New President Sounds Keynote at

This declaration formed the keynote of an address by President Lowell, of Harward at the session today of the Associated Harvard clubs.

Governor Augustus F. Willson, of Kan tucky, protested against what he termed a disposition of the East to attempt to control Harvard affairs and declared that, while the Associated Harvard Clubs had been organized as a Western affair, there seemed to be a disposition to Elisternize It.
