BONDS TO BE SOLD

Board Votes to Raise \$200,000 for More Parks.

EARLIER ISSUE IS SPENT

Only \$300,000 of \$1,000,000 Will Remain to Be Disposed of and These Will Be Put Out About July 1.

The Park Board yesterday afternoon voted to request the City Council to sell at once \$200,000 worth of the remaining \$500,000 of bonds provided by the people for the purchase of parks, boulevards and playgrounds. This action was taken at the request of Councilman Rushlight, who appeared largely in behalf of the East Side residents, who are asking the Board to buy small breathing spots throughout that district.

The first half of the bond issue was sold last January, so that the remaining may be sold at any time this year. The plan is to sell about July 1 the \$200,000 worth that will be left after the sale of the \$300,000. This will complete the sale of the issue. The proceeds of the first half have been used to purchase various plots, including Mount Tabor, the Smith tract and some land in Sellwood.

The Park Board is enthusiastically pushing the work of purchasing what is required to carry out the Olmsted plans for a general park, boulevard and playground scheme.

The Board will allow no more roses or other flowers to be planted in the park blocks, as the members believe that these

should be retained strictly for playgrounds and green plots.

No soldiers are wanted as musketeers in any capacity on the Peninsula, according to the statement of J. H. Nolte, chairman of the Board yesterday afternoon. He was present with others to represent that section of the city, lying in the vicinity of the new W. K. Smith tract and Columbia Park, regarding music this year. Mr. Nolte said he had heard that the Government Band at Vancouver, Wash., was to be brought here for some concert.

"We don't want the soldiers in the parks on the Peninsula," said Mr. Nolte. "It always draws a lot of soldiers with it and they are rough and we don't want them."

Dr. Dav Rafferty, chairman of the music committee, assured Mr. Nolte and the delegation that there is no intention of bringing the band from Vancouver barracks.

MRS. MIX IN COLTON

Another Message Is Received From Seattle Woman.

MAY TRY STAGE CAREER

Indications Are That Woman Whose Actions Have Been Puzzling Police Intends to Become Hypnotic Medium.

Mrs. Daisy Mix, object of earnest search for several days by a horde of police and private detectives led by her excited husband, H. W. Mix, of Seattle, telegraphed from Colton, Cal., yesterday. "Have arrived here all safe and have two trunks," the message read, which put an end to her husband's lurid deductions of murder and robbery.

But while the telegram seemed to remove the case from the pale of criminal investigation it only served to deepen the mystery so far as Mix was concerned. "What on earth she was doing at Colton she couldn't imagine. That settlement is 90 miles from Los Angeles, and so far as Mix knows she has no friends there.

That she may be conjuring with spirits and associates of Channing, the young man arrested at Mix's solicitation upon suspicion of having made away with Mrs. Mix, is regarded by the authorities as quite probable, in view of discoveries made yesterday by the District Attorney's office. Deputy District Attorney Hennessy was informed that two men, one of whom was identified as being Mrs. Mix, were taken immediately after her arrival in Portland from

ADDS THIRD STAMP WINDOW

Facilities of Postoffice Increased by Postmaster Young.

Beginning May 1, three stamp windows will be in operation in the Portland Postoffice. The third window will be open from 7:30 A. M. to 9:30 P. M. At the present time there are two windows in use, but at intervals during the day one of these is closed. When the new arrangement goes into effect, stamps may be procured from the box window after 9:30 P. M., as at present. Two windows in operation throughout the day will do away with the inconvenience which has arisen due to the large increase in the stamp sale.

FIELDS CITES AUTHORITY

POINTS TO JUDGE M'BRIDE'S DECISION REGARDING FEES.

Says Clerk May Keep Fees for Naturalization Papers if He Wishes.

In support of his contention that he has the right to retain one-half of the fees collected for issuing declarations of intention to become citizens, and of final papers, County Clerk Fields cites a decision of Judge Thomas A. McBride, formerly of the Circuit Court of Clatsop County, now upon the Supreme bench, as bearing upon this point. Judge McBride decided the clerk of the court in naturalization proceedings acts as an officer of the United States, and that he is entitled to receive these fees, and to retain them.

Mr. Fields also says he may, if he wishes to do so, refuse to issue citizenship papers, as this work is also done by the clerk of the Federal Court. In support of this contention he cites the last annual report of Richard K. Campbell, chief of the Division of Naturalization at Washington, in which Mr. Campbell says: "The duty of conferring citizenship is compulsory upon the Federal Court. The State Court may or may not assume the permissive jurisdiction conferred by the statute."

In this same report Mr. Campbell recommends the fees for naturalization work, and to relieve the Government of the expense.

Declarations were issued in Oregon last year to the number of 1662, and 423 final papers were issued. Multnomah County issued 891 first papers and 134 final papers. During his incumbency Mr. Fields has received for first and second papers \$2326, and has retained half of this, or \$1163.
