WILL ACT ON JUDGE

Cabinet to Consider Charges
Against Fulton Today.

TWO JUDGES OPPOSE HIM

Wickersham Will Report and Prompt
Action Likely—Honey Is Only
One to Make Attack
on ex-Senator.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, April 1.—Attorney-General Wickham stated today that he had read ex-Senator Fulton's answer to F. J. Honey's charges and would make his report to the President tomorrow or next day. What his opinion will be he would not indicate. If the report is submitted tomorrow it will probably be considered at the Cabinet meeting, and in that event a determination as to whether or not Mr. Fulton is to be appointed Judge is likely to be reached.

The Attorney-General further stated that there are no other charges pending against Mr. Fulton. He does not expect the case to be settled till he reports. It is known, however, that Judge Gilbert and Judge Wolverton, when their views were solicited, disapproved the appointment of Mr. Fulton, and their opinion will be considered along with the report of the Attorney-General.

At the White House it was stated this afternoon that President Taft had reached no conclusion as yet regarding the Oregon judgeship, but it was intimated that he would soon determine upon his course of action.

ELLIS ANSWERS CHAMBERLAIN

Assures New Senator He Is Ready
to Work for Oregon.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, April 1.—Representative Ellis today sent the following answer to Senator Chamberlain's letter relative to co-operation in the Oregon delegation:

"In reply to yours of recent date I will say I can only repeat what I stated to you on two different occasions prior to receipt of your letter, that is my entire willingness to work with the delegation for the best interests of Oregon.

"In both conversations referred to I spoke of subjects mentioned in your letter and called your attention to what I had done in the premises, and mentioned the need for further action.

"I will cheerfully consider any suggestion from you or any member of the delegation (or any one interested) as to the best methods to pursue to promote the common welfare of our state."

Representative Hawley has not yet written Senator Chamberlain.

TWO GUNS FOR OREGON FOLK

Secretary of Navy Says People of
State May Have Six-Pounders.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, April 1.—Representative Hawley today received a letter from the Secretary of the Navy, in which Secretary Meyer says: "I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 29th inst., in which you request to be informed if there are any guns from the battleship Oregon that were condemned, and that it may be possible for the citizens of Oregon to secure and place on the statehouse grounds at Salem."

"In reply, I have to inform you that there are at Mare Island Navy-yard two six-pounder guns, without mounts, which were on the Oregon during the period of

the Spanish war, and which have since been condemned for service use. If these guns are desired by the citizens of Oregon for the purpose stated, I will be pleased to take steps, after receipt of their formal application, to have them assigned for donation purposes."

Mr. Hawley has sent the letter to Governor Benson for his action.

CONDENSED NEWS BY WIRE

Victoria, B. C.—Count General Kuroki, commander of the first army in the field against the Russians, has retired, owing to the expiration of his military term.

Los Angeles, Cal.—The American record for tunnel boring was broken in the construction of the Los Angeles-Owens River aqueduct, which 476 feet were completed during the month of March.

Ottawa, Ont.—Convictions for drunkenness have increased the Dominion by 164 per cent in the last 10 years, according to a summary of the monthly bluebook which has just been issued.

New York.—Professional gamblers fleeced passengers on the Hamburg-American liner America from Hamburg out of \$4000.

San Bernardino, Cal.—Leaving a confession of the theft of \$3000 worth of silks and laces, taken from a local dry goods house where she was employed, Mrs. Clarence Allen committed suicide Wednesday night by taking carbolic acid.

Los Angeles, Cal.—Carroll W. Gates, a millionaire land and cattleowner of this city, was arrested by Federal officers Wednesday upon an indictment returned at San Francisco, charging him and others with being interested in land frauds.

Tulsa, Okla.—A four-month shutdown in the Oklahoma oil field, to take effect Thursday, has been agreed upon by the Midcontinent Oil Producers' Association, in protest against adverse state legislation.

St. Charles, Ill.—Fighting desperately for two hours Wednesday with a monster eagle, the bird was slain by a hunter named Peter Johnson, a farmer, with the aid of neighbors. The bird, which was about 10 feet long, 4 feet wide and 2 feet high, was shot with a .30-caliber rifle.

