

MOSLEMS KILLING MANY ARMENIANS

Adana Given Up to Murder, Fire and Loot, and Consuls Call for Relief.

TWO MISSIONARIES SLAIN

Enraged at Killing of Prisoner by Police, Moslems Start to Exterminate Christians—Call for Warships Is Sent.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 16.—A massacre of Armenians has taken place at Adana, Asiatic Turkey, and according to the latest telegrams from Mersina, it is still in progress. Soldiers, powerless to control the situation, are joining in the pillage of the town. The fatalities are said to be numerous.

Killed Include Two Missionaries.

The riots began last Wednesday. The town of Adana has been burned and many Christians have been killed. The Moslems, having wrecked the town, are said to have begun operations against the Christians in Vilayet.

The foreign consuls at Mersina have requested that warships be sent. No definite information is obtainable as to the number of persons who lost their lives, although one report says 60 Armenians were massacred.

Missionaries Were in Session.

It is known that the regular district meeting of the American missionaries was due to be in session at Adana and that Mr. and Mrs. William Chambers, the Misses Elizabeth and Mary G. Webb, Miss Wallis and Miss Borela, missionaries, were to have been there. Ambassador Lelsham has instructed Vice-Consul Debbas, at Mersina, to go immediately to Adana.

The Porte declares that the disturbances are subsiding. Two additional battalions have been despatched to Adana. Mrs. Chambers is a sister of Talcott Williams, of the Philadelphia Press.

MASSACRES SPREAD ABROAD

Whole Vilayet of Adana Given Up to Bloodshed.

ATHENS, April 16.—Telegrams from Mersina report sanguinary attacks against the Armenians, who had killed persons they were trying to arrest. A massacre was begun, in which the troops are said to have participated. Several houses were burned.

The dispatches add that the foreign consuls have demanded that warships be sent to Mersina. Later dispatches from Mersina say that the massacres are spreading in the Vilayet of Adana. Disorders have commenced at Tarsus, the little town between Adana and Mersina, noted as the birthplace of the Apostle Paul, and many houses there were reported to have been burned.

MRS. CASTRO SARCASTIC

HINTS TO VENEZUELAN OFFICIALS OF REVOLUTION.

Angered at Exclusion From Republic—Castro's Arrest for Murder Is Ordered.

CARACAS, Monday, April 12 (via Port of Spain, Trinidad, April 13).—Mrs. Castro, wife of the ex-president, is reported as having shown much aversion when the Venezuelan authorities refused to let her disembark at La Guayra today. From the deck of the steamer she cried out to the government officials on the dock: "You had better make hay while the sun shines."

The judge of the criminal court, before which is pending the case charging Cipriano Castro with responsibility for the murder of Antonio Paredes, has ordered requisition papers for the arrest of Castro.

FUGITIVE WIELDS AN AX

Resists Arrest on Charge of Robbing United States Mail at Aberdeen.

RAYMOND, Wash., April 16.—(Special.)—Meyer and Stroheck, charged with robbing United States registered mail at Aberdeen three years ago, were arrested by United States Marshal Blossom and son of Spokane, near this city yesterday and taken out on a Northern Pacific train for Spokane this morning.

Both prisoners have been working in logging camps near Raymond for some time. Stroheck put up a strong fight attacking Blossom with an axe. Young Blossom came to his father's rescue. The Marshal has been tracking these men for three years.

PATROLMAN IS SUSPENDED

Spokane Police Chief Files Charges of Graft and Blackmail.

SPOKANE, Wash., April 16.—(Special.)—Patrolman W. R. Reeves, accused of grafting and blackmail, has been suspended by Acting Chief Convery, who files these charges: That he frequented resorts where notorious persons and women congregated; that he has used his position as a member of the police force to secure favors for himself; that he has used his position as a member of the police force for the purpose of securing intoxicating liquor without paying therefor.

Games Raided Poker Joints.

All of the games caught last night were poker games, but it is intimated that in other resorts, one in particular, which is situated very close to Washington street, have faro and other gambling tables in full operation. No information has been signed against the offenders yet, but the District Attorney's office, it is said, stands ready to prosecute the men caught in Councilman Willis' dragnet. Just as vigorously as it will be possible for them to do. "It doesn't take more than a child to see that the pretensions of the police and the people at the City Hall are false," said Mr. Willis last night. "If within a few hours strange men are able to apprehend five guilty places, what ought the police to do, who are supposed to watch these things closely and should make it their business to keep their finger on the pulse of undesirable classes?"

Arlington Club on List.

"I have no definite information to give out at present, but I can say that more raids will follow, positively. We will not even stop at the clubs, if we have the proper information in our hands. We are not prepared to say what we know at present, but several of the well-known clubs in the city are being watched and may fall at any time."

When pressed for further particulars Mr. Willis admitted that the Arlington Club was one of them.

"We have shown the people of Portland by these raids that gambling does exist in Portland, and I wonder now what my friends in the city will say," he continued. "Operating with a man who has no connection with the city's departments has proven very successful and no doubt more of it will follow in other channels. We are out for a clean town and we are going to have it clean in spite of some people's wishes to the contrary."

Mr. Willis is the Councilman who invaded the North End a few weeks ago and secured numerous arrests for gambling in some of the saloons in the district. He was disappointed in the results and said at the time he would try again to suppress gambling in Portland.

FAMILY SHOOTING PARTY

MAN SHOTS MOTHER-IN-LAW AND SISTER-IN-LAW.

Is Later Wounded by Father-in-Law, and Then Pursued by Mob, but Saved by Police.

