

GASTRO'S JOURNEY REASES SUDDENLY

Venezuelan "Dictator" Lands at Fort de France Instead of at Trinidad.

POWERS SPOIL HIS PLANS

After ex-President Leaves Ship He Hears France Will Not Let Him Stay, and Vents His Rage Against All.

PORT DE FRANCE, Martinique, April 7.—Cipriano Castro, ex-Dictator of Venezuela, landed here on the steamer Guadalupe today, and at once went to a towering rage against the state departments of Great Britain and the United States, both of which have forbidden him to land on any of their possessions upon the American continent.

Hardly had Castro recovered his breath from a vicious tirade against these two countries, when he was informed that a message from Paris had just been received at Saint Pierre forbidding him to land anywhere on the island of Martinique. This set the fiery Venezuelan going again, and bystanders were treated to a vivid description of the place where he would send all Frenchmen, were he the arbiter of fate.

In the meantime, the Guadalupe, with Madam Castro on board had left the harbor and was fast disappearing toward La Guayra, where it is the intention of Senor Castro's wife to land and wait for her husband. The only other vessel in sight was the United States cruiser Montana, which came into port just before Castro arrived. The ex-Dictator did not seem inclined to go aboard this vessel, and sought out lodgings in high dudgeon.

Next Move Uncertain. Just what will be the next move in the "return" of Castro to the Western Hemisphere is not known. Venezuelan authorities have received permission from France to arrest him on a French vessel, should he attempt to land from one; and the message from Paris is understood to make it evident that he cannot long remain on the island of Martinique.

With American ports closed to him, the ex-Dictator is in a fair way to become a wanderer on the high seas, seeking some asylum where he can land. No official orders to deport him from Martinique have yet been received, but the authorities expect that such will be the next step.

The decision of the British government, acting on request of the State Department at Washington not to let him land at Trinidad, was unofficially communicated to Castro this morning. The ex-Dictator of Venezuela expressed himself as exceedingly annoyed and angry at this decision, which he characterized as a violation of the rights of man.

Plans No Warfare. After expressing his annoyance at the unexpected turn in his affairs, Castro disclaimed the bellicose intentions with regard to the existing political situation in Venezuela, with which he has been credited, and he declared that his purpose in returning to Venezuela was to give his attention to his private business. Castro will be accompanied by his secretary and a body-servant. He appears still to be in ill-health.

Castro showed the utmost indignation at the action of President Taft, saying: "It was I who placed him in that position and I have been very badly recompensed. But justice is imminent, and the only way that I desire is that that shall be thrown on the infernal attributes to me."

When he bade goodbye to his wife he showed great emotion, turning to the agent of the steamship company, who thanked him warmly for the attention which he had received at the hands of the officials, and expressed regret that he was not able to continue the journey.

There, his glance falling on the United States cruiser Montana, he pointed in that direction and said: "Patience, I am not ready to sail to St. Helena."

Castro does not disguise the belief that the unexpected intervention of the United States and Great Britain may let loose a revolution at Caracas.

PORT OF SPAIN IS ANXIOUS Venezuelans There Wonder Where Castro Will Go Next.

PORT OF SPAIN, April 7.—There is much excitement in the Venezuelan colony here over the interdicted landing of Castro. Prior to the announcement that Castro would not be permitted to land in Trinidad, his coming to this port had been looked forward to by the Venezuelans here with some uneasiness, and now interest is centered in the question as to how long Castro will be permitted to remain in Port de France.

The United States cruiser North Carolina, which is under way, and the cruiser Montana, it is understood, will follow with the Guadalupe to Port of Spain, where the commanders of the two warships may have a consultation.

TAKEN AS ARBITER?

Miners May Appeal to President to End Dispute.
