Bartlatt, Patten & Co., of which Bull Leader James A. Patten is a member, were credited today with selling May on a moderate scale, but with making heavy purchases of July.

Today's advance, on top of the gradual gains of last week, are said to indicate clearly that the bull campaign, which was alleged in many quarters to be dead, was only sleeping.

The closing figures today were 10 cents higher than the bottom reached on April 27 last. Mr. Patten is still absent on his partner's New Mexico ranch.


