NEW PULP SUCCESS

Portland Presbytery Now on Self-Supporting Basis.

ANNUAL SESSION AT END

Reports Show Christian Endeavor Is Losing Ground and Pastors Are at Loss to Account for Falling Off in Interest.

With this meeting of the Portland Presbytery, which concluded its sessions yesterday at the First Presbyterian Church, the first year of its existence as a self-supporting body was completed, and according to reports from all sources it has been its most successful year.

The report set forth the advance of the presbytery, which was made in order, and Rev. Andrew J. Montgomery, chairman of the committee, read an exhaustive report setting forth the operation of the new plan under which the Portland Presbytery declared it would not accept support from the outside, but would be independent and self-supporting.

Rev. Mr. Montgomery declared that the plan had been even more successful than had been expected, and reflected high credit on the Presbytery, although it had been necessary to increase home mission contributions 500 per cent, the call having been met cheerfully by the churches within the boundaries of the Presbytery.

The home mission committee recommended that the Sprague and Smith Memorial, Millard avenue, Eagle Creek, Mount Olivet, Kenilworth, and Fulton be grouped together, which was approved. The committee also recommended that the following sums be allowed: Vernon, \$200; Alderbrook, \$125; Sabbath school, \$157; Butler Chapel, \$133.95; total, \$1275.

Funds Are Distributed.

The home mission committee recommended that the Sprague and Smith Memorial, Millard avenue, Eagle Creek, Mount Olivet, Kenilworth, and Fulton be grouped together, which was approved.

The following commissioners were elected to attend the general assembly, which meets in Denver: Minister—Rev. D. A. Thompson, of the Sellwood Church, and Rev. J. R. Landborough, of Oregon City; alternates, Rev. Henry Marcotte, Westminister, and Rev. W. S. Gilbert, of Astoria. Elder commissioners—W. W. Amesbury, of Westminister; T. C. Shreve, of Mount Tabor; alternates, D. Robertson, Forbes, and John Saine, First Church.

Rev. H. Landborough read a report of the standing of young people's societies, which showed a falling off in membership in the Christian Endeavor Society and a corresponding increase in the Boys' and Girls' Club. Mr. Landborough asked the question, "Have the churches and societies kindred young people's societies, and if so, what is the result?" He pointed out that at the Third Presbyterian Church the Boys' Club had raised the past year \$81.

Rev. A. J. Montgomery spoke, explaining the success of the Boys' Club in his church, which was due to the leadership of Ernest C. Herlow, who had directed the club by allowing the boys to direct themselves. The club had been remarkably successful in every way, financially and otherwise.

Clubs Are Great Success.

Rev. Henry Marcotte talked eloquently about the advantages of the Boys' Club as a means to develop them physically, mentally, and morally. In his church had held. Rev. J. E. Snyder reported a great falling off in the Christian Endeavor Society and in the East. Rev. D. A. Thompson, Rev. W. H. Foulkes, Rev. C. T. Hurd and Rev. C. A. Philips expressed the opinion that the falling off in the Christian Endeavor Societies was due to the pastors and not to the young people.

Mr. Hurd declared that the Christian Endeavor Society in Oregon had 280 societies and there was no reason for falling off in interest. The general report of Mr. Landborough was adopted. The proposition of Newburg be permitted to raise \$500 and Spring Lake \$200; Butler Chapel \$100, and that the proposition that Millard avenue raise \$1000 be cancelled. The report was adopted after extended discussion, it being the opinion of the Presbytery that Portland be a very liberal in the past, but now had burdens of its own to carry.

A resolution was adopted thanking Rev. S. Dunning, D. D., for his tireless work at Kenilworth Church for over a year. A special committee was chosen to visit the First Church, Redland, Clackamas, and examine conditions there. The afternoon was taken up with a mass of routine business and staffed matters.

At noon ministers and delegates were invited to a banquet in the lecture room. Rev. William H. Foulkes presided, and at the close of the banquet, J. V. Milligan, Thomas Robinson and others for remarks. The Presbytery adjourned at 4:30 P. M., having held one of the most important sessions in its history. Rev. George W. Arps and members of Vernon Presbyterian Church were thanked for their hospitality.

"Co-operation has in a large measure displaced competition as the life of the city," said J. W. Spangler, Jr., of Seattle, last night at the monthly meeting of the Portland Association of Credit Men held at the Commercial Club.

Spangler spoke on "Commercial Comity" and pointed out that commercial comity means commercial courtesy. He showed that it was vastly different from the petty jealousy and rivalry which petty lines of business a few years ago when one firm would never dare to ask another for an opinion regarding a customer who might be a patron of both.
