWHERE

Portland Two-Way Magnate Holds Unique Distinction and Interstate Commerce Commission Has No Chance to Get at Him.

Judge W. W. McCredie, president of the Portland Pacific Coast League club and also of the Portland Northwestern League club, is the only baseball magnate in the world who receives two annual passes from the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues. In fact there is no other minor league official in organized baseball who is similarly honored, for none other enjoys the distinction of "bassing" two clubs in different recognized associations. Last Saturday Judge McCredie received his "annual" from J. Cal Ewing, president of the Pacific Coast League, and the former Chicagoan and, when Judge McCredie returns from Seattle he will find another card entitling him to admission at any baseball park at any town where the team represented is playing with the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues and is countersigned by secretary Farrell of the association.

Yesterday President Lums received the annuals for the Northwestern League magnates and immediately made one out for W. W. McCredie as well as the president of the other club. When Judge McCredie returns from Seattle he will find another card entitling him to admission at any baseball park at any town where the team represented is playing with the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues and is countersigned by secretary Farrell of the association. However, as the Judge cannot be in two places at once, only one of these cards will prove of use to him at a time.

John S. Barnes, one of the moguls promoting the new Intermountain League, arrived in Portland yesterday morning, and wore a most satisfied smile. The smile was broad and the reason for that is that the Intermountain League is now well on the way toward a successful season.

Magnate Barnes has rounded up several of his players, and by the time his team arrived at Pendleton for the training period he expects to have a classy aggregation on hand. Yesterday afternoon John S. Barnes held a conference with Kirby Brennan, the Portland player who is thinking of joining the Wichita team for the coming term. Whether Barnes and Brennan reached an agreement is not known, for neither would affirm or deny having signed a contract. However, Barnes could do much worse than secure Brennan for Kirby is a good baseball player and would help out the Butte youngsters immensely. Among the players announced as signed by Barnes are Drennan, the Portland pitcher, and the Butte pitcher, Catcher Bill Hansen, formerly of Spokane and Salt Lake; Wild Charley Elsey, the former Butte first sacker; "Wee Willie" Campbell, who will act as playing manager; Fred Nehring, a fast young infielder; "Rube" Roberts, an outfielder of the Northwestern League; "Nig" Anderson, one of Dugdale's "risky" pitchers; Pitcher Gordon, formerly of Tacoma; Pitcher Dell, once with Vancouver; Chevalier, who pitched for Kelso in the Tri-City League, and Kirby Hoon, one of Ruse Hall's Butte pitchers. With the addition of a few more players, John S. Barnes expects to put a hard hitting, fast fielding bunch of players in Blue uniforms this season, and is confident of winning the honors in the new league.

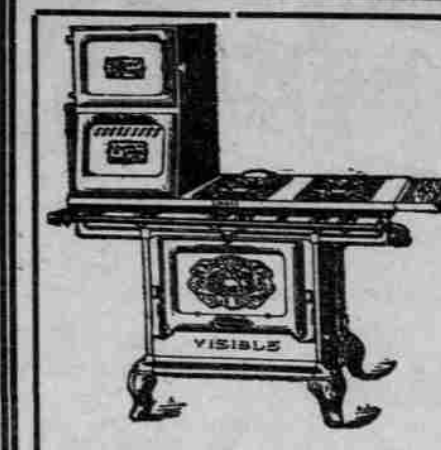