San Francisco.—Michael McKenna and Alexander Hagan, convicts who escaped from the state prison at Folsom Monday morning, were arrested Thursday morning just as they were about to land from the river steamer Modoc, on which they had stowed away before their departure from Sacramento.

San Francisco.—J. J. and Leo Schubert, in declining to enter the field in the Pacific Coast on a large scale in opposition to the K. K. Klans, already in possession of the city, have been elected to the use of the American Theater for the production of their musical comedies.

New York.—Count Alexander Tillyrand, a cousin of the Russian Emperor, who married Anna, daughter of the late Emperor, is reported to be in New York and will stay in this country.

Washington.—Representative Sulzer, of New York, introduced a bill establishing a new executive department at Washington, to be in charge of the Secretary of Labor, the present department of labor and bureau of immigration of the Department of Commerce and labor would be transferred to the proposed department.

London.—Nine of the militant female suffragettes who were arrested Wednesday afternoon while attempting to force an entrance into the House of Commons were sent by the magistrate to join their sisters in jail for one month. All refused to give sureties for their good behavior.

Washington.—Because of the alleged practice of railroad companies in the interstate commerce of delaying the acknowledgment of claims for overcharges, loss, damage or injury to property and frequently letting the adjustment of claims run into months and a Senator, already in Tennessee, has introduced a bill providing that carriers shall acknowledge all such claims within 10 days from their receipt, and that they shall pay all lawful claims within 30 days.

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VESSEL ON SHORE

Charles E. Folk High and Dry
at Copalis.

SLIPS ON SAND UNINJURED

Heavy Gales Keep Schooner From
Crossing Into Grays Harbor and
She Is Blown Onto Shore
North of Entrance.

HOGUAM, Wash., April 1.—(Special.)—The three-masted schooner Charles E. Folk, bound from San Francisco to Grays Harbor to load lumber at the American mill here, went ashore near Copalis Wednesday morning and is lying up on the beach.

The vessel, in command of Captain L. Jacobson, was reported off the bar Monday and Tuesday, but the violent gale of Wednesday forced the captain to put to sea.

From meager reports, it is learned the vessel went ashore during a gale, but was not injured in the least. The vessel lies on the beach, 12 miles north of the entrance to the harbor. Members of the crew made their way to shore in safety. They are now at Mocpils. Captain Jacobson has advised the American Mill Company that the vessel is intact, with chances that it can be saved.

C. C. Quackenbush, of the American Mill Company, has wired J. R. Hanley & Co., owners, at San Francisco, for instructions, and it is probable that two large tugs will be sent to the rescue, with hope of floating the vessel at high water.

The Charles E. Folk is a three-masted schooner and was built in Fairhaven, Cal., in 1888. She has a net tonnage of 245. Her length is 142 feet, breadth 21 feet and molded depth 9 feet. She has been engaged in the lumber-carrying trade between different ports on the Coast continuously since her launching, and is well known by shipping men and others connected with the industry.

The Folk was in ballast for the port from San Pedro, and was 41 days out, encountering contrary winds all the way.

party on the tariff, and added that, when the time came to vote, that party would be found sustaining the principles of taxation that had so long been maintained by it.

Speaking of the inheritance tax, proposed in the House bill, he said he would rather tax the living rich by means of an income tax than to tax the dead, "who are only moderately well to do," as proposed in the inheritance tax.

Aldrich suggested that the matter contemplated in the Bacon resolution would be taken care of by the committee on finance and it was by a viva voce vote referred to that committee.

NEW PROTEST OVER TARIFF

Ultimate Consumers' League Issues
Statement of Efforts.

CHICAGO, April 1.—Further protest against the Payne bill was made last night at a meeting of the Ultimate Consumers' Tariff League. In an address the league says:

"Mr. Payne, author of the tariff bill, says that the ultimate consumer makes no objection to the proposed tax on coffee, tea and other household necessities. The Ultimate Consumers' Tariff League is organized for the purpose of demonstrating the fallacy of this contention and

putting consumers on record in every practical manner as being unalterably opposed to the imposition of any tax whatsoever on coffee and tea and other household necessities, and for the further purpose of devising and putting into effect every legitimate means of preventing such calamity.

"This is not a local move, but will be extended throughout the United States. It means much to every consumer and more to every dealer."

