Shakespearean Dramas Produced Out of Doors With Greatest Degree of Naturalness.

Degree of Naturainess.

To have played with Hen Greet for five years continuously with but four wack's intermission for rest is the experience of George Vivian, a young Englishman playing important roles in Mr. Greet's company, which opens in Portland Priday. Continuous travel has affected Mr. Vivian's health, and he has a come on to Portland, after a breakdown, for a few days' rest to freshen
up before the arrival of the company.
At the Portland Hotel yesterday afternoon, Mr. Vivian told of Mr. Greet's
efforts to uplift the drama. He said
that even in New York, the stronghold

theater, where Mr. Greet might produce plays that he believed worth while,
continuously. "In New York at present," said Mr. Vivian, "there is not a
single theater devoted to the more serious forms of the drama. Shakespeare,

Why should a theater not be largely
devoted to producing his works?"
Mr. Vivian told of the famous actors
and actresses who have received their
early training with Mr. Greet. He is
a whole-souled admirer of the actor
who helieves in acting Shakespeare
naturally, as he believes the immertal
bard would have himself produced his
works, "Mrs Patrick Campbell, Wynne
Mathleson, and even Louis Freear, received their dramatic training with Mr.
Greet. There are bosts of others," he
said.

"In a short time," he continued, "we will be resuming our outdoor per formances. We spend the time out of doors practically all together. You have no idea how natural Shakespeare's nave no idea how natural Shakespeare's pastoral plays appear when presented among trees or on some bright green lawn. Take 'As Fou Like It., Before you see them, you hear the calls of the foresters. Gradually they appear among the trees and then suddenly from every glade you see them issue. That is as Shakespeare meant his plays to be presented.

"At night the presentation of "A Mid-summer Night's Dream' is marvelous. The fairies filt hither and thither and make fairyland almost possible." Mr. Vivian discussed the lighting schemes in American and Eng-lish theaters. In English theaters the calciums are thrown from the side in place of from the halcony. He thought that was the preferable way. "The light being in front seems harsh," he said.

C. A. STRAUS ON TRIAL

FORMER POSTOFFICE CASHIER ACCUSED OF DEFALCATION.

Jury Impaneled and One Witness Is Examined, Admitting He Paid Bill With Stamps.

Charles A. Straus, ex-cashler of the Portland Postoffice, was placed on trial in the Federal Court yesterday, charged with defalcation of Postoffice stock and funds to the extent of 14050.78. This sum was later reduced by Attorney McCourt 176, who said that amount had been accounted for. Little progress was made with the case, the day being devoted to impaneling a jury and to the examination of one witness.

Mr. Straus resigned from the Postoffice service some months ago, because of defective sight. A shortage in the strong-room stock was discovered some time later, and the Federal grand jury at a recent session indicted him. Attorney John F. Logan, counsel for Mr. Straus, is endeavoring to show that the liability for the shortage lay with ex-Postmaster Minto, as well as with the assistant postmaster and the cashier. That the money and stock have disappeared no one denies,
