

SIEGE OF HADJIN RAISED BY TROOPS

Town Withstood Fanatics for Eight Days, While Refugees Feared Death.

RELIEF TO BE PROVIDED

Turkish Cabinet Will Take Up Inquiry Into Cause and Responsibility of Massacre and Punish Guilty.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 29.—A message received today from the town of Hadjin, in the province of Adana, where five American women missionaries have been alone with thousands of refugees who sought safety there from the hands of the Moslems seeking to slay them to the sword. Hadjin has withstood a siege for eight days, and the missionaries have been sending out frantic appeals for help.

Today a message reached here from Miss Lambert, the daughter of Bishop Lambert, which said:

"With the arrival of the troops the disorders in and about the city have ceased and we are all safe and well. Lambert."

The Turkish Cabinet has taken up the consideration of the situation in Adana and neighboring districts. The new Governor-General, Mustafa Zihni, is due to arrive at the town of Adana tonight or tomorrow. He has been instructed to take the most energetic measures to re-establish order and relieve the suffering. Adil Bey, permanent Under-Secretary of State in the Ministry of the Interior, said today the government would make a searching investigation into the cause of the disorders and punish the instigators. The secretary also stated that the government recognized the necessity of providing food, medicines and shelter for the sufferers, and had taken steps to do this and inaugurate other measures of relief.

In reply to a question as to what connection existed between the massacres and the principal events in Constantinople, Adil Bey replied that that, too, was being investigated.

RELATED NEWS FROM ADANA

Message Sent Saturday Shows Conditions Very Bad.

ADANA, April 24.—The emergency hospitals established here contain 300 patients suffering from wounds, many of whom are women. The average number of wounds to a person is four. There is great and immediate need for food and medical supplies. Practically the entire Armenian population of Adana, 15,000 people, is homeless, without bedding or clothing, and the food supply in the shops is exhausted. Some of the wounded Armenian women have told Miss Walcott, an English nurse who is caring for them, that they were shot by the Moslems because they screamed when they saw their husbands killed before their very eyes. Many Armenian babies have been carried off by the Turks as booty. A large number of mutilated bodies have been found in the streets of the city.

During the first five days of the disorders, while fighting, killing and plundering were going on, the Turkish troops in Adana kept the Turkish troops in the government house day and night under arms. On the sixth day he ordered them to put a stop to the fighting, which could have been done on the first day.

Stephen Trowbridge, an American missionary, said today:

"One man is responsible for the disorders here, the Vali himself. He had it in his power to suppress lawlessness and massacre, but deliberately refrained from doing so. He said simply:

"We are not responsible."

The American missionaries allowed no armed Armenians to enter the mission premises. They concentrated all weapons at the entrances to their houses. During the four days not a single shot was fired from the mission buildings. Immunity was secured for the Armenians who had taken shelter with the Americans upon the condition that they would give up all their arms, and this stipulation was strictly carried out.

The missionaries have picked 14 Mauve bullets from the walls of the girls' school. Few civilians had weapons. One of the most threatening features of the situation today is the garbage and filth in the streets, which has not been cleaned for a week. There is not enough water for drinking purposes or to dress the wounds of the injured. The local authorities have recovered all weapons from the looters, but none of it has been returned to the owners.

MARINES TO PROTECT ADANA

Russia Doubts Ability of Mohammed V to Cope With Revolt.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 29.—If recent reports from Adana are true the situation may lead to landing of marines in Turkey by international agreement. Doubt is expressed as to the ability of the Turkish government to cope with a situation so far from Constantinople.

The Foreign Office has not yet taken any official step in recognition of Mohammed V, nor has Emperor Nicholas sent him a telegram of congratulation.

WILL SOON STOP MASSACRE

Government Hurries Troops to Scenes of Slaughter.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—Ambassador Leshman cabled the State Department today that order had been restored in Constantinople, troops are being hurried where there are disturbances and that it is believed the trouble in the Adana and Alexandretta districts will soon disappear in view of the thorough methods of the re-established constitutional government.

