VETERANS TO VISIT SCHOOLS—At the meeting of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, No. 12, A. R. Saturday night, after considerable discussion it was decided that the regular details of old soldiers should visit the Portland schools Friday, May 28, before Memorial day and speak to the pupils. It was the decision of this post that, inasmuch as it is an order from the National and Department Commanders to perform this duty, it cannot be evaded without violating definite instructions. The action of the Veterans Post will, of course, settle this matter, and a joint committee of all the G. A. R. posts of the city will arrange to have details at a meeting which will be held next Sunday afternoon. A letter from City Superintendent Rigler to George Wright was read at its last meeting in response to an inquiry, saying that the usual visits from the Veterans Post were expected. It has been decided, however, to ask principals of the schools to see that no special preparation be made for Friday, May 28, when the details will visit the schools, so that the teachers and pupils will be relieved from any extra work. It is also expected that the children be assembled for about one hour to listen to the addresses.

WOMAN STILL MISSING—Although missing since last Thursday, no trace has been found by the police of Mrs. Jennie Mayo, the aged domestic who mysteriously disappeared from the household of A. Davidson, president of the Pacific Coast Showcase & Fixture Company, 350 Fourth street. Mrs. Mayo possessed over \$500 in cash and that she had made some investments with this money and thought she had been swindled out of it. She brooded deeply over the matter as the money represented the savings from her toil for many years. As far as known she has no living relatives, her family having been lost in the San Francisco disaster.

WILL ASK FOR SCHOOLHOUSE—The Montavilla schoolhouse is filled up and more room is needed. Residents in Railroad Addition in North Montavilla will ask that ground be secured and a schoolhouse erected in that part of the district instead of adding more room to the Montavilla building. The plan is to build a school for little children to reach the school building from Railroad Addition. As soon as the territory east of Montavilla is added to the city, the general election, becomes part of the city in June, a large number of pupils from the territory will enter the Montavilla building. Enough new pupils will come from the new territory to fill up a room, so that more room will be needed.

FUNERAL OF REV. WILLIAM TRAVIS—The funeral of William Travis, prominent in the establishment of the schools and as a Presbyterian minister, who died Saturday, 28 years of age, was held yesterday afternoon from the residence, 50 East Sixteenth street. Interment was in Riverside cemetery. Rev. Andrew J. Montgomery conducted the services, paying tribute to the services rendered by Rev. Mr. Travis to education, to the Presbyterian ministry and to humanity. Rev. Mr. Travis was well known in Oregon, as principal services here being as Presbyterian Sunday school missionary to which position he was appointed in 1892 and from which he retired in 1898.

GRAVES WERE ALL MOVED—C. C. Hubbard, of Alaska, spent several days of the past week looking for the grave of his wife at Mount Tabor, where she was buried 22 years ago. He could find no trace of the grave. The old graveyard at Mount Tabor, according to E. S. Brundage, who has lived there nearly 20 years, was located on West avenue near Belmont street. He says that 30 years ago all the graves were removed to other cemeteries. It was in the old graveyard that Mrs. Hubbard was buried but where the body was removed the husband was not able to discover. His object was to mark the place with a headstone. The site of the old cemetery is now covered with houses.

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CAPTURED AFTER CHASE—Charles Goodman, recently from Seattle, and giving his age as 43 years was given a merry chase yesterday afternoon by a half dozen Japanese. He declared he had entered the room of J. Murata, near the steel bridge, and taken a watch and \$50 in gold from clothing found there. After chasing Goodman for half an hour along the river Japanese pursued him into the street, where he attempted to board a streetcar. While doing so he was arrested by Officers Gable and Harris and Deputy Sheriff Laird. He was taken to the police station where \$40 was found on him, most of it in currency. He wore a large diamond ring and a valuable gold watch. Goodman professed innocence but the Japanese were positive in their assertion of the theft, although they said he had given the money to the officer afterward. The case has been turned over to Detectives Helmer and Maloney.

The police are still unable to locate him. SUMMER DAY CALLS ALL OUT OF DOORS.

Mercury Climbs to 86 During Afternoon, Warmest Temperature of Present Season.

Yesterday's real Summer weather received a joyous welcome in Portland. The city was in a mood for an outing and everyone and his cousin spent the day out of doors in some manner. All day long the cars to the City Park, to Council Crest and to other points where fresh air and freedom could be had were crowded. The ball game attracted the usual big Sunday crowd. The harbor was dotted with launches and the roads were alive with automobiles. Hastily organized picnics wended their way to the woods and the fishermen spent a perfect day whipping the trout streams in Portland's vicinity. For many while the easy chair on the veranda irresistibly called the older folk. Men refused to wait longer for the arrival of the national day and donned straw hats. Women appeared in the most summery attire and there was only the faintest suggestion of a shawl to remind one that it was May and not July or August.

