Los Angeles had the long end of a 1 to 0 decision at the Vaughn-street grounds yesterday afternoon, and had it not been for an unfortunate error on the part of Ed Kennedy, Portland's hard-working first baseman, the battle between Seaton and Tozier would have gone into extra innings with the possibility of the home team pulling the game out of the fire in the overtime play. Still it was a splendid exhibition, and the Angels really behaved in a decent manner. If they keep up the same tactics the Portland fans may grow to like Dillon's crew immensely.

It was hard luck for young Seaton to be credited with defeat after pitching such a game, but errors often reverse a decision, and Kennedy's miscue has happened to many better first basemen than he, and the fans should not blame him under the circumstances. Anyhow, Bill Tozier pitched equally as good ball for Los Angeles as did Seaton for Portland, and Portland made no runs at all.

Wheeler Scores Gift Run.

The first inning showed that both pitchers were in fine fettle and the fans settled down to watch a close fight. The manner in which Seaton and Tozier were disposing of the opposing batters proved conclusively that one or two runs on either side would decide the contest, and when the Angels were handed one in the fourth, all that was left for the home guard was to hope for two to win. The "gift" tally was registered by George Wheeler, who did not like to be referred to as "ancient," but who really behaved himself creditably yesterday.

Wheeler worked Seaton for a free ticket to first, and went to second when Howard sacrificed. Smith hit over second base, but Olson made a splendid stop, and was perched on third base. Delmas hit to Olson, who lined the ball to Kennedy.

Time to get the batter, but Ed dropped the ball and Wheeler was over the register with the only run of the matinee. The run looked big, but even with that handicap the hopefuls brought up and every succeeding inning brought whoops from the fans, who momentarily expected McCredie's fans to even up matters.

Frequently the boys in white got on the path, but their travels took them no farther than second. The first batter up for Portland negotiated his way to fourth, seventh and ninth, and in each inning was advanced to second, but the succeeding batters were not so helpful, and the home team wound up the ninth with two men on and no scores.

McCredie tried hard to win the game. In the seventh he sent Ryan in to bat for Murray, and in the eighth he sent Graney to hit it out for Kennedy. Both batted in the pinch and the game was over.

New Outfielder at Work.

Portland's new outfielder, Spears, secured from the Cleveland American League team, made his initial bow in the Portland game, and while he failed to get any of his hits safe, he impressed all with his speed and the stands at the ballpark like a good hitter. He has the knack of sliding into first base and coming up standing like a football player who drives for the line, and in center field in place of Ryan, who warmed the bench in the ninth inning George Ort opened for Portland most auspiciously by beating out a high bouncer to Howard. McCredie, who had been hitting good early in the game, tried to sacrifice, but popped a fly to Howard and was out. The rabid ones then stood up and yelled for Otis Johnson to hit it a mile. Otis' intention was good, but he waited too long for Tozier to put one over the plate. Tozier got off bad by announcing the "Terrible Swede" was out on strikes. That put him in a pickle and one lone chance left for him to win. He proved. Dick Breen singled sharply to center, but Ort could not get past second on the bingle. McCredie delegated Otis Johnson to bat for Kennedy. The twice-skied to "Jeff" Thompson in right and the game was over.

Either Hackenschmidt or Garrett will be sent against the Angels today, while Nagle, who has a lame ankle, may twirl for the visitors. The score of yesterday's game is as follows:

The third place was won by Searchlight, black mare, owned by Miss Ellinore Laidlaw, of Spokane.

In class 56, roadsters, pair of trotting mares or geldings, 3 years and under, 15.2 and under, the blue ribbon was won by Homer S. and Myra, exhibited by D. E. Frederick, of Seattle. In class 81, horses in heavy harness, under Mrs. John W. Considine, of Seattle, won first prize with Dorothea. Her two other entries, Sunshine Chum and Quaker Maid, also secured second and third place, respectively.

Mrs. Considine also secured the blue ribbon in the tandem class with Sunshine, chestnut mare, and Belle Brant, chestnut mare, in class 81, horses in heavy harness, high-steppers. Goodman May, exhibited by C. J. Robertson, of Edmonton, Alberta, was highly commended.

Seattle tossed the game off today in a bunch of errors with a base on ball, singles by Garry, giving the visitors three runs, enough to win. Carnes, who started the game for Portland, made a double, and when in the fourth Casey replaced him with Kinella, he had held Seattle to no runs. Kinella was hit harder than Carnes, but his steadiness and control pulled him through the pinch.

Fast work by the Portland outfit held Seattle to one run on three hits in the ninth, making their total two.

In the ninth, with Seattle three runs behind, Mike Lynch called on Willie Porter to bat for Marshall. Porter rapped out a two-base hit, took second and third on outs by Akln and Raymond, and scored on Capron's hit to right. Bennett advanced Capron to second with a single to right, but Crocker, batting for Lynch, struck at three wide ones, and it was over.

The features of the game were the smooth, oiled work of the Portland infield; the work of Raymond at short for Seattle, and the all-around playing of Danny Green, the old Tacoma catcher, who was behind the bat for Seattle for the first time. Danny got three hits, nipped three men at the plate and failed to allow a stolen base.

Marshall, who pitched for Seattle, was hit hard at times. The work of Umpire Flynn was rather unsatisfactory to the Seattle fans. His judgment on balls and strikes was criticized freely, and his failure to allow Lynch's catch of Casey's fly against the center-field fence in the third started Portland's big batting rally.
