Karngold Peaches on Abbott.

Nicholas Karngold declared he had followed District Attorney W. H. Langdon with two detectives and John Claudians to the home of James L. Gallagher, which had been wrecked by an explosion of dynamite. He declared that Abbott had commended him for his work and had instructed him to ascertain, if possible, what had transpired in the grand jury room in Oakland when Claudians was indicted in connection with the dynamiting. The witness said that he had been directed by Abbott to establish relations with the family of Felix Paunderis, who was accused of complicity in the affair, but has never been apprehended.

Tried to Defeat Justice.

All of the testimony of the day was offered, according to Mr. Heney, in an effort to show that Calhoun and Abbott were engaged in a conspiracy to defeat the ends of justice and suppress evidence.

It is believed that the prosecution is hearing the end of its case, but under the most favorable circumstances it is improbable that the arguments will be reached within a week.

Brown testified that investigation had led him to believe that the dynamiting was arranged by Gallagher himself or by J. Scheuch, his brother, who had been an occupant of the house, for the purpose of arousing the flagging interest of the public and to create sympathy for Gallagher.

"Having in mind your duties as an attorney, you nevertheless made no effort to aid in the exposure of persons you believed guilty of a capital offense," asked Mr. Heney.

Thinks Gallagher Is Dynamiter.

"I am no detective," said the witness. "I assumed that W. J. Burns, with his well-known fealty to the public welfare, would doubtless uncover the culprits."

Brown affirmed that he had been influenced in his opinion by ascertaining through an Oakland client, whose name was Johnnie, that the latter had found in the wrecked house a catalogue containing lists and prices of explosives. He testified that he had ever known Felix Paunderis, the Greek padrone, accused of complicity in the dynamiting, who has never been apprehended. Brown added that he had delivered to John H. Helms and to William M. Abbott.

Karngold, who is the employ of the prosecution, was then called. He testified that he had received from E. A. Platt many documents taken from the office of William J. Burns and delivered them to John H. Helms and to William M. Abbott.

Knows Nothing of Paunderis.

Brown declared he had never learned that Felix Paunderis had worked for the United Railroads, and he denied that the name Paunderis had been mentioned in his conversation with Karngold or that he had ever told Abbott of sending Karngold to see the Claudians brothers or their relatives.

Brown denied that he had ever sent J. C. Brown, one of his assistants, to Arizona, or that he had paid the expenses of such a trip. He was charged that he had done this to secure the indictment of Heney on a charge of murder.

Brown, who was arrested on a charge of grand larceny and in the theft of papers from Burns' office, denied that he had employed and paid Jerry Van Worman, one of the men arrested at the same time, except in a personal matter. Under cross-examination, Brown said Calhoun had no knowledge of Brown's attempts to trap Loneragan and knew nothing of Van Worman.

THREE WITNESSES MISSING

Prosecution Says O'Neill Brothers and Platt Are Gone.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 25.—It was announced by the prosecution today that John O'Neill, an attorney, and his brother Hugh, together with E. A. Platt, all witnesses in the Calhoun case, have disappeared. Agents of the District Attorney's office are making a search for them.

The O'Neill brothers, who were subpoenaed as witnesses, were accused of having attempted to prevent the appearance of John Helms as a witness for the prosecution. Platt was arrested several weeks ago on a charge of grand larceny and accused of delivering papers from the office of W. J. Burns to the defense. Platt at the time was a confidential assistant to Burns.

BURNS' ELDEST SON IS DEAD

Detective Suffers Bereavement in Crisis of Calhoun Trial.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 25.—A telegram received today by Detective William J. Burns, special agent of the District Attorney's office in the investigation of the graft cases, stated that his eldest son, George Burns, died this morning at Monrovia, in Southern California. He was 23 years old and for some time had been engaged in important detective work in connection with that of his father.

MONROVIA, Cal., May 25.—George Burns, son of Detective William J. Burns, of San Francisco, died at the Pottinger Sanitarium, in this city, to-

day of tuberculosis of the lungs. Mrs. Burns, the mother of the young man, was with him when he passed away.

Fanatic Jokes With Reporters When His Defense in Trial Starts.

KANSAS CITY, May 25.—Smiles and elation were in the face of James Sharp, self-styled "Adam God," when his defense was begun today. In his trial for the murder of Patrolman Michael Mulane, in an affable mood, he whispered almost continuously to his attorneys during the court session, while at recess he flitted about the room, with a friendly word for all. He even attempted a joke, taking advantage of the heavy atmosphere outside, that made the courtroom dark and gloomy. Upon a piece of paper which told him he was "God," he had sold his farm near Woodward, Okla., and given the proceeds to the poor, "and had gone into the world to save the people."

RELIGIOUS FREEDOM NEAR

Donna Takes First Steps to Give Czar's Subjects Greater Leeway.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 25.—The Donnas today began the discussion of a law legalizing the sect of Old Believers. This is the first of a series of important measures designated to put into effect the principles of religious liberty enunciated in the Emperor's manifesto of 1905. The sect of the Old Believers, which in various forms embraces 15,000,000 worshippers, is the largest dissident body in Russia. It is separated from the parent Orthodox Church during the period of religious reforms under Peter the Great.

ROOSEVELT HAVING TIME OF HIS LIFE

Maj. Seaman, U. S. A., Comes
Out of Jungles With Report
of Great Quantity Game.

TALKS OF DREAD DISEASE

Says Discoveries About Sleeping
Sickness Upset All Former Theo-
ries and Make Efforts to
Stop Plague Difficult.

