"Big Ranchman" of Burns Denies Inclosing Government's Public Domain.

HE DISPUTES MAP'S LINES

Insisting that he had never fenced any Government land, and had always opposed on principle the inclosing of the public domain. William Hanley, the big ranchman of Burns, wens on the stand yesterday in the Federal Court as a witness in his own behalf. Not only did Hanley deny knowledge that the French-Gienn fences effectually inclosed Government land, but directly disputed the acciuracy of witnesses as to the effectiveness of the rimrock barrier on the west of the tract. He declared witnesses who said they could see the rimrock from the

of the tract. He declared witnesses who said they could see the rimrock from the road at the base were mistaken, and, in fact, he disputed the claim that there was a continuous rimrock on the west, as shown by the map submitted in evidence by the Government.

Mr. Hanley testified he was norn in Rogue River Valley, and had gone to Harney County in 1819. Two ranches there—the "Bell A" and the "Double O"—are controlled by the William Hanley Company. These ranches are not included in the land sileged to be inclosed by the fences of the French-Glean Company or its successor, the Harney Valley Development Company.

Mr. Hanley declared he never knew there was any question about the fences until he read of his indictment and was served with papers in the case. He further said he did not know of the change in policy of the Land Department, which dispensed with the former custom of notifying the owners of offending fences to remove them.


