Ladies' Day Hoodoo Is Transferred to Tacoma, Which Goes Down, 7 to 2.

PORTLAND BATTERS GOINS

Oregon City Boy Benched After First and Clifton Goes In, but Cannot Stop Stampede of Casey's Men to Bases—Plenty of Batting.
