POINTS TO JUDGE M'BRIDE'S DE-CISION REGARDING FEES.

Says Clerk May Keep Fees for Naturalization Papers if He Wishes.

In support of his contention that he has the right to retain one-half of the fees collected for issuing declarations of in-tention to become citizens, and of final papers, County Clerk Fields cites a decision of Judge Thomas A. McBride, for-merly of the Circuit Court of Clatsop County, now upon the Supreme bench, as bearing upon this point. Judge Mc-Bride decided the cierk of the court in naturalization proceedings acts as an officer of the United States, and that he is entitled to receive these fees, and to