PARIS, May 25.—Major Louis L. Seaman, U. S. A., has arrived here from Mombasa, where he met the Roosevelt party. He says Selous and Cunningham are the best hunters in Africa, and that the ex-President "is having the time of his life."

Major Seaman, who hunted with Dr. Guiteras, of New York, over the Athi plains along the Nairobi River, where Mr. Roosevelt is shooting, brought out 150 specimens of big game. He reports animals so plentiful that after six weeks' hunting he and Dr. Guiteras were completely satisfied with the sport. When he left, he said, he would rather shoot snipe on the wing than elephants.

Animals Crowd Plains.

"Never have the Western cattle ranges seen so many animals," he said. "One day we counted 60 zebras, gazelles and other animals within a segment comprising one-tenth of a circle. There were fully 500 in sight. Nevertheless, the animals are hard to approach, as the herds keep out of sight."

Major Seaman considers the rhinoceros and the buffalo the most dangerous to hunt, as they invariably charge, which means death to the hunter if the animal is not killed or crippled. Lions, on the contrary, he says, are natural cowards.

No Respect for Lions.

"My respect for the lion has disappeared since I went to Africa," he said. "The lion never fights except when he is wounded or driven to bay."

Major Seaman, who is an expert in military sanitation, was greatly interested in the sleeping sickness. He brought back the first news of the discovery by Dr. Schirrin, a German, which completely upsets the theory of the English commission, that the tsetse fly simply transmits the malarial. Dr. Schirrin proved that the fly becomes infected, thus establishing the extinguishing of the dread disease, as it ends the hope previously entertained, of suppressing it by isolation.

The disease has claimed a half million victims, according to Dr. Seaman, not a single person attacked has ever recovered. The chief horror is the long period of incubation. The bite of the fly itself, when not inoculated, is harmless. Dr. Seaman was bitten on the forehead and suffered no bad effects.

ANANIAS CLUB REMEMBERED

Roosevelt Sends Characteristic De-

nials From African Jungles.

NAIROBI, British East Africa, May 25.—A staff correspondent of the Associated Press returned to Nairobi this morning after a two-day visit to the Roosevelt camp as the guest of Mr. Roosevelt. The camp was located on the Healy ranch, on the banks of the Nairobi river. Mr. Roosevelt, who is on his second tour of Africa, and his son, Kermit, are in remarkably good health, and they are delighted with the success of their expedition. The accuracy of the rifle fire of Mr. Roosevelt was also astonished not only the settlers, but the members of the party.

He had killed recently at close range a hyena that had attacked his camp. He has also come near making a record bag of female wart hogs in a given space of time. Today the party is staying at the Healy ranch, but tomorrow Mr. Roosevelt, his son and Edmund Heller are coming into Nairobi. Major Seaman and the owner, Lord, will remain at the Healy ranch until Wednesday, collecting birds and mammals.

Mr. Roosevelt is annoyed at certain special dispatches, which it is reported here, are appearing in American and English newspapers. He requests the Associated Press to send out the following statement:

"No newspaper has a representative with the party, nor any other means of gaining information of the party's doings beyond what is generally known. Rena May Miller, aged 5 years, was badly burned, but may recover. Little Dorothy Clay was the unwitting cause of the catastrophe. The little girl had formed in a circle, and had drilled back and forth in their white muslin dresses, the audience gathering enthusiastically as the entertainment progressed. Then the lights were extinguished and a flash of the hand of each child flashed out brilliantly. The crowd applauded enthusiastically that Dorothy grew frightened and dropped her candle. The flames leaped to the white muslin, and in a twinkling five dresses were consumed.

Louise Marshall, a screaming rocket, leaped over the footlights and into the lap of her aunt in the audience. Business has been suspended as a result of the tragedy.

Mrs. B. C. Boyd, the music teacher of the children, is nearly insane with grief.

KING'S COLT LEADS

Minoru Favorite for Today's English Derby.

BAYARD SHOWS POOR FORM

Sir Martin, Kentucky-Bred, Will Be Chief Opponent—Edward May Be First King to Win Derby.

LONDON, May 25.—The greatest of all horse races, the Derby, which will be run at Epsom Downs tomorrow, promises to be the most interesting Derby of a decade. The possibility that King 22-wards Minoru will win the purse of \$25,000 and the owner gain the distinction of being the first reigning monarch to take the classic gives the contest an importance that cannot be overestimated in the eyes of the British public.

Minoru Favorite, Sir Martin Rival.

Minoru is now a hot favorite for the event. Although last year this colt was not rated class, he made phenomenal improvement during the winter. He easily won the 2000 guineas at Newmarket April 23.

His principal opponent is considered to be Louis Winstan's Sir Martin, from John E. Madden's Kentucky farm, which is supposed to have cost his present owner \$20,000. Sir Martin is now in the very best of form. He recently won the welter plate at Newmarket, and since then has given every evidence that he will be in the running in tomorrow's great event.

Bayard's Stock Way Down.

Bayard, owned by A. Patrye, which the American jockey, Maher, will ride, was regarded as invincible until recently, having as a two-year-old won his seven races easily. But he failed to make the improvement that was reasonably to be expected during the last year, and gave an inglorious display of form a short time ago at Newmarket that sent his stock away down.

No American stables are represented among the entries, but the American contingent, which promises to be larger than usual, is enthusiastic for Sir Martin, while the great British crowd and the foreigners as well will go with Minoru, should the King, according to honored custom, lead the winner past the stand.
