Horticultural Society Must Fight for Estate.

#### GIFT OF \$20,000 AT STAKE

Yamhill County Heirs of Cyrus E. Hoskins File Suit to Prevent Orchardists From Getting

Big Bequest.

Officers of the Oregon State Horticultural Society are to figure in a will contest which has been filed in the Probate Court at McMinnville. Cyrus E. Hoskins, pioneer horticulturist of Newberg, Yamhill County, who died last year, bequest he entire cetate on the death of his wife to the State Horticultural Society, on certain conditions stipulated in the will. The property included in the bequest amounts to hetween \$10,000 and \$25,000. Hoskins heirs have decided through litigation to break the will, if possible.

The gift of Mr. Hoskins to the Horticultural Society was in the nature of an endowment. It was stipulated in the will that on the death of Mrs. Hoskins the entire estate should become the property of the society, which should dispose of it in the most practical way, that a memorial of some kind might be provided to the horticultural industry of the state and the interest decedent had in fruit culture. The terms of the will made it optional with the society, through a board of trustees, either to retain the property and manage it, using the receipts therefrom towards furthering interest in horticulture, or to sell the land and devote the funds to the erection of a permanent home for the society. It was expressly provided in the will that no part of the estate should be used for meeting the incidental expenses of continuing the society and its work.

Interested heirs have instituted contest proceedings in the courts in Yambill County, and the necessary legal papers have been prepared for service on the officers of the Horticultural Society. It is entirely probable that these papers will be served on H. C. Atwell, of Forcest Grove, and P. W. Power, of this city, president and secretary, respectively, of the society and is anything in the partiors of the society.
