HADJIN, Asiatic Turkey, May 5.—Notwithstanding the presence of troops here, the situation is desperate because of the lack of food and medical supplies. The troops arrived just in time as the besiegers had succeeded in setting fire to a house on the edge of the city. The fire spread, but as the breeze was blowing away from the town, only five buildings were destroyed. A heavy rifle fire was kept up against those who tried to extinguish the flames.

VIENNA, May 5.—(Special.)—The Bank of England which holds the largest portion of Abdul Hamid's wealth, refuses point blank to deliver up the ex-sultan's cash at the demand of Young Turkey committees. French, German and Italian banks likewise refuse. Meanwhile the committee is trying every possible device to force Abdul Hamid into signing checks in their favor for all his money, but this procedure is already attracting the attention of public opinion.