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MORE TAXES MUST BE HAD

Nationalists would resist by every means. The increase in the tax on tobacco, he declared, would be a cruel hardship to the poor of Ireland.

The Chancellor proposed to provide the

additional revenue by reducing the amount placed in the sinking fund by £2,000,000 and by a revision of the income tax and estate duties.

Increase Income Tax.

The tax on unearned incomes will be increased two pence to 4d the pound, and the tax on earned incomes over £200 will be raised to 1s. Persons earning under £500 a year are granted a new special abatement of 10 for every child under 16 years of age.

On incomes exceeding £500 a year there is to be a super-tax of six pence in the pound. It is estimated that the extra yield in the income tax will be £2,300,000.

More Tax on Inheritance.

There will be an increase in the intervening scale of death duties estimated to yield an additional revenue of £2,500,000. It is estimated that a revision of the legacy and succession duties will produce an additional revenue of £1,370,000.

Another proposal is an increase on a sliding scale of the stamp duties on share transactions, calculated to yield an extra £1,400,000.

MAYOR REBUKES COUNCIL

SAYS IT SHOULD NOT MEDDLE WITH PARK BOARD.

Votes Ordinance Passed Granting Pay to Disabled Workmen Out of Park Funds.

Mayor Lane, in vetoing an ordinance appropriating from the park funds a certain sum of money for the payment of an employee for time deducted from his salary while he was ill, administrators gentle rebuke to the City Council. He declares the Council has no authority to tell the Park Board how to expend funds in its own business and leave the board its share of city work.

The veto message was issued yesterday and is as follows:

To the Honorable City Council—Gentlemen: A returned ordinance No. 19,300 not approved.

This is an ordinance which authorizes the Mayor and Auditor to draw a warrant for \$225 on the park fund in favor of W. J. Lelander for the time deducted from his salary while he was ill, administrators gentle rebuke to the City Council. He declares the Council has no authority to tell the Park Board how to expend funds in its own business and leave the board its share of city work.

I am informed that the expenditure here authorized to be made from their funds by your honorable body has been acted upon without the consent of the board of the Park Board, and whether the claim is just for it, if the legislative branch of the government can thus expound a portion of the money of the park fund, it can expend all of them and the work of the Park Board be thus entirely nullified.

This claim should be allowed to pursue the course of all others, which has not been done, therefore, return the ordinance for your further consideration. Respectfully,

CONSPIRATORS ARE HANGED IN DROVES

Constitutionalists Invoke Rigid Justice to Leaders of Turkish Uprising.

NATIONS WELCOME CHANGE

High Offices Given to Leaders of Salonians—Giant Eunuch, Who Hatched Plot, Hanged on Main Street.

ABDUL'S LEASE ON LIFE SHORT.

PARIS, April 29.—A dispatch from Salonica says that although the committee declares that the ex-Sultan's life will be safeguarded, it is freely hinted there that he is likely to have a "chance of life" as that organ is known to be weak.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 29.—The Constitutionalists have lost no time in bringing the conspirators in the recent rising to trial. The military court, sitting in the War Office today, condemned about 250 prisoners to death, and they were executed.

Nadir Pasha, the second eunuch of the palace, whose sentence was pronounced Wednesday, was hanged at dawn on the Galata bridge and his body was viewed by thousands. The National Assembly, which met under the presidency of Said Pasha, decided that the Sultan should take the oath of the constitution within a week. The Assembly also ratified the removal of Abdul Hamid to Salonica. The Government has decided to send a commission to Adana to try by court-martial the instigators of the massacres, and the committee is authorized to act with the utmost severity.

It is alleged that the chief authors of the recent mutiny were Abdul Hamid's favorite son, Prince Mehmed Burhaneddine; Rear-Admiral Salim Pasha, son of Kiamil Pasha, the ex-Grand Vizier, and Nadir Pasha, who were engaged for a long time prior to the rising in corrupting the troops. The former two have fled.

Ani Bey, inspector-general of the Salonica police, who was charged with the transporting of the ex-Sultan to Salonica, relates that when he arrived at the palace at 1 o'clock in the morning he found Abdul Hamid in a salon, which was illuminated as though for a gala occasion by every candle and torch that could be found in the buildings.

