RIVALRY WAIT VOTE

"Daughters" Convention on Eve of Political Storm.
CLEVER POLITICAL MOVE
McLean Faction Takes Advantage of Technicality to Shut Out Mrs. Story's Speech—Silenced Leader Has Ovation.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—With the political clouds almost ready to break into a storm, the Daughters of the American Revolution today held the second day's session of their 28th Continental Congress. The first open manifestation of any partisanship regarding the president-general, came when Mrs. William Cummings Story, the anti-administration candidate, received a generous ovation when, as regent of New York, she announced that the delegation would cast 125 votes.
Mrs. Matthew L. Scott, the "administration" candidate, sat in one of the upper boxes and observed the demonstration.

One of the most tense situations witnessed during the congress occurred tonight when President-General McLean refused to recognize Mrs. Story, state regent of New York, when the latter sought recognition for the purpose of reading her report. Early in the session the president-general entertained a motion that only representatives of state regents who had responded to roll-call be heard.
The administration forces carried the motion through with a rush. Later this strategic move was made plain when it developed that Mrs. Story was absent at roll-call. Confusion reigned in the auditorium when the secretary omitted the name of New York's regent, and Mrs. Story tried in vain to gain the floor to present her report.
Mrs. Story then yielded and was given an ovation by her supporters.
The candidates for the office of president-general, Mrs. Scott and Mrs. Story, were on the ground early and their lieutenants were actively at work in their behalf.
The report of the credentials committee showed that the organization comprises 56 chapters. The actual membership is 58,024 and the committee reported that the vote of this congress was 1401.
When New York was called, Mrs. Cummings Story, candidate for president-general, was given an ovation as she announced the number of her state delegates, 172, with 125 present.
The report of the registrar-general, Mrs. Amos G. Draper, showed that during the year over 6000 new members were enrolled, an increase of 33 per cent over the two preceding years.

STATE LAW IS ANNULLED

Alabama Can't Forbid Corporation Appeals to Federal Courts.
MONTGOMERY, Ala., April 20.—The Alabama state law providing for annulling the licenses of foreign corporations which take cases from state to Federal courts was today declared unconstitutional in a decision by Judge Thomas J. Jones of the United States Court. The court enjoined the Secretary of State from cancelling the state license of the Western Union Telegraph Company.

TAKE ACTION ON SHIPPERS
Captain Wagner Gets License Back; Captain Lancaster Loses His.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 20.—The license Captain C. J. Lancaster, who was in command of the steamer R. D. Inman, which was wrecked on the Marin County coast several weeks ago, was suspended for six months today by the Inspectors of Hulls and Bolters. Captain Lancaster declared that he was lured from his course by a fire which he believed to be a burning ship, but which proved to be a brush fire ashore. The inspectors held that he had been negligent in failing to take soundings.
Captain Nicholas Wagner, whose license was suspended by the Federal Inspectors of the Alaskan District after the wreck of the ship Star of Bengal, of which he was master and in which more than 200 lives were lost, was restored to his standing by the action of Supervising Inspector Bermingham today. Captain Bermingham said that the evidence did not warrant the action of the northern board, and granted the appeal of Wagner, in order that the seaman might accept a command now offered him.
