There was animated buying outside, such as is looked for especially on Monday morning during the progress of a speculative campaign, and prices, as usual, were opened as high as possible, with benevolent intent toward those having stocks to sell rather than towards the early buyers. At Umatilia the rise yesterday was only 3 foot and at Portland the highest stage was 19.7 feet at 8 o'clock P. M. Water slopped over the Couch-street dock to a depth of only four inches.

The conclusion of the weather man is drawn from the conditions now prevailing at all points in the Northwest. The main tributary of the Columbia is falling and the other rivers are rising so slowly that there is absolutely no danger of high water in Portland.

The Dalles is still five feet away from a flood stage and the locks at the Cascades will not go out of commission until long after the flood stage is reached at The Dalles. The river must reach a stage of 39 feet at the Cascades before the locks will close. This means a 45-foot stage at The Dalles. From all indications the locks will not be closed to navigation this year.