Probably the parks proved the greatest attraction. The continued dry weather has removed the danger that usually attends rolling on the grass in the Springtime and the warm sun made the benches in the shade welcome places of rest. Children played throughout the day in the open places where "Keep off the Grass" signs did not forbid. All in all it was a beautiful day and the weather climate and Portland made the most of it.

Prior to yesterday the maximum temperature of each day had hovered around 75 to 76 degrees. Yesterday there was an advance of 10 degrees. At 10 A. M. it was 86 or the equivalent of the warmest weather of preceding days. Slowly the mercury climbed until at 4 o'clock the highest mark was reached at 86. For Portland weather 86 is doing pretty well for a Summer day and it was far and away the warmest day of the present season.

The Summer weather, however, has this drawback. It will melt the snow in the mountains and the snow banks in the mountains not more than 40 miles from Portland. Three days of such weather, say river observers, and the Columbia will be booming and backing its flood waters up the Willamette River.

BUNCO MAN CAUGHT

David Smith, With Several Aliases, Writes Bad Check.

POSES AS RICH LOGGER

Borrows Money of Business Men, Swindles Workmen and Finally Lands Behind Bars of City Jail.

Acquaintances Victimized.

Representing himself as a wealthy logger by the name of Fowler, the superintendent of the Blind Slough Logging Company, also as Mr. Palmer, of the Palmer & Libby Logging Company, of Clatsop County, and establishing credit with several logging supply houses and with the Willamette Iron & Steel Works, David Smith, of several aliases, buncoed a number of people out of several hundred dollars in cash and forged checks. He also caused the wholesale houses where he had purchased supplies to suffer the loss of several hundred dollars by the expense of supplying engines and other paraphernalia to the logging camp in which he claimed management. Smith is now in jail.

Smith, who said he was a Norwegian, when arrested at Second and Burnside streets yesterday afternoon by Detectives Price and Coleman, arrived in Portland last Thursday and engaged a large number of men to start to work for him. He offered them an appearance he demanded a bonus of \$5 from each one. This amount was secured from 20 or 30 men. From one man he secured \$25.

The next step was to order donkey engines from the Willamette Iron & Steel Works. Two snatch blocks at \$50 and \$25 respectively, besides other necessary apparatus such as sledges, grappling hooks, pulleys and considerable other stuff were ordered to the S. B. Hicks & Sons Company, made the acquaintance of Charles A. Stewart, manager of the company, and put in an order for a large quantity of wire rope and other material. Stewart was delighted with the big order and made efforts to expedite the wealthy logger by inviting him out and introducing him to his business associates.

Smith Widens His Acquaintance.

Smith then ordered a large quantity of material from other dealers. He made known his wishes in regard to getting more men and spoke to Stewart about the matter. Stewart, who accompanied Smith about the city, introduced him to H. J. Bennett and Bert Stewart, managers of the Red Cross Employment Company. Bennett, glad of the chance to get the supplying of a large number of men to the logging camp, returned to the employment office with Smith, and at once took measures to secure them for the logging camp. The next morning, Saturday, Bennett sent them on to the Blind Slough camp Saturday night.

Glad to be as entertaining as possible to a good customer, Bennett took Smith home to dinner that night in an automobile and invited him to stay all night, which Smith readily accepted. The dinner over, Smith remarked to Bennett that he was out of money and that he would like to borrow \$100 from Bennett. Bennett would lend him \$10 until morning. Bennett was glad to be of service to a good customer and made the loan. The whole set area to be assessed. MAY PAVE BIG DISTRICT

PRESIDENT OF PENINSULA CLUB OUTLINES PLAN.

Project Contemplates Hard-Surface for All Streets Between Alberta and St. John.

W. J. Peddicord, president of the Peninsula Development League, who was assigned to the task of investigating and reporting on a district plan for paving with hard-surface material the streets of the Peninsula between Albert street and St. John, has submitted an exhaustive report on the subject. He gives a review of the sub-area, travel and other conditions, and assessment in various cities; supervising officers; contracting parties; material for paving; manner of doing the work; cost of the work; manner property-owner may pay for the same; maintenance terms. Methods in the principal cities are set forth. Applying the subject direct, Mr. Peddicord says:
