STREET RIDE ARE ASKED—Proceedings for the improvement of Hawthorne avenue, between East Third and East Forty-first streets, are advanced to the point where bids are being asked. It is proposed to improve Hawthorne avenue with a hard-surface pavement, the estimated cost of which will be \$200,000. While the improvement extends to East Forty-first street it is understood that another improvement will be made from this point out to Fifty-fifth street, or near there. Anticipation for hard-surface pavement for Hawthorne avenue was begun over three years ago, but various delays have held up the improvement. There are good prospects that the improvement will now be made, as the property-owners appear anxious to have work go forward as soon as possible. A rapidly-growing portion of the East Side is tributary to Hawthorne avenue, and the proposed pavement, it is thought, will make it the most important street leading from the Willamette River eastward.

CATNIPS BALK ON STREET—Two catnips, evidently fresh from the range, joined to city ways, and reluctant to leave the excitement of the streets, stopped in front of one of the corner cigar stores, at Sixth and Washington streets yesterday afternoon, evidently to see how the ball game was coming out, and neither the persuasion of the owner, H. Ewley, nor the efforts of the policeman to induce them to move on were of any avail. Their bulkiness would have made a mule ashamed of himself. Neither of them could be coaxed nor driven any farther, and a crowd gathered to see the performance. Finally the order of an officer the two bulky catnips were tied to the axle of a heavy delivery wagon and they were forcibly dragged for some distance until one of them fell. They were unharmed and decided to go good, going away with the owner, disgusted with the city ways, amid the cheers of the throngs following them.

BLIND PIG ALLEGED—That W. J. Armistead is ostensibly conducting a drugstore at Arleta, but in reality is operating a saloon, is the charge made by P. J. Jennings, a resident of the suburb, who appeared in Justice Court yesterday and swore to a complaint charging Armistead with selling liquor without a license. Armistead's bond was fixed at \$500.

Membership was reported to have reached 60. At the banquet served by women of the church for the annual meeting 75 were present. Rev. Charles T. Hurd is the pastor.

VALUABLE ESCAPE FLAMES—A fire at the boarding house of Mrs. L. B. Dean, at 234 Salmon street, Thursday, was discovered in time to prevent the complete destruction of the building. Miss Susie Dean, who lives in the house, says she left a pocketbook containing a certificate of deposit on the United States National Bank for \$100, \$125 in cash, and a gold watch, in her room. Search failed to reveal it until Harry Jones, son of Deputy Sheriff Jones, happened to look between two mattresses which were badly burned. The money was found in a safe.

Good-Friday Music at White Temple

THOSE who journeyed to the White Temple last night found themselves not only in the atmosphere of Good Friday and all the reverent solemnity with which this great sacred occasion is associated, but were favored with a high-class concert reflecting its spirit. The attendance was large, and every number on the programme was encored.

The principal musician was George P. Walcker, the basso profundo from Berlin, Germany, who again duplicated the artistic success he won here February 17, when he sang the most charming things about his fine bass voice that I could think of, and now express regret that so able a singer as he leaves us so soon.

For next month he proposes to start for Europe to fulfill professional engagements. His selection, "Die Allmacht," Schubert, was a beautifully finished study, and for a moment he sang with impressive effect "The Lost Chord," Sullivan. I have heard this sacred song sung hundreds of times, and often by famous artists, but never better than last night. The effect was heightened by piano and organ accompaniment, played, respectively, by Miss Laura Fox and R. J. Hutchinson.

Mrs. Herman Bohman, soprano; Miss Genevieve Frazer, pianist, and Henry L. Dietman, violinist, were heard in admired selections. One especially good number was the rendition of the prelude and finale to Wagner's "Parsifal," played on the piano by Miss Fox and on the violin organ by Mr. Hutchinson. The interior of the church was darkened for this number, and one was reminded of the effect of picturing the solemnity of an abbey, with only two lights twinkling in the darkness. The work, as accompanists, of Miss Fox and Mr. Hutchinson gave every pleasure.

NEW BIDDERS HERE

Competitors in Field for Asphalt Street Work.

BIG CONTRACT IS SOUGHT

Six Companies Are After \$190,000 Job on Hawthorne Avenue, and Engineer's Figures Have Been Scaled About \$20,000.

NEW BIDDERS HERE

The novel spectacle of competing asphalt concerns confronted the Executive Board yesterday, when bids were received for laying asphalt on Hawthorne avenue, from East Third to East Forty-first streets, a distance of almost two miles. While yesterday was the closing date for the receipt of bids, they will not be considered and passed upon till Monday, when the Board will hold a special meeting.

Bids have been received from six concerns, and it is known that at least one of these bids will scale the City Engineer's estimate of \$190,000 for the work by at least \$20,000. The usual charge for asphalt here has approximated \$2.25 a square yard, but it is computed that even in the anticipation of competition this price has only been cut to \$2. The Harbor Asphalt Company has had this field exclusively to itself for some time.

The firms whose bids will be considered by the executive board are: The Harbor Asphalt Paving Company, The Warren Construction Company, Gleiblich & Joplin and the Cascade Construction Company, all of Portland; the Independent Asphalt Company, of Seattle, and the Western Asphalt Company, of Spokane.

In the event of either of the two outside concerns obtaining the work they would probably be required to build a local plant to care for the business. The cost of such a plant would approximate \$25,000. But it is understood from a reliable source that both the Harbor and Warren companies are interested in the Spokane and Seattle concerns.

The entrance into the local field of Gleiblich & Joplin and the Cascade Contract Company appears to offer promise of lower prices to property-owners. Both of these concerns have confined themselves in the past to Belgian block and stone paving work. It is expected that either of these firms would be able to build its own plant, but should one of them secure the contract, it appears certain that in future there will be considerable reduction in the price of paving. It is generally conceded that this one contract should give sufficient profit to provide for the construction of an adequate plant, and should this be done, either or both of the concerns may be expected to become regular bidders.

The practicability of asphalt is shown by its successful use in Mexico City and in the most up-to-date cities of South America. Exposed to the elements, no signs of softening are observed, although in the milder climate enjoyed by Portland softening is noticed on frequent occasions.

The belief that his bid had been scaled led City Engineer Taylor to be unusually helpful last night regarding the situation. He thought that in future there would be competition for all city work of this nature. Mr. Taylor continued:

"There is so much asphalt work to be done in Portland now, that I have been thinking we would receive competitive bids. I looked for outside companies to enter the field, and am not surprised to learn that the Independent Company, of Seattle, has put in a bid. I should not wonder if they remain in business here."

Manager Oscar Huber of the Harbor concern was quite complacent regarding the condition.

The competitive bids for the job on Hawthorne avenue simply means that it is the survival of the fittest," said Mr. Huber. "It just means that the man who bids lowest and puts in the best pavement for the least money will stay in the field. I do not care what they do. Let every one bid who wishes to, and we will see who wins out."
