TRAINING SCHOOL FOR SITKA. — The Presbyterians are to build a training school at Sitka. Alaska. Portland women subscribed \$2000 toward it yesterday afternoon at a tea, given by the Women's Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church, at the home of Mrs. W. S. Ladd. Yesterday had been set apart by the society for the raising of \$10,000 in California. Oregon, Washington and Idaho. California's contribution was to be \$600, with a similar amount from the other three states combined. The training school, which will be for the purpose of teaching girls in and about Sitka, sewing and such work as falls to the lot of the housekeeper, and for teaching boys various trades, is to cost \$40,000 all told. The balance of \$30,000 in addition to that being raised on this coast is to be donated by Presbyterians in the East.

Itinerant Umbrella Mender Thought to Have Committed Suicide.

Believed to be that of an itinerant umbrella-mender, the body of an unidentified man was found in the river yesterday about three quarters of a mile below St. John. As a sack containing rocks was found around his neck, Coroner Norden says the man evidently committed snicide.

The man was about 50 years of age and was clean-shaven. His head was free from hair, but this is believed to be due to the action of the water. One thumb was cut off, but it is thought this occurred before death.

The body was found by W. R. Enderwels, who was fishing where Ogden Shogh cupties into the Willamette. Officer Bredford was notified and the body turned over to the Coroner.

## BOY KILLED BY CAR

Ground Under Wheels.

ON WILLIAMS-AVENUE LINE

Motorman and Conductor Declare Car Was Running at Ten Miles an Hour, but Passengers Say Speed Was Greater.

There was a scene of wild confusion on the car immediately after the accident. Women acreamed and men rushed to where the child lay. There were several cars immediately behind the one that struck the hoy, and in a very few mements a large crowd had gathered. One excited person turned in a fire alarm, and two women fainted. An ambulance was called, and the little fellow, who had soon lost consciousness, was taken to the Good Samarilan Hospital, where an operation was performed by Dr. A. E. Rockey. For a time hope for his recovery was expressed, but it was soon seen that efforts to save him were futile.

The mother and father of the lad hastened to the hospital. The mother, a frail, dark woman, was prostrated with gfiet, and it became necessary to send her home.

According to a statement made by B. F. Boynton, claim agent of the Portland Rallway, Light & Power Company, the accident was unavoidable under the circumstances. The car was in charge of Motorman W. H. Meloy, who has been in the employ of the company for over two years, and Conductor H. L. Hirshey. In their report to Agent Boynton, they said that the car was running at a rate of about ten miles an hour, and had just turned the curve on Williams avenue, about 20 yards west of Cherry street. The two children were playing in the street, and the looy attempted to pass in front of the car so suddenly that it was impossible to stop.

"I was standing in the car, which was crowded, steadying myself by holding to a strap. We were going at a tremendous rate of speed for a streetcar, which I judge at about 20 miles an hour. I formerly ran a car and am a pretty good judge of such things. I saw the little fellow attempt to cross the track while the car was some distance away. Then I, with other passengers, saw it upon him in a twinkling and he was ground beneath the wheels.

"The car ran almost the length of an ordinary block before it could be stopped, I thought when we commenced going at such a fast rate that the car was behind time. Seven cars, which were immediately behind us, closed in between us and the place where the accident occurred and yau may judge from that how hard it was to stop the madly rushing car."
