MONEY AVAILABLE FOR NEW BRIDGE

Acceptance of Bonds by New York Firm Also Clears Way for Pipeline.

TANGLE STRAIGHTENED OUT

O'Connor & Kahler Accept Issues Amounting to \$700,000 When Formal Tender Is Made by City Treasurer.

The acceptance of the \$150,000 Portland bridge bonds and \$250,000 water bonds by O'Connor & Kahler of New York was the amouncement made last night by City Treasurer Werlein. The acceptance of the bonds terminates a trying delay and offers a solution to the Madison-street bridge dileinma. The bonds were awarded to O'Connor & Kahler on January 27, others bidding for them being N. W. Harris & Co., of New York, and R. H. Rollins & Sons, of Boston.

Later, however, owing to the fact that a defect was discovered in the \$250,000 bonds the deal was delayed. These bonds in the documents covering the issue were referred to as 30-year bonds, while in the summary they were designated as 25-year bonds. Yesterday Mr. Werlein visited the United States National Bank and made formal tender of the bonds, and advised that the city authorities had furnished all the documents and ordinances referring to bond issues and that the bond-buyers' attorneys had had time in which to pass upon the validity of the issue in question.

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The local representatives thereupon telegraphed O'Connor & Kahler that the formal tender had been made. Later in the afternoon Mr. Werlein received word that the New York financiers had agreed to take the bonds on April 8.

A gratifying feature in connection with the sale is the fact that the United States National Bank is making arrangements with the Chase National Bank of New York, which has been selected to have the handling of the bonds, by which when the payment on the coupons becomes due the purchasers will present their coupons to the Chase National Bank in New York. The Eastern bank is does this for the local bank, returning the coupons and bonds as they mature them to the City Treasurer's office and receives the money. This arrangement has materially increased the value of the bonds. By reason of this the city is saved a considerable sum in interest and the responsibility of shipping the bonds to New York. INDIAN FIGHTER IS DEAD

Major Cornoyer Dies Near Pendle-

PENDLETON, Or., April 1.—(Special.)—Major Nurcisse A. Cornoyer, famous Indian fighter and prominent in the early history of Oregon, died here last night at the age of 88. Born in Illinois, he came to California in 1849, moved to Oregon the next year and settled in Marion County, and was its first Sheriff after Oregon was admitted as a state.

During the Indian troubles of 1855, Cornoyer organized a company of volunteers and brought them to Eastern Oregon, where they took a prominent part in several battles with the Indians. He was promoted to Major as the result of bravery displayed in the battle of Walla Walla, and it was to him that Chief Peu-Peu-Moxmox surrendered.

Cornoyer moved to this county in 1861 and was agent on the Umatilla reservation for seven years.