MALESTER, Okla., April 17.—Mike Zanonah shot and killed his mother-in-law, Mrs. William Doss, and his sister-in-law, Miss Willie Doss, at Hartshorne today. Within a few minutes he was shot in the neck and seriously wounded by his father-in-law, William Doss. Zanonah and his wife separated a year ago, and a short time ago Mrs. Zanonah was given a divorce and custody of the child. Zanonah then made threats, even against the judge.

This afternoon Zanonah entered the Doss home and shot the two women. He then started around the house with his child and two small children of the Doss family.

Neighbors had telephoned the authorities, and when Constable Whiting arrived Zanonah shot at him. The fire was unsteady and missed. A mob quickly formed, but Zanonah was hurried out of town.

KIDNAPER M'COY GUILTY

Convicted of Attempt to Hold Rich Lumberman for Ransom.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., April 16.—At Mount Vernon last night Donald Boyd was convicted of kidnapping Patrick McCoy, a wealthy Seattle lumberman, in the woods near Bow, last Autumn, with the intention of holding him for a ransom.

Leo Beamer, serving 20 years for kidnapping Edward English, admitted he was one of the McCoy kidnapers, but tried to save his "pal" from conviction by swearing a man named Boyle helped him. It developed during the trial that Boyle, Boyd and Boyle planned a series of kidnappings of wealthy men in Skagit County, and that all three participated in both crimes. Boyle was sentenced at the next term of the Superior Court.

DOZEN PERISH IN FLAMBY LODGINGS

Refugee Home Erected After San Francisco Quake Is Scene of Holocaust.

LABORING MEN ARE VICTIMS

Building Once Condemned as Fire-trap Blazes Like Tinder, While High Wind Carries Sparks to Other Structures.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 16.—Fire in the St. George Hotel, a flimsy structure erected shortly after the earthquake, and since used as a lodging-house, snuffed out a dozen lives between 2 and 4 o'clock this morning. The building, located at Eighth and Howard streets, burned like tinder, and almost before the sleeping occupants of the structure could be aroused, the fate of many of them was sealed.

The great rookery had 600 rooms, and was mostly occupied by laboring men and their families. Five bodies have already been taken from the ruins, and it is believed that 30 still remain buried in the smoking and smoldering wreckage. Four of the corpses so far recovered are those of men, while the fifth is that of a boy of about 15 years of age. The 162 lodgers of the firetrap, over ten are reported as missing; and it is believed their remains will be found in the charred debris of the hotel.

The St. George Hotel was of the most flimsy construction, and its proprietor, J. W. Shanahan, has been in trouble with the Board of Public Works since the building was erected. On December 13, 1906, he was arrested for violating the building law, but was dismissed on promising to make alterations which would increase the safety of the building. According to John T. Horgan, of the Board of Public Works, many complaints have been made against Shanahan on the ground that the St. George was a veritable firetrap.

Insurance agents estimated that the fire resulted in a loss of \$250,000. W. J. Leary, who, with his wife and two children occupied one of the refugee cottages, was awakened by the crackling of flames shortly after 3 o'clock. He said:

"I saw at least half a dozen people at the windows a moment before this part of the hotel collapsed. Some of them evidently were afraid to jump into the flames, and I saw one man who was trying to climb out of the window. A dozen men jumped from the third story of the hotel onto the roofs of the low cottages, and while I think that all of these escaped, some of them must have been injured."

The St. George Hotel was a flimsy wooden structure, built as an emergency lodging-house after the earthquake of 1906.

One of the bodies has been partially identified by means of a gold-filled tooth as that of a man named Johnson, recently from San Antonio, Texas.

Oregon Man Victim.

D. S. Cartwright, a carpenter, formerly of Salem, Or., and said to have possessed considerable money, was burned all over the head and body. Nine others slightly injured are: Patrick, Guerin, John Neil, John Erickson, John Main, John Potts, James Rogers, William McKinley, Don Haggarty and Joseph Campbell.

Late tonight the firemen gave up their search for the charred remains. They declared that after the fire had burned through the ruins for bodies, and this work will be taken up tomorrow by the coroner's office.

Another of the corpses was identified as that of Thomas O'Brien, an expressman, aged 65 years. Johnson, who was about 30 years of age, came recently from Texas. He is said to have received \$500 from his home yesterday. Johnson returned to the hotel about an hour before the fire broke out.

CARTWRIGHT CANNOT LIVE

Brother Goes From Salem to Cheer His Last Hours.

SALEM, Or., April 16.—(Special.)—Dr. Cartwright received a telegram late this afternoon from San Francisco that his brother, Charles, fatally injured in the St. George Hotel fire, had no possible chance to live. Dr. Cartwright left tonight for San Francisco. Charles Cartwright was a mechanical engineer and lived in Salem for several years.

GLOBE WALKER IN SEATTLE

M. Thomassin Reaches Puget Sound on 75,000-Mile Hike.

SEATTLE, April 16.—M. Joseph Thomassin, French journalist and one of the three contestants for a prize of \$5,000 offered by the Royal Olympia Society, of Amsterdam, in a globe-walking contest that requires a call at every country of the world, arrived here today.

Thomassin has been 34 months out of Calais, France, the origin of the contest, and has completed his walking in Europe, Asia and the northern countries. In India he was seriously delayed by an affliction to his eyes that nearly resulted in blindness. Many other difficulties have been overcome. Despite the delays he arrived here by steamer on a schedule prepared previous to starting from France, and, without definite knowledge of his opponents, believes that their failure to reach America gives him a lead. Conditions of the contest call for walking 75,000 miles.

FILIPINO GOES TO DEATH

First Islander to Pay Murder Penalty in United States.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., April 16.—Without manifesting the least fear of death, Juan Nicolas, the Guam Islander convicted of double murder, was executed by hanging this morning at the Washington state prison here. The trap was sprung by electricity. This is thought to be the first legal execution of a Filipino ever held in the United States.