TAFT AGAINST TARIFF BOARD

Prefers Department Bureau—Still
Favors Stamp Taxes.

WASHINGTON, April 1.—President Taft declined an invitation today to attend the annual banquet of the National Association of Manufacturers on May 19. The President will be in North Carolina on May 20. He explained to E. F. Stillman, chairman of the executive committee of the association, who called upon him, that his idea of a tariff bureau was to have it as a part of one of the Government departments, and that the President said he did not favor a commission on tariff in any sense of the word.

Commissioner of Internal Revenue Capers gave to the President certain statistics desired by the Chief Executive as to the amount of revenue which was derived during the Spanish war from the various forms of stamp taxation in effect at that time. Rather than that a tax should be imposed on tea and coffee, the President believes the stamp tax should be revived, not making it applicable to the extent that it was employed during the war, but using the method in many of its phases.

MANILA DIVIDED ON TARIFF

Many Planters Think Assembly
Should Not Make Protest.

MANILA, April 1.—Many sugar planters and other influential persons here against the Assembly's recent action on the Payne bill, urging reconsideration. The Filipino Chamber of Commerce, which formerly was in favor of free trade, now is supporting the Assembly in its stand against the bill.

Taft's First Salary Check.

WASHINGTON, April 1.—This was President Taft's first payday as Chief Executive, the amount of \$100,000. The Treasury messenger carried to the White House being \$662.50.

FORTUNE FOR MISSING MAN

Relatives Seek James Brown, Who
Has Been Gone 12 Years.

ST. LOUIS, April 1.—(Special.)—Relatives have renewed their search for James Brown, a locomotive engineer, who lived at 2223 Dodyear street, St. Louis, in 1880, as he is one of the heirs to an estate left by an uncle, who died in Washington, D. C. It is said Brown recently was seen in St. Louis. Brown is 40 years old, and is believed to have a wife and child.

He is positively known to have been in Norfolk, Neb., 12 years ago. He was a member of Mount Hood Lodge, Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, in Portland, Or. Another James Brown, a locomotive engineer, residing at 3231 Vista avenue, is assisting in the search for his namesake.

As nearly as can be found, there is no such organization in Portland as the Mount Hood Lodge, Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. There is a Mount Hood Division No. 21, Brotherhood of Railroad Conductors, but T. D. Hughes, who was a charter member of this lodge, says that there has been no man named James Brown on the rolls of the organization. There was also a Willamette Division No. 277, Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, but W. J. Sulley, of 415 East Ankeny street, who has been a member since its organization, says that there has been no James Brown on the records of the lodge.

LAW STUDENTS DEBATE

OREGON AND WASHINGTON TO
MEET HERE TONIGHT.

Question Is "Resolved That the Des
Moines Plan of Government Should
Be Adopted in Portland."

Tonight the debaters of the law schools of the University of Oregon and Washington will meet in the Masonic Temple, at Yamhill and Park streets, to discuss the question "Resolved That the Des Moines Plan of Municipal Government Should Be Adopted in Portland, Oregon." The members representing Oregon are: R. F. Peters, Norman R. Landis and L. E. Berhman. Those composing the team for Washington are: J. J. Sullivan, J. H. Norris and B. D. Brown. The judges will be: Judge C. E. Wolverton and Attorney James B. Kerr, of Portland, and Attorney Donald Mc Masters, of Vancouver.

This is the second debate held between the schools, one being held at

Seattle last year, which resulted in a victory for the Oregon students. The question debated was "Resolved That the Initiative and Referendum Should Be Adopted in Washington," the Oregon boys, represented by L. W. Humphreys, F. B. Smith and R. F. Peters, supporting the negative. The question last year was selected by Washington and the Oregon debaters, given the choice of sides. The opposite is the case this year, Washington choosing the affirmative of the question, making it necessary for the local team to argue against the question.

From the fact that the question chosen comes at a time when the public interest is concerned, the debate being virtually founded upon the proposed new charter of Portland, it is thought that there will be a large audience present.

After the speeches the two teams and their associates will go to the Oregon Hotel, where the visitors will be entertained at an informal supper. This will be the only intercollegiate debate to be held in Portland this year. Both sides have been preparing for several weeks and considerable interest is being taken in the arguments to be produced.
