## CROP BETTER HERE

Comparison of Apple-Growing Sections Made.

## HOOD RIVER IS IN LEAD

G. B. Lanham, Chicago Commission Man, Says Other Fruit Districts Will Have Poor Yield in All Kinds, Apples Especially.

HOOD RIVER, Or., June 6.—(Special.)—According to G. B. Lanham, purchasing agent for Wagner & Co., a commission firm of Chicago, Oregon's fruit crop prospects are a shade better this year than most of the other fruit-growing states.

Mr. Lanham has been making a tour of the fruit-growing districts in the North and Middle West and states that the Colorado crop was saved this year by the use of heating pots kept going there for a week or ten days during the period when the late spring frost came.