Abdul Hamid sat quite alone, with the exception of two eunuchs in a corner, in the same negligent attire as on the previous day when the deputation from the National Assembly notified him of his deposition. Being told that he must depart, he beseechingly appealed not to be taken to Salonica. He wanted to go to the Chiragan palace.

Numerous telegrams are being received here from the provinces and every one welcomes the change in sovereigns. It became known today that many Turks sought and obtained the protection of the British authorities here.

It has been suggested that the Imperial palace at Yildiz be converted into a museum and that the immense park surrounding the palace be turned into a reception ground for the people. Motor ambulances made their first appearance on the streets of Constantinople on the day the Constitutionalists troops entered the city. The vehicles have been generously patronized. Yesterday a bus exploded in a cloud of smoke.

Mehmed V, the new Sultan, has recently been congratulated practically from all the countries of the world. Telegrams from King Edward and President Fallieres were the first to arrive.

Laili Bey, Secretary-General of the

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Foreign Ministry has been appointed first chamberlain to the new Sultan; Halidiz Effendi, a well-known author, has been made First Secretary of the Imperial Chancellery; and Komal Bey, commander of the Salonica chancellery, has been given the position of first aide-de-camp to his majesty.

The body of Nadir Pasha was allowed to hang on the Galata bridge, the great thoroughfare that connects Stamboul with the quarters of Galata and Pera until 8 o'clock in the morning, and thousands of people stopped to look at the great Nubian, whose name was a terror under Abdul Hamid.

The dead man's face showed an under-shot jaw and thick, heavy lips. In life he had been fully six feet four inches tall. Nadir was executed after a trial by court-martial on the charge that he instigated the mutiny of the troops on April 13. He was reputed to be intensely ambitious, subtle minded and insensible to the suffering of others. He was one of the trio that formed Abdul Hamid's private cabinet under the old regime. The other members of his cabinet were Izzet Pasha and Fehim Pasha. The former, the Sultan's secretary, is now in hiding in London, and the latter, who was head of the Sultan's spy system, has been assassinated somewhere in Russia.

Nadir came to the palace as a slave and grew up in that hotbed of intrigue. Since the departure of Izzet Pasha and Fehim Pasha, Abdul Hamid has relied entirely upon Nadir, who is regarded as having been the chief conspirator in the events of April 13.

ABDUL REACHES SALONICA

General Moved From Villa to Accommodate Deposed Sultan.

SALONICA, European Turkey, April 29.—The deposed Sultan of Turkey, Abdul Hamid, arrived here last night from Constantinople. He was accompanied by two of his sons and a suite of 17 persons, including 11 women of his harem. The party was escorted hastily to the villa in the suburbs set aside for its use.

This villa was occupied until recently by General Robilant, commander of the gendarmerie. The Governor of Salonica asked the General yesterday to move out, saying that "a guest was expected."

EASTERN ROADS FIGHT

CHEAP RATES TO ATLANTIC AS BAIT FOR TRAFFIC.

Summer Business Hitherto Held by Lines to Pacific to Be Diverted to Eastward.

CHICAGO, April 29.—(Special.)—For the first time in their history Eastern railroads have decided to establish cheap Summer tourist rates from the Middle West to the Atlantic seaboard and to New England territory. Beginning on June 1 and continuing until September 30, it will be possible to visit

the big seaboard cities or Atlantic Coast Summer resorts of New England, or the mountain resorts of New York, by the payment of a round-trip rate of approximately \$25 from Chicago or St. Louis.

Reduced rates have been decided upon for all Eastern points with the exception of New York, and strenuous efforts are being made by some of the roads to exempt the New York business from the operation of the cheap rates.

For years Eastern roads have maintained a stone wall around Eastern Summer resorts, insisting upon normal traffic during all the Summer months. About seven years ago Western roads inaugurated Summer tourist rates, resulting in an increase within a short time in the Summer tourist business of over 700 per cent.
